PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement"), made and entered into on the 9th day of July, 2019, by and between the LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT, an urban county government of the Commonwealth of Kentucky created pursuant to KRS chapter 67A (hereinafter "Government"), 200 East Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507, on behalf of its Department of Social Services (hereinafter "Sponsor"), and, FOODCHAIN with offices located 501 West Sixth Street, Suite 105, Lexington, Kentucky 40508, (hereinafter "Organization").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Government and the Sponsor desire to strengthen and enhance Food Insecurity and Nutritional Access by supporting programs and services for the provision of addressing having reliable access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food and providing nutritional services.

WHEREAS, the Government and the Sponsor solicited Requests for Proposals from public organizations and private non-profit organizations to provide this service through RFP No. 13-2019 – Extended Social Resources (ESR) Grant Program; Priority Area: Food Insecurity and Nutritional Access;

WHEREAS, the Organization submitted a proposal which was deemed by the Government and Sponsor to be one of the best and most responsive proposals to implement and/or provide these services.

WITNESSETH

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein expressed, the Government and the Organization agree as follows:

1. This Agreement shall include the following additional documents, which are attached hereto as exhibits and incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated:

- a. Exhibit A RFP No. 13 2019, consisting of 19 pages
- b. Exhibit B Organization's Formal Response to RFP No. 13 2019,
 consisting of 8 pages

In the event of a conflict between and among the provisions of these documents the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail, followed by Exhibit A, and then Exhibit B.

- 2. Government hereby retains Organization for the period beginning on **July 1**, **2019**, and continuing for a period of one (1) year from that date. The Government may terminate this Agreement at any time and for any reason by providing the Organization with at least thirty (30) days written notice of termination. In such case this Agreement shall terminate thirty (30) days from the date notice is given to the Organization.
- 3. Government shall pay Organization the sum of FORTY THOUSAND and 00/100 Dollars (\$40,000) for the services required by this Agreement, said services being more particularly described in Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit A, one-half (1/2th) of which shall be payable in August 2019 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice, with , one-half (1/2th) payable in January 2020 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice, and detailed mid-year and year-end program reports. First biannual invoice shall be submitted by August 5th, 2019, and second biannual invoice and first six-month detailed program report shall be due January 13th, 2020. A year-end program report shall be submitted by July 17th, 2020. Reports shall reflect the services and programs directly related to the funding provided by Lexington Fayette Urban County Government with emphasis on measurable outcomes, and specifically outlined in the funding application. Forms for both the quarterly financial and program reports will be provided.

- 4. In the event of termination of this Agreement by Government as provided for in paragraph 1 above, Organization shall be entitled to that portion of total compensation due under this Agreement as the service rendered bears to the service required herein.
- 5. Organization shall perform all duties and services included in the Exhibit B Addendum, attached hereto faithfully and satisfactorily at the time, place and for the duration prescribed herein. Compensation paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be used exclusively for the services set forth in the Addendum and for no other purpose. Any alteration in the nature of such services and duties constitutes an amendment to this Agreement and must be in writing signed by both parties. Organization shall keep itself fully informed of all federal and state laws and all municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance of this Agreement, and shall at all times observe and comply with such laws, ordinances and regulations, whether or not such laws, ordinances or regulations are mentioned herein, and
- 6. Organization shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Government, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all liabilities, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, and/or expenses arising out of, from, relating to, and/or based on the Organization's violation of any such laws, ordinances or regulations or Organization's breach of this Agreement.
- 7. Organization represents that it has filed all federal, state and local income tax returns required by law in the legally prescribed time and manner. This Agreement shall not become effective unless and until copies of all of the executed originals of the aforementioned tax returns filed for the Organization have been registered for the current tax year by the Organization in the office of the Sponsor, and the Organization shall not be compensated unless and until such registration has taken place.

