

PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement"), made and entered into on the 27th day of AUGUST MONTH 2021, by and between the **LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT**, an urban county government of the Commonwealth of Kentucky created pursuant to KRS chapter 67A (hereinafter "Government"), 200 East Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507, on behalf of its Department of Social Services (hereinafter "Sponsor"), and **GREENHOUSE17**, with offices located **PO BOX 55190, LEXINGTON KY 40555**, (hereinafter "Organization").

WITNESSETH

That for and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein expressed, the Government and the Organization agree as follows:

1. Government hereby retains Organization for the period beginning on **July 1, 2021**, and continuing for a period of one (1) year from that date unless within that period Government gives the Organization thirty (30) days written notice of termination of this Agreement in which case this Agreement shall terminate thirty (30) days from the date notice is given to the Organization.

2. Government shall pay Organization the sum of **\$49,000** for the services required by this Agreement, said services being more particularly described in the Addendum attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit A, one-half (1/2th) of which shall be payable in September 2021 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice, with one-half (1/2th) payable in January 2022 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice and the first six month detailed program report., **The first invoice required by this section shall be submitted by September 17th, 2021. The second invoice and the first six month detailed program report shall be due January 21st 2022. A detailed program report shall be submitted by April 15th, 2022. A year-end program report shall be submitted by July**

22nd, 2022. Failure to submit the April 2022 program report and the July 2022 year-end program report shall result in the Organization repaying one-half (1/2th) of total funds provided under this Agreement. Reports shall reflect the services and programs directly related to the funding provided by Lexington Fayette Urban County Government with emphasis on measurable outcomes, and specifically outlined in the funding application. Forms for both the quarterly financial and program reports will be provided.

3. In the event of termination of this Agreement by Government as provided for in paragraph 1 above, Organization shall be entitled to that portion of total compensation due under this Agreement as the service rendered bears to the service required herein.

4. Organization shall perform all duties and services included in the Addendum attached hereto faithfully and satisfactorily at the time, place and for the duration prescribed herein. Compensation paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be used exclusively for the services set forth in the Addendum and for no other purpose. Any alteration in the nature of such services and duties constitutes an amendment to this Agreement and must be in writing signed by both parties. Organization shall keep itself fully informed of all federal and state laws and all municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance of this Agreement, and shall at all times observe and comply with such laws, ordinances and regulations, whether or not such laws, ordinances or regulations are mentioned herein, and

5. Organization shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Government, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all liabilities, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, and/or expenses arising out of, from, relating to, and/or based on the Organization's violation of any such laws, ordinances or regulations or Organization's breach of this Agreement.

6. Organization represents that it has filed all federal, state and local income tax returns required by law in the legally prescribed time and manner. This Agreement shall not become effective unless and until copies of all of the executed originals of the aforementioned tax returns filed for the Organization have been registered for the current tax year by the Organization in the office of the Sponsor, and the Organization shall not be compensated unless and until such registration has taken place.

7. The Organization shall, on such forms as the Sponsor shall provide, submit to Sponsor an annual report and financial statement which summarize the previous year's activities regarding the services enumerated in the addendum attached hereto.

8. Books of accounts shall be kept by the Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of the Organization. The books of accounts, together with all bonds, notes, bills, letters and other writings belonging to the Organization, shall be maintained at the principal place of business of the Organization as set forth in this Agreement. Government shall have free and complete access to the books, papers and affairs of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, at all reasonable times, and if it desires, it may have the books and papers of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, audited and examined by auditors, accountants or attorneys. Any examination shall be at the expense of the Government.

9. Government may designate such persons as may be necessary to monitor and evaluate the services rendered by the Organization. The Government, its agents and employees, shall, at all times, have unrestricted access to all places where or in which the services required hereunder are being carried on and conducted. Inspection and monitoring of the work by these authorities shall in no manner be presumed to relieve in any degree the

responsibility or obligations of Organization, nor to constitute the Organization as an agent of the Government.

10. Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, shall prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and shall cause each of its subcontracting agencies to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

11. Organization shall adopt a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. The policy shall be given to all employees and clients and shall be posted at all locations where Organization conducts business. The policy shall be submitted to Sponsor for review within thirty (30) days of the execution of this Agreement.

