Lexington, Kentucky August 16, 2018

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on August 16, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gray in the chair presiding, and the following members of the council: Stinnett, Worley, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, Evans, Farmer, Gibbs, Henson, Kay, Lamb, Moloney, Mossotti, Plomin, and Smith.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky August 16, 2018

The Invocation was given by Chaplain Cecil Tatum, Div. of Fire and Emergency Services.

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Upon motion by Ms. Plomin, seconded by Vice Mayor Kay, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the June 12, 2018 Zone Change Meeting, and the June 7 and June 21, 2018 and July 3 and July 5, 2018 Council Meetings were approved.

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Mayor Gray asked Council Member James Brown, Commissioner Kenneth Armstrong, Department of Public Safety, and Mr. Richard Curtis, Dept. of Public Safety to join him at the podium.

Mayor Gray welcomed Mr. Curtis and his family and spoke about the induction of Mr. Curtis to the Kentucky Veterans' Hall of Fame. Mayor Gray described Mr. Curtis's 40-year career at the LFUCG, following 24 years in the United States Army.

Mayor Gray awarded to Mr. Curtis the Spirit of Lexington Award.

Mr. J. Brown spoke of his efforts last year working with the Hall of Fame to better honor our community's veterans. Mr. J. Brown congratulated Mr. Curtis on the honor of his induction into the Hall of Fame and talked about how it is a recognition of Mr. Curtis's military service, but also his service in the community.

Mr. Curtis thanked the Mayor and Council for this recognition and he also expressed his gratitude to his wife, his son, and his extended family, including his military family and the community.