- 8. The Organization shall, on such forms as the Sponsor shall provide, submit to Sponsor an annual report and financial statement which summarize the previous year's activities regarding the services enumerated in the addendum attached hereto.
- 9. Books of accounts shall be kept by the Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of the Organization. The books of accounts, together with all bonds, notes, bills, letters and other writings belonging to the Organization, shall be maintained at the principal place of business of the Organization as set forth in this Agreement. Government shall have free and complete access to the books, papers and affairs of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, at all reasonable times, and if it desires, it may have the books and papers of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, audited and examined by auditors, accountants or attorneys. Any examination shall be at the expense of the Government.
- 10. Government may designate such persons as may be necessary to monitor and evaluate the services rendered by the Organization. The Government, its agents and employees, shall, at all times, have unrestricted access to all places where or in which the services required hereunder are being carried on and conducted. Inspection and monitoring of the work by these authorities shall in no manner be presumed to relieve in any degree the responsibility or obligations of Organization, nor to constitute the Organization as an agent of the Government.
- 11. Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, shall prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and shall cause each of its subcontracting agencies to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

- 12. Organization shall adopt a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. The policy shall be given to all employees and clients and shall be posted at all locations where Organization conducts business. The policy shall be submitted to Sponsor for review within thirty (30) days of the execution of this Agreement.
- 13. Organization agrees that it shall apply all funds received by it from the Urban County Government in accordance with the following investment policy guidelines:
 - A. Objectives: Capital preservation with surety of income. Reasonable competitive income consistent with high investment quality and purpose of funds. All investments shall conform with state and local law and regulations and these policies.
 - B. Investment Funds Management: The governing board may elect to either:
 - (1) Manage its investment through its executive director where the size or complexity of funds to be managed is deemed by the board to be within the training, expertise and/or available time capacity of the executive director and the operating staff; or
 - (2) Utilize the professional investment management facilities of a local bank trust department acting in a fiduciary capacity within the same approved investment policies and federal, state, local and trust laws and regulation. The trust department may utilize its regular short-term one hundred percent (100%) US Treasury Fund for daily funds investment.

The election of option 1 or 2 should be made consistent with the relative cost incurred and in the case of option 2 the cost shall be competitive among local trust departments.

- C. Investment Policies - Safety and Prudence.
 - (1) Short-term liquidity funds shall be invested in "riskless" investment, i.e., deposits in Kentucky commercial banks or savings and loan associations that are fully federally insured or deposits collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities with a current market value of

at least one hundred percent (100%), or in direct obligations of U.S. Treasury securities.

Investments shall be diversified according to maturity in order to meet projected cash flow needs.

Collateral pledged to secure uninsured deposits shall be held at a federal reserve bank with the receipt providing absolute control by the agency.

- (2) Retirement funds, endowment funds, long-term capital reserve funds and any other special funds may be held and invested by a local bank trust department under investment objectives and diversification in accordance with the individual nature of the funds and pursuant to the "prudent man" investment rule as well as general trust law.
- (3) All investments shall be reviewed monthly by a finance or investment committee of the agency.
- (4) Local brokerage firms may hold and invest funds provided that investments are located within Kentucky and are full insured.
- D. Audit - All investments shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountant who shall express an opinion as to whether or not investments during the year audited have conformed with state and local law and regulation and with the approved investment policies.
- 14. This Agreement, and Exhibits incorporated herein, contains the entire agreement between the parties, and no statement, promises or inducements made by either party or agent of either party that is not contained in this written Agreement shall be valid and binding; and this Agreement may not be enlarged, modified or altered except in writing signed by the parties and endorsed hereon.
- 15. Organization shall not assign any interest, obligation, or benefit of this Agreement or transfer any interest in the same, whether by assignment or novation, without prior written consent of LFUCG.
- 16. Organization expressly agrees to abide by the General Conditions and Risk Management Provisions included in Exhibit A which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

- 17. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Organization acknowledges and agrees that any claims, legal proceedings or litigation arising in connection with this Agreement or the Services provided hereunder shall be brought solely in Fayette County, Kentucky.
- 18. If any particular provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable, that determination will not affect any other provision hereto, which will be construed in all respects as if the invalid or unenforceable provision were omitted.
- 19. Notice Any written notice required by the Agreement shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following:

Proposals, once submitted, may not be withdrawn for a period of sixty (60) calendar days.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, and to waive technicalities and informalities when such waiver is determined by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to be in its best interest.