12. This instrument, and the Addendum incorporated herein, contains the entire agreement between the parties, and no statement, promises or inducements made by either party or agent of either party that is not contained in this written Agreement shall be valid and binding; and this Agreement may not be enlarged, modified or altered except in writing signed by the parties and endorsed hereon.

13. Organization agrees that it shall apply all funds received by it from the Urban County Government in accordance with the following investment policy guidelines:

- A. Objectives: Capital preservation with surety of income. Reasonable competitive income consistent with high investment quality and purpose of funds. All investments shall conform with state and local law and regulations and these policies.
- B. Investment Funds Management: The governing board may elect to either:

(1) Manage its investment through its executive director where the size or complexity of funds to be managed is deemed by the board to be within the training, expertise and/or available time capacity of the executive director and the operating staff; or

(2) Utilize the professional investment management facilities of a local bank trust department acting in a fiduciary capacity within the same approved investment policies and federal, state, local and trust laws and regulation. The trust department may utilize its regular short-term one hundred percent (100%) US Treasury Fund for daily funds investment.

The election of option 1 or 2 should be made consistent with the relative cost incurred and in the case of option 2 the cost shall be competitive among local trust departments.

C. Investment Policies - - Safety and Prudence.

(1) Short-term liquidity funds shall be invested in "riskless" investment, i.e., deposits in Kentucky commercial banks or savings and loan associations that are fully federally insured or deposits collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities with a current market value of at least one hundred percent (100%), or in direct obligations of U.S. Treasury securities.

Investments shall be diversified according to maturity in order to meet projected cash flow needs.

Collateral pledged to secure uninsured deposits shall be held at a federal reserve bank with the receipt providing absolute control by the agency.

(2) Retirement funds, endowment funds, long-term capital reserve funds and any other special funds may be held and invested by a local bank trust department under investment objectives and diversification in accordance with the individual nature of the funds and pursuant to the "prudent man" investment rule as well as general trust law.

(3) All investments shall be reviewed monthly by a finance or investment committee of the agency.

(4) Local brokerage firms may hold and invest funds provided that investments are located within Kentucky and are full insured.

D. Audit - - All investments shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountant who shall express an opinion as to whether or not investments during the year audited have conformed with state and local law and regulation and with the approved investment policies.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government hereby requests proposals for **RFP #12-2021 Food Insecurity & Nutritional Access – Extended Social Resources (ESR) Grant Program** to be provided in accordance with terms, conditions and specifications established herein.

Proposals will be received **online only** at <https://lexingtonky.ionwave.net> until **2:00 PM**, prevailing local time, on **May 14, 2021**.

Proposals received after the date and time set for opening proposals will not be considered for award of a contract/grant. It is the sole responsibility of the Proposer to assure that his/her proposal is submitted online before the date and time set for opening proposals.

Additional copies of this Request For Proposals are available from the Division of Central Purchasing, Room 338 Government Center, 200 East Main Street, Lexington, KY 40507, (859)-258-3320, at no charge.

Proposals, once submitted, may not be withdrawn for a period of sixty (60) calendar days.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, and to waive technicalities and informalities when such waiver is determined by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to be in its best interest.

Electronic signature online at <https://lexingtonky.ionwave.net> constitutes acceptance by the Proposer of terms, conditions and requirements set forth herein.

Pre-Proposal Meeting will be held on **April 30th, 2021 at 10:00AM EST** via Zoom (see section 3.1 in Scope of Work document for meeting link).

Minor exceptions may not eliminate the proposal. Any exceptions to the specifications established herein shall be listed in detail on a separate sheet and attached hereto. The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government shall determine whether any exception is minor.

Please do not contact any LFUCG staff member or any other person involved in the selection process other than the designated contact person(s) regarding the project contemplated under this RFP while this RFP is open and a selection has not been finalized. Any attempt to do so may result in disqualification of the firm's submittal for consideration.

Laws and Regulations

All applicable state laws, municipal ordinances and regulations of all authorities having jurisdiction over the project shall apply to the contract, and shall be deemed to be incorporated herein by reference.

Equal Employment Opportunity

The Entity (regardless of whether construction contractor, non-construction contractor or supplier) agrees to provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, to prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and to promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program from itself and each of its subcontracting agents. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act

The Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1978 (KRS 45.560-45.640) requires that any "county, city, town, school district, water district, hospital district, or other political subdivision of the state shall include in directly or indirectly publicly funded contracts for supplies, materials, services, or equipment hereinafter entered into the following provisions:

"During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;
- (2) The contractor will state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractors that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;

(3) The contractor will post notices in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, setting forth the provision of the nondiscrimination clauses required by this section; and

(4) The contractor will send a notice to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under the nondiscrimination clauses."

