

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky November 16, 2023

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on November 16, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Gray, LeGris, Lynch, Monarrez, Plomin, Reynolds, Sevigny, Sheehan, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, Elliott Baxter, and Fogle . Absent were Council Member Worley and Vice Mayor Wu.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 125-2023 through 130-2023, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 590-2023 through 609-2023, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Mark Johnson, Senior Pastor of Central Baptist Church.

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At 6:04 p.m., Vice Mayor Wu joined the meeting.

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Upon motion by Ms. Gray, seconded by Ms. Fogle, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the September 28, October 12, October 26, and November 2, 2023 Council Meetings were approved.

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Mayor Gorton asked Head Coach Bernadette (Bernie) Dugan and Assistant Coach Wendy Mason of the Lexington Catholic Girls Cross Country team to join her at the podium, along with Mr. Sevigny, and read a Proclamation declaring November 16, 2023 as Lexington Catholic High School Girls Cross Country Day in Lexington.

Coach Dugan spoke about the dedication of the athletes and thanked the Council and Mayor for the recognition.

Mr. Sevigny thanked them for their constituency, commented on their winning streak and offered his congratulations.

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Mayor Gorton asked James Ndayishimiye and Coach Caleb Joy to join her at the podium, along with Mr. Sevigny, and presented James Ndayishimiye and Coach Joy with a Spirit of Lexington Award.

Mayor Gorton spoke about how Ndayishimiye covered 3.1 hilly miles in 15:22.38 to win the 2023 Class 3A Region 6 Boys Cross Country Championship in the State of Kentucky. She also thanked Coach Caleb Joy for his hard work.

Mr. Sevigny spoke about the young runner's story.

Coach Joy spoke of James's recent immigration to the U.S. and noted his many accomplishments in the short time he's been here.