Electronic signature online at https://lexingtonky.ionwave.net constitutes acceptance by the Proposer of terms, conditions and requirements set forth herein.

Pre-Proposal Meeting will be held on **Monday, April 8th, 2019** at **8:30AM** at the Phoenix Building 3rd Floor Conference Room, 100 East Vine Street, Lexington, KY 40507.

Minor exceptions may not eliminate the proposal. Any exceptions to the specifications established herein shall be listed in detail on a separate sheet and attached hereto. The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government shall determine whether any exception is minor.

Please do not contact any LFUCG staff member or any other person involved in the selection process other than the designated contact person(s) regarding the project contemplated under this RFP while this RFP is open and a selection has not been finalized. Any attempt to do so may result in disqualification of the firm's submittal for consideration.

Laws and Regulations

All applicable state laws, municipal ordinances and regulations of all authorities having jurisdiction over the project shall apply to the contract, and shall be deemed to be incorporated herein by reference.

Equal Employment Opportunity

The Entity (regardless of whether construction contractor, non-construction contractor or supplier) agrees to provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, to prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and to promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program from itself and each of its subcontracting agents. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act

The Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1978 (KRS 45.560-45.640) requires that any "county, city, town, school district, water district, hospital district, or other political subdivision of the state shall include in directly or indirectly publicly funded contracts for supplies, materials, services, or equipment hereinafter entered into the following provisions:

"During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;
- (2) The contractor will state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractors that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;

- (3) The contractor will post notices in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, setting forth the provision of the nondiscrimination clauses required by this section; and
- (4) The contractor will send a notice to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under the nondiscrimination clauses."

The Act further provides:

"KRS 45.610. Hiring minorities -- Information required

- (1) For the length of the contract, each contractor shall hire minorities from other sources within the drawing area, should the union with which he has collective bargaining agreements be unwilling to supply sufficient minorities to satisfy the agreed upon goals and timetables.
- (2) Each contractor shall, for the length of the contract, furnish such information as required by KRS 45.560 to KRS 45.640 and by such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto and will permit access to all books and records pertaining to his employment practices and work sites by the contracting agency and the department for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with KRS 45.560 to 45.640 and such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto.

KRS 45.620. Action against contractor -- Hiring of minority contractor or subcontractor

- (1) If any contractor is found by the department to have engaged in an unlawful practice under this chapter during the course of performing under a contract or subcontract covered under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the department shall so certify to the contracting agency and such certification shall be binding upon the contracting agency unless it is reversed in the course of judicial review.
- (2) If the contractor is found to have committed an unlawful practice under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the contracting agency may cancel or terminate the contract, conditioned upon a program for future compliance approved by the contracting agency and the department. The contracting agency may declare such a contractor ineligible to bid on further contracts with that agency until such time as the

contractor complies in full with the requirements of KRS 45.560 to 45.640.

(3) The equal employment provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 may be met in part by a contractor by subcontracting to a minority contractor or subcontractor. For the provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640, a minority contractor or subcontractor shall mean a business that is owned and controlled by one or more persons disadvantaged by racial or ethnic circumstances.

KRS 45.630 Termination of existing employee not required, when

Any provision of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 notwithstanding, no contractor shall be required to terminate an existing employee upon proof that employee was employed prior to the date of the contract.

KRS 45.640 Minimum skills

Nothing in KRS 45.560 to 45.640 shall require a contractor to hire anyone who fails to demonstrate the minimum skills required to perform a particular job."

It is recommended that all of the provisions above quoted be included as <u>special conditions</u> in each contract. In the case of a contract exceeding \$250,000, the contractor is required to furnish evidence that his workforce in Kentucky is representative of the available workforce in the area from which he draws employees, or to supply an Affirmative Action plan which will achieve such representation during the life of the contract.