The Act further provides:

"KRS 45.610. Hiring minorities -- Information required

(1) For the length of the contract, each contractor shall hire minorities from other sources within the drawing area, should the union with which he has collective bargaining agreements be unwilling to supply sufficient minorities to satisfy the agreed upon goals and timetables.

(2) Each contractor shall, for the length of the contract, furnish such information as required by KRS 45.560 to KRS 45.640 and by such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto and will permit access to all books and records pertaining to his employment practices and work sites by the contracting agency and the department for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with KRS 45.560 to 45.640 and such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto.

KRS 45.620. Action against contractor -- Hiring of minority contractor or subcontractor

(1) If any contractor is found by the department to have engaged in an unlawful practice under this chapter during the course of performing under a contract or subcontract covered under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the department shall so certify to the contracting agency and such certification shall be binding upon the contracting agency unless it is reversed in the course of judicial review.

(2) If the contractor is found to have committed an unlawful practice under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the contracting agency may cancel or terminate the contract, conditioned upon a program for future compliance approved by the contracting agency and the department. The contracting agency may declare such a contractor ineligible to bid on further contracts with that agency until such time as the

contractor complies in full with the requirements of KRS 45.560 to 45.640.

(3) The equal employment provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 may be met in part by a contractor by subcontracting to a minority contractor or subcontractor. For the provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640, a minority contractor or subcontractor shall mean a business that is owned and controlled by one or more persons disadvantaged by racial or ethnic circumstances.

KRS 45.630 Termination of existing employee not required, when

Any provision of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 notwithstanding, no contractor shall be required to terminate an existing employee upon proof that employee was employed prior to the date of the contract.

KRS 45.640 Minimum skills

Nothing in KRS 45.560 to 45.640 shall require a contractor to hire anyone who fails to demonstrate the minimum skills required to perform a particular job."

It is recommended that all of the provisions above quoted be included as special conditions in each contract. In the case of a contract exceeding \$250,000, the contractor is required to furnish evidence that his workforce in Kentucky is representative of the available workforce in the area from which he draws employees, or to supply an Affirmative Action plan which will achieve such representation during the life of the contract.

LFUCG Non-Appropriation Clause

Contractor acknowledges that the LFUCG is a governmental entity, and the contract validity is based upon the availability of public funding under the authority of its statutory mandate.

In the event that public funds are unavailable and not appropriated for the performance of the LFUCG's obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically expire without penalty to the LFUCG thirty (30) days after written notice to Contractor of the unavailability and non-appropriation of public funds. It is expressly agreed that the LFUCG shall not activate this non-appropriation provision for its convenience or to circumvent the requirements of this contract, but only as an emergency fiscal measure during a substantial fiscal crisis, which affects generally its governmental operations.

In the event of a change in the LFUCG's statutory authority, mandate and mandated functions, by state and federal legislative or regulatory action, which adversely affects the LFUCG's authority to continue its obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically terminate without penalty to the LFUCG upon written notice to Contractor of such limitation or change in the LFUCG's legal authority.

AFFIDAVIT

Comes the Affiant, DARLENE B. THOMAS, and after being first duly sworn, states under penalty of perjury as follows:

1. His/her name is DARLENE B. THOMAS and he/she is the individual submitting the proposal or is the authorized representative of GREENHOUSE17, the entity submitting the proposal (hereinafter referred to as "Proposer").
2. Proposer will pay all taxes and fees, which are owed to the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government at the time the proposal is submitted, prior to award of the contract and will maintain a "current" status in regard to those taxes and fees during the life of the contract.
3. Proposer will obtain a Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government business license, if applicable, prior to award of the contract.
4. Proposer has authorized the Division of Central Purchasing to verify the above-mentioned information with the Division of Revenue and to disclose to the Urban County Council that taxes and/or fees are delinquent or that a business license has not been obtained.
5. Proposer has not knowingly violated any provision of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky within the past five (5) years and the award of a contract to the Proposer will not violate any provision of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth.
6. Proposer has not knowingly violated any provision of Chapter 25 of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances, known as "Ethics Act."

