

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky July 5, 2018

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on July 5, 2018 at 6:01 p.m. Present were Mayor Gray in the chair presiding, and the following members of the council: Stinnett, Worley, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, Evans, Farmer, Gibbs, Henson, Kay, Lamb, Moloney, Mossotti, and Plomin. Absent was Council Member Smith.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

A Resolution authorizing and directing the Mayor, on behalf of the Urban County Government, to execute an Agreement with the Ky. Energy and Environmental Cabinet to facilitate a county-wide tire collection event to be held on November 1-3, 2018, at a cost not to exceed \$6,343.

A Resolution authorizing the Mayor, on behalf of the Urban County Government, to execute a Consultant Services Agreement with Integrity Architecture for architectural and engineering services for a new Police Canine Facility, at a cost not to exceed \$55,000.

A Resolution authorizing and directing the Mayor, on behalf of the Urban County Government, to execute an Amendment to the Agreement with the Ky. Emergency Management Agency, extending the period of performance through June 30, 2020, for the update of the Lexington-Fayette Hazard Mitigation Plan, at no cost to the Urban County Government.

A Resolution authorizing the Mayor, on behalf of the Urban County Government, to execute an Agreement with East End Family Coalition, Inc. for the Office of the Urban County Council, at a cost not to exceed \$2,275.

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Mayor Gray spoke about the successful 4th of July celebration in Lexington, although he lamented the disappointing fireworks display.

Mr. Terry Sweeney and Mr. Steve Grossman, Downtown Lexington Partnership, spoke to the Council about the fireworks display.

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Mr. Farmer thanked Ms. Lori Houlihan of the Mayor's Office for helping to provide bottled water to 4th of July parade participants. Mr. Farmer spoke about his delight at the community response to the new location selected for the 4th of July fireworks and expressed his confidence that the fireworks presentation will improve next year.

Mr. Farmer thanked Ms. Martha Allen, Council Clerk, for reading legislation with alacrity. He wished her success on her departure from the LFUCG.

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Ms. Henson wished Ms. Allen success. She also wished success to Ms. Mizari Suárez, who recently left Partners for Youth, and talked about Ms. Suárez's unique capabilities that will be missed.

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Ms. Bledsoe spoke about the Bluegrass 10K and the excellent support provided to runners with many water stations and support personnel. She also described a privately funded fireworks show she attended.

Ms. Bledsoe thanked Commissioner Dowell Hoskins-Squier, Dept. of Environmental Quality and Public Works, for her work, and wished her well after her departure from the LFUCG.

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Mr. Moloney expressed his regret at the departure of both Ms. Allen and Comm. Hoskins-Squier, and talked about how much he enjoyed working with both of them. Mr. Moloney talked about changes to the Downtown Partnership over the years, and suggested the City might consider bringing fireworks back in house.

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Mr. Stinnett talked about how the discussion on fireworks offers perspective on how great the City is actually working, where a fireworks display seems like one of the City's biggest problems. He suggested adjusting the schedule of events.

Mr. Stinnett wished Ms. Allen and Comm. Hoskins-Squier success in their future endeavors.

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Mr. J. Brown talked about the Commission on Veterans Affairs. Mr. J. Brown also spoke about the unfortunate fact that a very successful 4th of July celebration was marred by lackluster fireworks display. He expressed his confidence that the Downtown Lexington Partnership can improve the display going forward.

Mr. J. Brown thanked Ms. Billie Mallory for her support to the Council. He also thanked Ms. Allen and Comm. Hoskins-Squier for their work.

Mr. J. Brown moved to place the matter of the COACH Fellowship in the General Government and Social Services Committee. The motion was seconded by Ms. Bledsoe and passed by unanimous vote.

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Vice Mayor Kay thanked Ms. Allen, also commenting on her lightning-fast reading and wishing her success. Vice Mayor Kay also wished success to Comm. Hoskins-Squier. He thanked Div. of Police and Div. of Fire and Emergency Services personnel and the Div. of Parks and Recreation for a very successful 4th of July celebration.

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Ms. Evans spoke about the importance of having cooling stations and similar amenities to entice people to come and stay downtown for celebrations like the 4th of July. She wished congratulations and good luck to several employees who are leaving the LFUCG, including Ms. Allen, Comm. Hoskins-Squier, and Ms. Aleta Rados, who is leaving the Div. of Family Services.

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Ms. Mossotti wished Ms. Allen and Comm. Hoskins-Squier success in their future endeavors. Ms. Mossotti reminded everyone of the Bluegrass Fair from July 12 – 22, 2018.

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Mayor Gray echoed everyone’s well wishes for Ms. Allen and Comm. Hoskins-Squier.

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Commander Thomas Curtsinger, Div. of Police, presented a disciplinary matter as follows: An allegation has been made that: Officer Haley Patterson has committed the offense of Violating Any Rules of the Department in violation of KRS 95.450 and General Order 1973-02/J Disciplinary procedures, Appendix B, Operational Rule 1.35: General Order 2011-01/A Social media and General Order 1973-03/R Operation and Maintenance of Department Vehicle in that on the 5th day of May, 2018, on or about April 18th, 2018, Officer Haley Patterson participated in a livestream video on Instagram for a company identified as “Barbells and Handcuffs Workout Apparel.” The livestream video was taken while Officer Patterson was in Lexington Police Department uniform and while she was operating a Lexington Police Department vehicle upon the roadway. The appropriate punishment for this conduct is Written Reprimand.

Upon motion by Mr. Farmer, seconded by Vice Mayor Kay, and approved by unanimous vote, the disciplinary recommendation was approved.

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Mr. Don Pratt, Royal Ave. spoke about the readings of legislation. Mr. Pratt also discussed global warming and the environment. He expressed his desire that the City invest in solar energy as opposed to other projects.

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Mr. Stinnett and Mr. Gibbs departed the meeting.

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Ms. Gina Daugherty spoke to the Council about the divisions in society created by economic differences.

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Upon motion by Ms. Bledsoe, seconded by Ms. Plomin, and approved by majority vote (Mr. Stinnett and Mr. Gibbs were absent for the vote), the meeting adjourned at 7:06 p.m.