LFUCG Non-Appropriation Clause

Contractor acknowledges that the LFUCG is a governmental entity, and the contract validity is based upon the availability of public funding under the authority of its statutory mandate.

In the event that public funds are unavailable and not appropriated for the performance of the LFUCG's obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically expire without penalty to the LFUCG thirty (30) days after written notice to Contractor of the unavailability and non-appropriation of public funds. It is expressly agreed that the LFUCG shall not activate this non-appropriation provision for its convenience or to circumvent the requirements of this contract, but only as an emergency fiscal measure during a substantial fiscal crisis, which affects generally its governmental operations.

In the event of a change in the LFUCG's statutory authority, mandate and mandated functions, by state and federal legislative or regulatory action, which adversely affects the LFUCG's authority to continue its obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically terminate without penalty to the LFUCG upon written notice to Contractor of such limitation or change in the LFUCG's legal authority.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGREEMENT

The Law

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government practices Equal Opportunity in recruiting, hiring and promoting. It is the Government's intent to affirmatively provide employment opportunities for those individuals who have previously not been allowed to enter into the mainstream of society. Because of its importance to the local Government, this policy carries the full endorsement of the Mayor, Commissioners, Directors and all supervisory personnel. GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Each Respondent shall comply with all Federal, State & Local regulations concerning this type of service or good.

The Respondent agrees to comply with all statutes, rules, and regulations governing safe and healthful working conditions, including the Occupational Health and Safety Act of 1970, 29 U.S.C. 650 et. seq., as amended, and KRS Chapter 338. The Respondent also agrees to notify the LFUCG in writing immediately upon detection of any unsafe and/or unhealthful working conditions at the job site. The Respondent agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the LFUCG harmless from all penalties, fines or other expenses arising out of the alleged violation of said laws.

- 2. Failure to submit ALL forms and information required in this RFP may be grounds for disqualification.
- 3. Addenda: All addenda, if any, shall be considered in making the proposal, and such addenda shall be made a part of this RFP. Before submitting a proposal, it is incumbent upon each proposer to be informed as to whether any addenda have been issued, and the failure to cover in the bid any such addenda may result in disqualification of that proposal.
- 4. Proposal Reservations: LFUCG reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, to award in whole or part, and to waive minor immaterial defects in proposals. LFUCG may consider any alternative proposal that meets its basic needs.
- 5. Liability: LFUCG is not responsible for any cost incurred by a Respondent in the preparation of proposals.
- 6. Changes/Alterations: Respondent may change or withdraw a proposal at any time prior to the opening; however, no oral modifications will be allowed. Only letters, or other formal written requests for modifications or corrections of a previously submitted proposal which is addressed in the same manner as the proposal, and received by LFUCG prior to the scheduled closing time for receipt of proposals, will be accepted. The proposal, when opened, will then be corrected in accordance with such written request(s), provided that the written request is contained in a sealed envelope which is plainly marked "modifications of proposal".
- 7. Clarification of Submittal: LFUCG reserves the right to obtain clarification of any point in a bid or to obtain additional information from a Respondent.
- 8. Bribery Clause: By his/her signature on the bid, Respondent certifies that no employee of his/hers, any affiliate or Subcontractor, has bribed or

attempted to bribe an officer or employee of the LFUCG.

- 9. Additional Information: While not necessary, the Respondent may include any product brochures, software documentation, sample reports, or other documentation that may assist LFUCG in better understanding and evaluating the Respondent's response. Additional documentation shall not serve as a substitute for other documentation which is required by this RFP to be submitted with the proposal,
- 10. Ambiguity, Conflict or other Errors in RFP: If a Respondent discovers any ambiguity, conflict, discrepancy, omission or other error in the RFP, it shall immediately notify LFUCG of such error in writing and request modification or clarification of the document if allowable by the LFUCG.
- 11. Agreement to RFP Terms: In submitting this proposal, the Respondent agrees that it has carefully examined the specifications and all provisions relating to the work to be done attached hereto and made part of this proposal. By acceptance of a Contract/Grant under this RFP, proposer states that it understands the meaning, intent and requirements of the RFP and agrees to the same. The successful Respondent shall warrant that it familiar with and understands all provisions herein and shall warrant that it can comply with them. No additional compensation to Respondent shall be authorized for services or expenses reasonably covered under these provisions that the proposer omits from its Proposal.
- 12. Cancellation: If the services to be performed hereunder by the Respondent are not performed in an acceptable manner to the LFUCG, the LFUCG may cancel this contract for cause by providing written notice to the proposer, giving at least thirty (30) days notice of the proposed cancellation and the reasons for same. During that time period, the proposer may seek to bring the performance of services hereunder to a level that is acceptable to the LFUCG, and the LFUCG may rescind the cancellation if such action is in its best interest.