7. Proposer acknowledges that "knowingly" for purposes of this Affidavit means, with respect to conduct or to circumstances described by a statute or ordinance defining an offense, that a person is aware or should have been aware that his conduct is of that nature or that the circumstance exists.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGREEMENT

The Law

- Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (amended 1972) states that it is unlawful for an employer to discriminate in employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age (40-70 years) or national origin.
- Executive Order No. 11246 on Nondiscrimination under Federal contract prohibits employment discrimination by contractor and sub-contractor doing business with the Federal Government or recipients of Federal funds. - Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 states:

- Section 2012 of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Act of 1973 requires Affirmative Action on behalf of disabled veterans and veterans of the Vietnam Era by contractors having Federal contracts.
- Section 206(A) of Executive Order 12086, Consolidation of Contract Compliance Functions for Equal Employment Opportunity, states:


The Secretary of Labor may investigate the employment practices of any Government contractor or sub-contractor to determine whether or not the contractual provisions specified in Section 202 of this order have been violated.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government practices Equal Opportunity in recruiting, hiring and promoting. It is the Government's intent to affirmatively provide employment opportunities for those individuals who have previously not been allowed to enter into the mainstream of society. Because of its importance to the local Government, this policy carries the full endorsement of the Mayor, Commissioners, Directors and all supervisory personnel. In following this commitment to Equal Employment Opportunity and because the Government is the benefactor of the Federal funds, it is both against the Urban County Government policy and illegal for the Government to let contracts to companies which knowingly or unknowingly practice discrimination in their employment practices. Violation of the above mentioned ordinances may cause a contract to be canceled and the contractors may be declared ineligible for future consideration.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Each Respondent shall comply with all Federal, State & Local regulations concerning this type of service or good.

The Respondent agrees to comply with all statutes, rules, and regulations governing safe and healthful working conditions, including the Occupational Health and Safety Act of 1970, *29 U.S.C. 650 et. seq.*, as amended, and KRS Chapter 338. The Respondent also agrees to notify the LFUCG in writing immediately upon detection of any unsafe and/or unhealthful working conditions at the job site. The Respondent agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the LFUCG harmless from all penalties, fines or other expenses arising out of the alleged violation of said laws.

2. Failure to submit ALL forms and information required in this RFP may be grounds for disqualification.
3. Addenda: All addenda, if any, shall be considered in making the proposal, and such addenda shall be made a part of this RFP. Before submitting a proposal, it is incumbent upon each proposer to be informed as to whether any addenda have been issued, and the failure to cover in the bid any such addenda may result in disqualification of that proposal.
4. Proposal Reservations: LFUCG reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, to award in whole or part, and to waive minor immaterial defects in proposals. LFUCG may consider any alternative proposal that meets its basic needs.
5. Liability: LFUCG is not responsible for any cost incurred by a Respondent in the preparation of proposals.
6. Changes/Alterations: Respondent may change or withdraw a proposal at any time prior to the opening; however, no oral modifications will be allowed. Only letters, or other formal written requests for modifications or corrections of a previously submitted proposal which is addressed in the same manner as the proposal, and received by LFUCG prior to the scheduled closing time for receipt of proposals, will be accepted. The proposal, when opened, will then be corrected in accordance with such written request(s), provided that the written request is contained in a sealed envelope which is plainly marked "modifications of proposal".
7. Clarification of Submittal: LFUCG reserves the right to obtain clarification of any point in a bid or to obtain additional information from a Respondent.
8. Bribery Clause: By his/her signature on the bid, Respondent certifies that no employee of his/hers, any affiliate or Subcontractor, has bribed or attempted

to bribe an officer or employee of the LFUCG.

