

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky December 1, 2022

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on December 1, 2022 at 6:01 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Kloiber, Lamb, LeGris, McCurn, Moloney, Plomin, Reynolds, Sheehan, Worley, Baxter, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, and Kay. Absent was Council Member Bledsoe.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 126-2022 through 129-2022, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 624-2022 through 636-2022, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Council Member Fred Brown.

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At 6:03 p.m., upon motion by Vice Mayor Kay, seconded by Mr. Ellinger, and approved by unanimous vote, the Council went into closed session pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(c).

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At 6:33 p.m., upon motion by Vice Mayor Kay, seconded by Ms. Plomin, and approved by unanimous vote, the Council reconvened in open session, with the same members present.

An Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government to reflect current requirements for municipal expenditures, and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, FY 2023 Schedule No. 19.

An Ordinance amending the authorized strength by creating two (2) Classified Civil Service Positions of Language Access Specialist, Grade 523E, in the Office of the Mayor, effective July 1, 2022.

An Ordinance amending Section 2-172 of the Code of Ordinances to include in the imposition of the transient room tax the rent of cabins, lodgings, campsites, similar accommodations, and any other place in which accommodations are regularly furnished to transients for consideration, or by any person that facilitates the rental of the accommodations; establishing that rentals supplied for a continuous period of thirty (30) days or more shall not be subject to the transient room tax; and defining “person” and “rent”; all effective on January 1, 2023.

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An Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government to reflect current requirements for municipal expenditures, and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, FY 2023 Schedule No. 21 was on the docket to receive first reading.

Upon motion by Ms. Baxter, seconded by Ms. Sheehan, and approved by unanimous vote, the ordinance was amended to include additional items related to the following: (1) establish grant budget for FEMA Building Inspection and Code Enforcement Accreditation FY 2023, (2) establish grant budget for Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant - FY 2023 and (3) budget associated payroll recovery for the SAFER grant in the General Fund, and (4) provide \$535,989.74 from reserve in the Landfill fund for professional services, reconstruction of the bioswale, and associated improvements at the Former Jacks Creek Pike Landfill, as it was necessary to add these budget amendments to get two readings before the end of the calendar year.

The ordinance, as amended, received first reading and was ordered to be placed on file for public inspection until December 6, 2022.

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Upon motion by Mr. Moloney, seconded by Ms. Reynolds, and approved by unanimous vote, an Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to provide \$1,000,000 for the Jefferson Street Viaduct Project

and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, Schedule No. 24 received first reading and was ordered to be placed on file for public inspection until December 6, 2022.

An Ordinance expanding and extending the Full Urban Services District #1 for the Urban County Government for the provision of street lighting, street cleaning, and garbage and refuse collection, to include the area defined as certain properties on the following streets: Bay Springs Park; Buttermilk Rd.; Case Way; Cattle Path; Feathersound Way; Foster Drive; Hailey Rose Way; Hollow Creek Rd.; Huntly Place; Night Heron Way; Silver Springs Dr.; Squires Circle; Squirrel Nest Lane; Stolen Horse Trace; and Tanksley Way.

An Ordinance expanding and extending Partial Urban Services District #3 for the Urban County Government for the provision of garbage and refuse collection, to include

the area defined as certain properties on the following streets: Cocos Way; Silver Springs Circle; Silver Springs Way; Waldorf Lane; and William Astor Lane.

An Ordinance expanding and extending Partial Urban Services District #5 for the Urban County Government for the provision of street lighting and garbage and refuse collection, to include the area defined as certain properties on the following streets: Lansdowne Dr.; Vicksburg Rd.; and Wedgewood Court.

An Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to reflect current requirements for funds in the amount of \$70,000 to provide funds for Council Capital Projects in the Div. of Parks and Recreation and Div. of Environmental Services and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, Schedule No. 23.

An Ordinance amending Section 22-52.1 of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances, related to Constables, establishing the amount of the bond to be provided by Constables and Deputy Constables; providing that Constables may not appoint Deputy Constables unless authorized to do so by the Mayor and subject to any standards established by the Mayor; requiring the timely filing of the monthly activity report required by KRS 70.430; prohibiting Constables and Deputy Constables from equipping vehicles with certain emergency equipment and establishing a penalty for violation; and amending Section 22-55.1 of the Code of Ordinances, related to local Constitutional Officers, to increase the amount of the bond that must be provided by a Constable to \$25,000; all effective January 1, 2023.

An Ordinance amending and restating Ordinance No. 51-2017, which created the Public Infrastructure Program, in its entirety, and providing for its purpose, program fund protections, priorities, limitations, criteria, an application process, administration by the Mayor's Chief Development Officer with oversight by the Economic Development Investment Board, and a Program Fund; all effective upon date of passage.

An Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 203-80, as previously amended, relating to the Economic Development Investment Board, to include oversight over the Lexington Public Infrastructure Program, with final approval of funding to be made by the Urban County Council.

An Ordinance amending the authorized strength by abolishing one (1) vacant unclassified position of Engineering Technician, Grade 515N, and restoring funding for

one (1) classified position of Municipal Engineer Sr., Grade 528E, all in the Div. of Engineering, effective upon passage of Council.

An Ordinance providing that all full-time and part-time employees included in the unified pay plan shall receive a three percent (3.0%) pay increase; providing that sections 21-29(b) and 22-26(b) notwithstanding, all employees at or above the maximum of the grade salary range shall receive a three percent (3%) pay increase; amending Section 23-32(d) of the Code of Ordinances increasing the existing step structure for the positions of Police Chief, Grade 324E, and Fire Chief, Grade 324E, by three percent (3%) and adjusting the salaries accordingly; and increasing the salary by three percent (3%) for three (3) positions of Law Clerk - P/T, within the Dept. of Law; one (1) position of Council Administrator within the Office of the Urban County Council; and one (1) position of Park Patrol Coordinator - P/T, within the Div. of Parks and Recreation, all to become effective on January 2, 2023.

An Ordinance providing a one-time supplement payment for full-time non-bargaining employees included in the unified pay plan, including the Council Administrator, as follows: a one thousand dollar (\$1,000) payment for eligible employees making seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) or less per year; a seven hundred and fifty dollar (\$750) payment for eligible employees making more than seventy five thousand dollars (\$75,000) but less than or equal to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) per year; a five hundred dollar (\$500) payment for eligible employees making more than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) but less than or equal to one hundred and twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000) per year; and a two hundred and fifty dollar (\$250) payment to eligible employees making more than one hundred and twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000) per year, effective upon passage of Council.

An Ordinance amending Section 2-3.2 in Chapter 2 of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to establish procedures and guidelines for redistricting Council Districts.

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A Resolution accepting two separate Memorandums of Agreement between the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government and Bluegrass Fraternal Order of Police,

Lodge No. 4, on behalf of both Officers and Sergeants, and Lieutenants, in the Div. of Police, to increase base pay and address retention issues received second reading.