A. Termination for Cause

- (1) LFUCG may terminate a contract because of the contractor's failure to perform its contractual duties
- (2) If a contractor is determined to be in default, LFUCG shall notify the contractor of the determination in writing, and may include a specified date by which the contractor shall cure the identified deficiencies. LFUCG may proceed with termination if the contractor fails to cure the deficiencies within the specified time.

- (3) A default in performance by a contractor for which a contract may be terminated shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to:
 - (a) Failure to perform the contract according to its terms, conditions and specifications;
 - (b) Failure to make delivery within the time specified or according to a delivery schedule fixed by the contract;
 - (c) Late payment or nonpayment of bills for labor, materials, supplies, or equipment furnished in connection with a contract for construction services as evidenced by mechanics' liens filed pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 376, or letters of indebtedness received from creditors by the purchasing agency;
 - (d) Failure to diligently advance the work under a contract for construction services:
 - (e) The filing of a bankruptcy petition by or against the contractor; or
 - (f) Actions that endanger the health, safely or welfare of the LFUCG or its citizens.

B. At Will Termination

Notwithstanding the above provisions, the LFUCG may terminate this contract at will in accordance with the law upon providing thirty (30) days written notice of that intent, Payment for services or goods received prior to termination shall be made by the LFUCG provided these goods or services were provided in a manner acceptable to the LFUCG. Payment for those goods and services shall not be unreasonably withheld.

- 13. Assignment of Contract: The contractor shall not assign or subcontract any portion of the Contract without the express written consent of LFUCG. Any purported assignment or subcontract in violation hereof shall be void. It is expressly acknowledged that LFUCG shall never be required or obligated to consent to any request for assignment or subcontract; and further that such refusal to consent can be for any or no reason, fully within the sole discretion of LFUCG.
- 14. No Waiver: No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege hereunder, nor any single or partial exercise thereof, nor the exercise of any other right, remedy, power or privilege shall operate as a waiver hereof or thereof. No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege under or in respect of this Contract shall affect the rights, remedies, powers or privileges of LFUCG hereunder or shall operate as a waiver thereof.

- 15. Authority to do Business: The Respondent must be a duly organized and authorized to do business under the laws of Kentucky. Respondent must be in good standing and have full legal capacity to provide the services specified under this Contract. The Respondent must have all necessary right and lawful authority to enter into this Contract for the full term hereof and that proper corporate or other action has been duly taken authorizing the Respondent to enter into this Contract. The Respondent will provide LFUCG with a copy of a corporate resolution authorizing this action and a letter from an attorney confirming that the proposer is authorized to do business in the State of Kentucky if requested. All proposals must be signed by a duly authorized officer, agent or employee of the Respondent.
- 16. Governing Law: This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In the event of any proceedings regarding this Contract, the Parties agree that the venue shall be the Fayette County Circuit Court or the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky, Lexington Division. All parties expressly consent to personal jurisdiction and venue in such Court for the limited and sole purpose of proceedings relating to this Contract or any rights or obligations arising thereunder. Service of process may be accomplished by following the procedures prescribed by law.
- 17. Ability to Meet Obligations: Respondent affirmatively states that there are no actions, suits or proceedings of any kind pending against Respondent or, to the knowledge of the Respondent, threatened against the Respondent before or by any court, governmental body or agency or other tribunal or authority which would, if adversely determined, have a materially adverse effect on the authority or ability of Respondent to perform its obligations under this Contract, or which question the legality, validity or enforceability hereof or thereof.
- 18. Contractor understands and agrees that its employees, agents, or subcontractors are not employees of LFUCG for any purpose whatsoever. Contractor is an independent contractor at all times during the performance of the services specified.
- 19. If any term or provision of this Contract shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of the contract shall remain in full force and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.