9. Additional Information: While not necessary, the Respondent may include any product brochures, software documentation, sample reports, or other documentation that may assist LFUCG in better understanding and evaluating the Respondent's response. Additional documentation shall not serve as a substitute for other documentation which is required by this RFP to be submitted with the proposal,
10. Ambiguity, Conflict or other Errors in RFP: If a Respondent discovers any ambiguity, conflict, discrepancy, omission or other error in the RFP, it shall immediately notify LFUCG of such error in writing and request modification or clarification of the document if allowable by the LFUCG.
11. Agreement to RFP Terms: In submitting this proposal, the Respondent agrees that it has carefully examined the specifications and all provisions relating to the work to be done attached hereto and made part of this proposal. By acceptance of a Contract/Grant under this RFP, proposer states that it understands the meaning, intent and requirements of the RFP and agrees to the same. The successful Respondent shall warrant that it is familiar with and understands all provisions herein and shall warrant that it can comply with them. No additional compensation to Respondent shall be authorized for services or expenses reasonably covered under these provisions that the proposer omits from its Proposal.
12. Cancellation: If the services to be performed hereunder by the Respondent are not performed in an acceptable manner to the LFUCG, the LFUCG may cancel this contract for cause by providing written notice to the proposer, giving at least thirty (30) days notice of the proposed cancellation and the reasons for same. During that time period, the proposer may seek to bring the performance of services hereunder to a level that is acceptable to the LFUCG, and the LFUCG may rescind the cancellation if such action is in its best interest.

A. Termination for Cause

- (1) LFUCG may terminate a contract because of the contractor's failure to perform its contractual duties
- (2) If a contractor is determined to be in default, LFUCG shall notify the contractor of the determination in writing, and may include a specified date by which the contractor shall cure the identified deficiencies. LFUCG may proceed with termination if the contractor fails to cure the deficiencies within the specified time.

- (3) A default in performance by a contractor for which a contract may be terminated shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to:
 - (a) Failure to perform the contract according to its terms, conditions and specifications;
 - (b) Failure to make delivery within the time specified or according to a delivery schedule fixed by the contract;
 - (c) Late payment or nonpayment of bills for labor, materials, supplies, or equipment furnished in connection with a contract for construction services as evidenced by mechanics' liens filed pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 376, or letters of indebtedness received from creditors by the purchasing agency;
 - (d) Failure to diligently advance the work under a contract for construction services;
 - (e) The filing of a bankruptcy petition by or against the contractor; or
 - (f) Actions that endanger the health, safety or welfare of the LFUCG or its citizens.

B. At Will Termination


Notwithstanding the above provisions, the LFUCG may terminate this contract at will in accordance with the law upon providing thirty (30) days written notice of that intent, Payment for services or goods received prior to termination shall be made by the LFUCG provided these goods or services were provided in a manner acceptable to the LFUCG. Payment for those goods and services shall not be unreasonably withheld.

- 13. Assignment of Contract: The contractor shall not assign or subcontract any portion of the Contract without the express written consent of LFUCG. Any purported assignment or subcontract in violation hereof shall be void. It is expressly acknowledged that LFUCG shall never be required or obligated to consent to any request for assignment or subcontract; and further that such refusal to consent can be for any or no reason, fully within the sole discretion of LFUCG.
- 14. No Waiver: No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege hereunder, nor any single or partial exercise thereof, nor the exercise of any other right, remedy, power or privilege shall operate as a waiver hereof or thereof. No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege under or in respect of this Contract shall affect the rights, remedies, powers or privileges of LFUCG hereunder or shall operate as a waiver thereof.
- 15. Authority to do Business: The Respondent must be a duly organized and

authorized to do business under the laws of Kentucky. Respondent must be in good standing and have full legal capacity to provide the services specified under this Contract. The Respondent must have all necessary right and lawful authority to enter into this Contract for the full term hereof and that proper corporate or other action has been duly taken authorizing the Respondent to enter into this Contract. The Respondent will provide LFUCG with a copy of a corporate resolution authorizing this action and a letter from an attorney confirming that the proposer is authorized to do business in the State of Kentucky if requested. All proposals must be signed by a duly authorized officer, agent or employee of the Respondent.

16. **Governing Law:** This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In the event of any proceedings regarding this Contract, the Parties agree that the venue shall be the Fayette County Circuit Court or the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky, Lexington Division. All parties expressly consent to personal jurisdiction and venue in such Court for the limited and sole purpose of proceedings relating to this Contract or any rights or obligations arising thereunder. Service of process may be accomplished by following the procedures prescribed by law.
17. **Ability to Meet Obligations:** Respondent affirmatively states that there are no actions, suits or proceedings of any kind pending against Respondent or, to the knowledge of the Respondent, threatened against the Respondent before or by any court, governmental body or agency or other tribunal or authority which would, if adversely determined, have a materially adverse effect on the authority or ability of Respondent to perform its obligations under this Contract, or which question the legality, validity or enforceability hereof or thereof.
18. Contractor understands and agrees that its employees, agents, or subcontractors are not employees of LFUCG for any purpose whatsoever. Contractor is an independent contractor at all times during the performance of the services specified.
19. If any term or provision of this Contract shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of the contract shall remain in full force and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.

