

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky November 18, 2025

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on November 18, 2025 at 5:22 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Lynch, Morton, Reynolds, Sevigny, Sheehan, Wu, Beasley, Boone, Brown, Curtis, Ellinger, Elliott Baxter, Hale, Higgins-Hord, and LeGris.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 084-2025 through 095-2025, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 483-2025 through 531-2025, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Councilmember Sevigny.

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Upon motion by Ms. Reynolds, seconded by Ms. LeGris, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the October 23, 2025 Council Meeting were approved.

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Mayor Gorton asked Hunter Wood Lisle to join her at the podium, along with Ms. Reynolds, and read a Proclamation declaring November 18, 2025 as Arthur Murray Dance Studio Day in Lexington.

Mayor Gorton shared the long history of the dance studio and its impact on the community throughout the years, noting Mr. Lisle opened the studio twenty-five years ago and, in that time, gave generously to important causes in the Lexington area. She thanked Mr. Lisle for his contribution to the public through private instruction and charity work.

Mr. Lisle thanked the Mayor and Council for the recognition and shared his experience of dance instruction throughout his career.

Ms. Reynolds shared her fond memories of dance lessons, noting the studio's growth, accomplishments, and impact within the City.

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Mayor Gorton asked Dir. Laura Hagg, Capacity Development and Governance at the International City/ County Management Association (ICCMA), and Jada Griggs, Program Manager Sr., Div. of Environmental Services- LFUCG Sustainability Section, to join her at the podium and announced that City of Lexington recently became the second SolSmart designee in Kentucky through its efforts to reach net-zero carbon emissions by 2050, as outlined in the community's Comprehensive Plan. She also stated that the community earned this prestigious designation by supporting a community-wide solarization campaign, streamlining permitting processes, and training municipal staff.

Dir. Hagg thanked the Council and Mayor for their recognition and shared some of the efforts made by the ICCMA organization. She spoke of the SolSmart program, which strives to make solar energy more accessible throughout communities, expressed her enthusiasm for the City's new designation, and extended her respect and congratulations to the City.

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Terry Mullims, Dist. 1, spoke in support of the additional funding for Extended Social Resources.

Revenue to adopt any amended policies or procedures to effectuate the purposes of this Ordinance, all effective upon passage of Council was on the docket for second reading.

Ms. Lynch made a motion, seconded by Ms. Higgins-Hord, and approved by unanimous vote, to separate the ordinance for voting.

Ms. Lynch moved to amend the Ordinance to state Section 13-96(b)(5) to provide that an applicant for a license shall provide the maximum occupancy of each recovery residence, which may include such occupancy approved by the Board of Adjustment as a reasonable accommodation to the applicant under the Fair Housing Act. The motion was seconded by Mr. Hale.

Ms. Reynolds asked about the necessity of the amendment. Michael Cravens, Dept. of Law, responded.

Ms. Sheehan stated her support for the amendment.

Ms. Lynch shared her motive behind making the amendment.

The motion passed by majority vote (Ms. Reynolds and Mr. Morton voted No).

An Ordinance amending the following Section of Chapter 12 of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances pertaining to Section 12-5 related to penalties to reduce the time period in which to assess citations and civil fines, and providing for an administrative cost of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), effective upon passage of Council.