5.1 Program Proposal & Design

5.1.1 Needs Statement—Purpose of the Program Proposal / Problem Statement

Families in the northwest corner of Lexington's 40508 zip code face a significant burden in accessing affordable, healthy food choices. Here over 50% of residents in our Census tract have incomes below the poverty line and the unemployment rate is 15%. Public transportation is limited and this section of town is classified as a USDA food desert, with no grocery store within a mile. Additionally, area schools fall under Community Eligibility Provision from the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act. Centrally-located, FoodChain's Kitchen is directly adjacent to Coolavin Apartments, a 104 unit, low-income, Section 8 housing complex. Currently, the closest location for the many children who live in the area to get summer meals is over a half mile away, across one of Lexington's busiest streets. These families need improved access to fresh, affordable food so they may thrive in their community.

GleanKY and Feeding Kentucky have successfully expanded access to fresh produce to local populations by accepting large quantities of seconds produce from farms and groceries, then redistributing it to feeding organizations. Building on this, FoodChain's Processing Kitchen works to 1) increase usability and consumer access of this collected produce through processing into frozen or dehydrated products; 2) provide education on using these frozen/dried foods through classes and cooking demonstrations. Furthermore, FoodChain offers a monthly free Community Meal, hosting neighbors to share in a home-cooked meal while also engaging in conversation and fellowship.

5.1.2 Service Delivery Model

To address our communities limited fresh food access and nutritional literacy, FoodChain will provide a two pronged approach.

First, our Get Fresh: Meal Kits, offered for 20 weeks (June - Oct). These "ready to cook" meals will incorporate locally-sourced ingredients, priced affordably for low-income residents. They will be SNAP eligible, and WIC and Senior Voucher eligible too. Each Kit will include: a healthy protein source; a whole grain or complex carbohydrate, local vegetables, and local fruit. In addition, anything needed for seasoning, sauces, or accompaniment will be included, along with detailed and easy to follow directions. Meals take 15-30 min to prepare and yield 2 adult size servings per kit. To incentivize participation, families are entered into a raffle each week to win items such as knife sets, pots, cutting boards, blenders, or crock pots. They will also receive reusable, cooler bags for transport.

For 11 weeks of the session (June - Aug) we will be an official KDE Summer Feeding Site. Twice a week, 50 youth can partake of a free, uniquely local, freshly prepared lunch. In addition to the stringent KDE nutritional guidelines that we'll abide by, we will also partner with other local organizations doing work in the Northside to provide meaningful engagement for the kids such as the E7 kids cafe, Sisohpromatem, Seedleaf, On the Move Art Studio, and more. Together, these programs provide a fun way for our neighborhood to receive, afford, and, most importantly, enjoy the bounty of Kentucky farms and the nutrition of local produce.

5.1.3 Client Eligibility and Requirements

Eligibility for our Get Fresh: Meal Kits is based solely on self-professed income levels or receiving SNAP, WIC, or Senior Vouchers as a form of payment. There will be meal kits available priced below market rates for those who designate themselves as low income or needing assistance. Others who claim to be of a comfortable income level will pay market price for their meal kit. Those who would like to can pay a "Pay it Forward" price that includes market price + the difference in market price and the low income price.

For the Summer Meal, nothing is required of clients besides participation. As an officially sanctioned Summer Meal Site, our location, qualifies by being in a designated Census Tract Priority area based on income levels and students who qualify for Free and Reduced Lunches. The expectation for Summer Food Service Meals requires that meals must be consumed on site to be counted, however the Meal Kits do not.