5.1 Program Proposal & Design

5.1.1 Needs Statement—Purpose of the Program Proposal / Problem Statement

Our Trauma-informed Farm improves food security and nutritional access for homeless victims of domestic violence and their dependent children. One in three women and as many as one in six men will be the victim of domestic violence. Per recent census counts, this means more than 81,000 residents in Lexington-Fayette will be victimized in their lifetimes. Last calendar year, Kentucky Court Records tracked 1,935 petitions for domestic violence or personal orders of protection filed in Fayette County.

Victims of domestic violence navigate complex obstacles to establish safety. Homelessness, loss of employment, and isolation from support networks are common while attempting to escape abuse. Last year, 90% of adults entering our emergency shelter reported below poverty incomes, with the vast majority certifying no income source.

Low to very low food security compromises healing and stability after abuse, especially when the long-term health consequences of abuse are considered. Beyond the immediate physical injuries and emotional trauma, CDC research concludes victims and their children experience higher rates of heart disease, digestive disorders, brain injury, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress, and other diseases.

The farm that surrounds our 40-acre emergency shelter property in Fayette County responds to these challenges. Trauma-informed farm programming provides a reliable access to nutritious food; improves integration of healthy eating habits; and encourages healing of body and mind. Further, the farm's voluntary nature-based job training program encourages job-readiness to improve self-sufficiency and reduce recurrence of food insecurity after exit from shelter.

5.1.2 Service Delivery Model

The following program activities respond to food insecurity and lack of access to nutritious food suffered by homeless victims of intimate partner abuse during stay in emergency shelter, while promoting improved security and continued access upon exit from shelter:

- 1) Field-to-Table Meals (Twice Daily) – Improve access to nutritious food through the consumption of healthy meals made with produce from the farm.
- 2) Healthy Eating Group (Weekly, 1 hour) – Increase understanding and integration of nutritious eating habits during support groups facilitated by farm and kitchen advocates.
- 3) Cooking Workshops (Weekly, 1 to 3 hours) – Improve fresh produce prep, storage, and cooking skills during workshops conducted by kitchen and farm advocates.
- 4) Children's Gardens (Weekly, 90 minutes, Mar to Oct) – Improve appreciation of nutritious foods, while fostering discovery of vegetable gardening and cooking activities.
- 5) Job Training (6 weeks, 10 hours per week, Mar to Oct) – Establish new or maintain recent work history; improve job readiness; develop skills specific to the agricultural sector; and provide up to \$75 weekly training stipend for adults who choose to participate in six weeks of job training facilitated by farm advocates.

No-fee shares of the farm's harvest are available to survivors who live in the transitional apartments on the backside of our farm property after their exit from shelter. A public-facing Autumn Vegetable & Herb CSA improves community access to affordable and local produce, while offering meaningful support for our mission.

5.1.3 Client Eligibility and Requirements

5 Points

Program eligibility is determined by self-disclosure of domestic violence victimization and intake to our emergency shelter facility. We are committed to low-barrier service access and a voluntary service philosophy.

- Victims are never required to participate in farm programming or consume field-to-table produce as a condition of receiving domestic violence services.
- No fees are assessed for program participation.
- Farm tools, clothing, and other supplies are provided by agency.
- Program participants agree to do no harm to themselves or others, maintain confidentiality of other victims participating in the program, and respect the farmland.
- If choosing to engage in job training on the farm, participants agree to standard workplace expectations for timeliness, responsibility, and teamwork.
- Weapons, alcohol, & illegal drugs are prohibited on program property.

Policy requires our staff to make every effort to counsel residents and document agreed upon change of behavior prior to involuntary exit from the program. Should participant not fulfill these expectations, staff must obtain management approval, give ample notification, and offer assistance with the grievance process before exit. Victims who are exited from the shelter facility and/or farm program remain eligible for non-residential domestic violence advocacy and support services provided by the agency.

5.1.4 Evidence-Based/Best Practice

10 Points

Our farm program is a national best-practice model. This designation is substantiated by our Mary Byron Project Celebrating Solutions Award, a competitive national recognition for promising practice in response to domestic violence, and substantial grant investment awarded to University of Kentucky Center for Research on Violence Against Women by the Department of Justice Office of Violence Against Women to evaluate the program over several years. Research is on-going.

- Agency and programming adheres to Victim Service Standards set forth by Kentucky Coalition Against Domestic Violence (KCADV), which monitors adherence to these standards annually and requires service staff to complete 40 hours of training to become a Certified Domestic Violence Advocate during first year of employment.
- Services are based in the Trauma Informed Care Model, an evidence-based best practice adopted by KCADV and National Network to End Domestic Violence that honors need for victims to be respected, informed, connected, and hopeful; acknowledges connection of trauma to depression, anxiety, and other mental health issues; and empowers victims to self-determine their service needs.
- The farm also meets Standards of Practice for Horticultural Therapy, a best-practice model for administration of activity-based services in therapeutic, rehabilitative, or vocational settings.

Department of Labor research related to therapeutic horticulture benefits for women veterans (Kirk et al, 2010) and "social farming" for inclusion in rural areas (Di Iacovo and O'Connor, 2009) informed the development of the program. Experts from University of Kentucky Department of Agriculture and Grow Appalachia also contributed critical early input.

5.2 Program Measures & Evaluation

5.2.1 Service Efficacy & Desired Outcomes

300 adult victims of domestic violence and dependent children (175 adults/125 children) will benefit from increased food access and consumption of nutritious foods during the 12-month grant term. Service efficacy and outcomes reflect 42-bed shelter occupancy with average shelter stay of 50 nights. Some victims need only a few days of emergency shelter, while others may require stays of more than a year to assure safety, healing, and stability after abuse. We do not impose limitations on shelter stay duration.

Although program participants develop individualized healing goals that respond to their unique safety and healing needs (see previous discussion, 5.1.4), successful program participation will be measured through these common outcomes:

- 1) 99% of adults and children living in shelter will improve food security and nutritious food consumption through access to twice daily field-to-table meals during their stay.
- 2) 75% of adults and children living in shelter will improve understanding for importance of healthy eating while healing from abuse through participation in weekly support groups.
- 3) 60% of adults in shelter will increase skills related to nutritious cooking and preservation/storage of fresh produce during weekly cooking workshops.
- 4) 30% of adults living in shelter will improve job readiness and increase agricultural skills through participation in farm-based job training while living at the shelter.
- 5) 25% of adults living in shelter will increase earned income or non-cash benefits, including Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), which can be used at area farmers markets to sustain healthy eating after exit from shelter.

5.2.2 Client Empowerment & Community Impact

10 Points

More than 4,000 lbs of field-to-table produce and 20,000 healthy meals during the 12-month funding term will provide a meaningful immediate difference in the lives of adults and children living in emergency shelter after fleeing abuse. Increased access to nutritious food options and improved appreciation for healthy eating will encourage short-term physical wellness to mitigate negative health consequences of domestic violence. Long-term health and wellness benefits will result from integration of field-to-table cooking, fresh produce storage/preservation, and home-based gardening skills after exit from shelter. For victims participating in farm-based job training, improved job-readiness and increased employability will encourage economic stability after abuse, which in turn will improve long-term food security. A consideration of reflections written by farm program participants, shared with their permission, provides further evidence of empowerment and community impact:

"Coming out to the farm gave me something to look forward to. I was working with my hands to feed others living in the shelter. I love helping people and that kept me going."

"The farm has taught me so much. Patience, gratitude, and how to love your garden as much as you love the grocery store."

"Today I tried my first mint leaf, and it was amazing! I love learning about all the herbs. It makes me feel like I can learn so much."

"This past week has helped me so much! I am excited to learn more, and I want to work in a plant nursery, and do things like this for a career."

5.2.3 Data Assessment & Quality Improvement

10 Points

Program staff and administrators prioritize continuous improvement and evidence-informed practice. Farm management data points are measured daily, weekly, and seasonally to provide critical information for effective programming. Examples include soil-quality measurements, pounds of produce harvested, weight of produce used in shelter meal preparation, inventory of produce from the farm processed and preserved for later use; and number of meals prepared featuring farm produce.