5.1.4 Evidence-Based/Best Practice

A recent study published by the Rudd Center for Food Policy and Obesity at the University of Connecticut found that food insecure families received and consumed more nutritious meals when ingredients were bundled together as meal kits, in part because of the convenience that the Kits provided as well as the nutritional guidance by the recipes offered. This study confirmed what has been anecdotally observed that meal kits can serve as a valuable tool in addressing nutrition and access deficits, while also helping to minimize waste, decrease associated healthcare costs, save time and labor, and help establish appropriate portion sizes.

Meanwhile for the Summer Feeding Program, studies, such as those from the Wilder Research, have long confirmed that youth living in food-insecure households, lacking the proper nutrition, can lead to increased risk of poor performance in school, behavioral problems, and chronic illnesses such as obesity. Poor nutrition has been shown to have an impact on student outcomes. Furthermore, summertime can prove to be a particular challenge as students don't have the regular availability of school lunches. The Federal Summer Feeding Program serves as a critical combatant to this challenge, and has the potential to mitigate causes of poor performance in school. By partnering with other organizations who provide educational services, as well as engaging them with fresh food and cooking, we can help mitigate the "summer slide" or the loss of knowledge that commonly accompanies lack of academic activity in youth over the summer months without regular academic stimulation.

5.2 Program Measures & Evaluation

5.2.1 Service Efficacy & Desired Outcomes

Through both our Meal Kits and Summer Feeding Site, we hope to help our clients achieve increased access to nutritious meals. For the Summer/Fall of 2019 (20 week time period), our goal is to provide 50 families with one complete meal kit a week that contains at least two servings of local fruits and vegetables, as well as healthy proteins and grains. Similarly for the 11 week Summer Feed Program Calendar, we will provide 2 meal offerings a week, aiming to feed 50 students at each.

Our service philosophy is that we must make this product as easy to use, find, and afford in order to make the goal of one Meal Kit a week for them and their families. We know that if this product is not tasty, easy, and affordable that this service will not work, so we will continue to adapt the program based on feedback we receive to ensure that these meals are able to benefit the desired recipients. Successful delivery of these services will involve "repeat customers" of our weekly Meal Kits, with a target of 60% of our recipients to purchase at least 3 meal kits over the 20 week offering.

For the Summer Feeding Meal offerings, we will define success as continued consumption of the meals offered, with a target of 75% of the meals offered to be consumed in entirety while at our facility.

5.2.2 Client Empowerment & Community Impact

FoodChain's services outlined here all aim to increase the amount of local fruits and vegetables that food insecure families in the food desert community that surrounds us can access and eat. Most immediately, these clients can gain more food security with regular access to high quality, nutritious meals. Further afield, while we will not be directly measuring this, we aim to positively impact recipients health and well-being through access and education of nutritious foods with more options for our neighbors to consume fewer highly processed fast food and convenience food items.

We also aim to make a meaningful difference by providing a community space where people can come, share nutritious meals, discuss the food on a regular basis, learn more about Kentucky agriculture, meet farmers, meet area chefs, connect to needed resources and educators, as well as simply enjoy more time in a space that is all about sharing and community empowerment. While the effects of this can be difficult to quantify, we believe it is very important to create these types of spaces for our community, so that folks feel that they are being invested in, while at the same time having a feeling of belonging in a community that they want to invest in. This sense of ownership in your community leads to increased resilience, better support systems for families in need of assistance and a stronger food system across the board.

5.2.3 Data Assessment & Quality Improvement

Data collection will happen at each of our Summer Food Service Meals (2x/week) as well as our Get Fresh Meal Kits days (1x/week). We plan on having very simple ways of getting community input on both qualitative and quantitative measures for evaluating the efficacy of this program, involving anonymous sticker surveys to assess perceived benefits of the program. We will also have clients anonymously respond with stickers to questions inquiring about the frequency their diets have included vegetables, how many servings they're eating, how their health has been, etc. By asking such questions at regular intervals throughout the program we will be able to determine if clients report an increase in consumption and any self reported health benefits.

Based on these types of questions, we will be able to constantly evaluate the program, easily and comfortably collect consistent feedback, which will then be used for any needed alterations to the running of the program. This will also give us long term data to be able to track over the entire 20 weeks of Meal Kits and 11 weeks of Summer Meals, so we can see how effective this was over all in improving the health, access to fresh foods, and improved community fellowship in our neighborhood.

Finally, we will also keep metrics on the number of kits distributed, meals served, children and families returning, and pounds of local food dispersed.

Leandra Forman- Operations Manager of FoodChain will coordinate this program. Duties include: receiving training from KDE to be a Summer Food Service Sponsor and Site, developing the meal kit plan, working with farmers and distributors for procurement, organizing materials to partner with K-VIP, creating recipes with educational material, ensuring that proper nutrition is covered, and coordinating evaluations and reports. Ms. Forman has worked at FoodChain for 4 years and has helped successfully plan, prepare, execute, and evaluate many other programs in line with our mission. She also has 15+ years of experience in professional kitchens.

Becca Self- Executive Director of FoodChain will oversee the execution of this program. Duties include: maintaining accounts, hiring seasonal kitchen staff, administrative components of the programming, collaborating with the Ms. Forman to work within budgets, find sustainable funding sources, and measure outcomes and overall impact of FoodChain's work. She founded FoodChain in 2012 after serving for 3 years as an Educational Director, with an additional 7 years as a classroom teacher. Ms. Self maintains the main administrative and development efforts of FoodChain, including fundraising and financial operations.

Kitchen Staff (TBD)- will be responsible for cooking the Summer Food Service Meals, creating processed local fruit and vegetable products, and doing prep for meal kit assembly, as well as maintaining the safety and sanitation of the facility. They will be required to have their Food Handler's Permit through Lexington-Fayette Health Department and receive Civil Rights Training. Kitchen staff will also assist in the promotion of the programs.

5.3.2 Partnership & Resource Leverage

We partner both informally and formally with many of the local organizations already working in nutritious food access: Bluegrass Farm to Table, the Double Dollars program, GleanKY, Farms to Food Banks, Fayette County Health Department, Lexington Farmers Market, Fayette County Farm to School Council, Kentucky Dept of Ag, and FCPS. We currently also work with many educational and service organizations for recruitment and support of program participants such as Fayette County Public Schools Family Resource Coordinators, Step by Step, Lexington Housing Authority, Community Action Council, Chrysalis House, Greenhouse 17, etc. We have a core group of dedicated volunteers that assist with our kids cooking classes, our educational tabling and outreach, our community meals, and our aquaponics farm, as well as interns, volunteers, and Americorps service members who do local food processing in our kitchen.

We also receive in kind donations regularly from Williams Sonoma, funding from Traditional Bank, the William R Kenan, Jr Charitable Trust, EE Murray Foundation, and others. We are in the second year of a three year Local Food Promotion Program Grant through the USDA, the scope of which falls directly in line with the programs outlined here. We have the continued fundraising support of our Board of Directors as well as established relationships with VisitLex and strong ties to local farmers and chefs, including Ouita Michel and her family of restaurants.

5.3.3 Outreach & Inclusion Strategy

We are located at the intersection of Jefferson St and West 6th St. This area is a major thoroughfare for the specific population these services are intended for, located in a residential area between section 8 housing and nearby city and school bus stops, and adjacent to working class family homes. This makes our facility convenient, especially for clients with limited transportation or mobility. The hours of meal service will be posted on a banner outside our door, on our window, and available through our Facebook and website, in addition to being listed on all material put out through Kentucky Dept of Education and neighborhood schools. Our facilities are fully ADA compliant, and include tables and workstations of varying heights for the diversity of age and ability we serve. Finally, while the target population is overwhelmingly English speaking (over 95%), there are several communities nearby who are primarily Spanish-speaking, so we always ensure that all our recipes and flyers are in both English and Spanish. We also clearly post our anti-discrimination policies and all of our Summer Food Service Workers will receive Civil Rights training as part of their onboarding process.

Combined, these efforts are critical for raising the awareness in the community that this type of food is not out of reach, regardless of your housing situation or income level.