Program participants are asked to complete a satisfaction and feedback survey upon completion or exit from the program, with typical 75% response. Data tracking is maintained in a Victim Service Provider database, which adheres to federally mandated confidentiality requirements and provides HMIS-equivalent reporting. The following victim service data is reviewed during weekly check-ins and monthly meetings for formative program evaluation:

100% sample of participant data includes demographics, duration and severity of abuse, earned and non-cash income, language accessibility needs, etc.

100% sample of service-level data tracks counts for all formal and informal counseling, support groups, skills workshops, plates of healthy meals served, etc.

100% sample of job training experience includes number of training hours scheduled and completed; demonstration of new skill development; observed improvements in job placement readiness; resume/application submission assistance; positive work referrals provided to employers; number of participants securing job.

5.3 Capacity & Sustainability

5.3.1 Staff Qualifications & Experience

Responsibilities of the following four program staff include farm management, support group/workshop facilitation, field-to-table meal preparation/service, and general victim advocacy:

- 1.) Christina Lane, Farm Co-manager, is a Certified Domestic Violence Advocate. She was one of the first employees of the agency and planted the first garden on the farm. She brings 10 years of farming experience and contributes 100% of full-time focus to program.
- 2.) TBD, Farm Advocate, will be hired prior to start of project period and contribute 100% of full-time focus to the program. The current staff in this role recently tendered her resignation. We anticipate the new hire's credentials will echo past preparation of staff in this role. Examples include degree in sustainable agriculture, land and water management experience, and a network of agricultural partnerships.
- 3.) Theo Malpica, Food and Nutrition Specialist, is a graduate of the Auguste Escoffier School of Culinary Arts in Boulder, CO. He is classically French-trained at a farm to table culinary program and holds Servsafe Manager certification.
- 4.) A seasonally hired part-time Farm Assistant helps with day-to-day operations during the busy harvest season from June - October.

Darlene Thomas, Diane Fleet, Diane Willoughby, and Corissa Phillips comprise the agency's leadership team to provide financial and grant management. Collectively, the program's direct service and administration staff bring more than 90 years of collective experience.

5.3.2 Partnership & Resource Leverage

Our farm program responds to community wellness and safety priorities of services to support victims of domestic violence. Research and practice indicate that access to safe, confidential programming that responds to the holistic needs of victims, especially intersecting poverty and health ramifications of abuse, reduces likelihood of re-victimization.

Partnerships with area colleges provide assistance with farm operations. Local gardening clubs provide seeds and used tools. Food donations from Glean Kentucky, God's Food Pantry, and FoodChain augment our annual harvest. Partnerships with Seedleaf and local landscaping companies provide yard waste for composting. The program also benefits from marketing associated with Kentucky Proud certified producer. The farm provides meaningful opportunities for individuals and companies to understand our mission and participate in solutions that nurture lives harmed. Contributions are made to the farm's operation through volunteer service projects and purchase of value-added products from the farm.

A diverse funding model provides program support, including a portion of our agency's subcontract with the Kentucky Coalition Against Domestic Violence, received per KRS and KAR statutes as the primary provider of domestic violence services in Fayette County and surrounding region; Victims of Crime Act funding from the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet; and revenue generated from fund raising and previously mentioned farm-based enterprises.

The agency's Board of Directors provides fiscal oversight and governance for the program.

5.3.3 Outreach & Inclusion Strategy

The agency and program commit to inclusion, non-discrimination, and the link between domestic violence and other forms of oppression. These commitments are set forth in a comprehensive non-discrimination and inclusion policy that exceeds federal requirements. The agency and program specifically address recommendations made by the Mayor's Commission on Racial Justice & Equality to improve food access and healthy food options and invest in jobs training programs.

Partnerships with Global Lex, Kentucky Refugee Ministries, and Pride Community Organization Services exemplify community outreach to assure diverse awareness of services. Service publications, available in print and online, include translations (Spanish, French, Arabic) and topics specific to LGBTQIA+ and rural victimizations. A Spanish bilingual advocate employed by the agency provide farm-based interpretation, and the agency maintains interpreter and translator contracts to assure access for more than a hundred languages.

Facility parking, walkways, entrances, and corridors meet ADA Accessibility Guidelines for Buildings and Facilities. Farm programming and services often are adapted to meet physical, mental, and other disabilities as determined by need of participants. As previously discussed (see section 5.1.1), issues of poverty and economic distress are common during and following domestic violence. For this reason, all agency services, including farm programming, responds to financial needs and barriers to self-sufficiency, while providing opportunities for economic stability.
