

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky February 16, 2023

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on February 16, 2023 at 6:01 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Sevigny, Worley, Wu, J. Brown, Ellinger, Elliott Baxter, Fogle, Gray, LeGris, Lynch, Monarrez, and Reynolds. Absent were Council Members Sheehan, F. Brown, and Plomin.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 010-2023 through 012-2023, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 041-2023 through 070-2023, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Father Norman Fischer of St. Peter Claver Catholic Church.

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Upon motion by Ms. Gray, seconded by Mr. Sevigny, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the January 31, 2023 Council Meeting were approved.

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Mayor Gorton asked Coaches Nicki Henlein and Andrea Straub to join her at the podium, along with the members of the Henry Clay High School Dance Team, and read a Proclamation declaring February 16, 2023 as Henry Clay High School Dance Team Day in Lexington.

Coach Hemline spoke briefly about the teammates and commended their leadership and hard work representing the Henry Clay High School and the City of Lexington at both state and national levels.

Mayor Gorton asked Team Captains Avery Brewer and Megan Skinner to join her at the podium, along with the members of the Lafayette High School Dance Team and Mr. Sevigny, and read a Proclamation declaring February 16, 2023 as Lafayette High School Dance Team Day in Lexington.

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Mayor Gorton asked Terry Allen to join her at the podium, along with Mr. J. Brown, and read a Proclamation declaring February 16, 2023 as Terry Allen Day in Lexington.

Mr. Allen thanked the Council for the recognition and spoke of the evolution of the Martin Luther King Jr. Day Freedom March throughout his years spent organizing the event. He expressed pride in the integrity of the March as well as its participants.

Mr. J. Brown praised Mr. Allen's dedication and professionalism and congratulated him on his accomplishments.

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Mayor Gorton asked Vivian Carter Talbert and Tina Carter-Stevenson to join her at the podium, along with Ms. Fogle, and read a Proclamation celebrating the life of Will Harbut, grooms to Thoroughbred racehorse, Man o' War.

Ms. Carter Talbert spoke about her grandfather's legacy, and noted that the photos presented during the proclamation were actually of her father, Eugene Carter, the last person to sit on Man o' War, and shared stories of both men.

Ms. Carter-Stevenson spoke of her grandfather's legacy and recognized family members in attendance, noting the importance of remembering family's history with younger generations.

Ms. Fogle recognized Ms. Tina Carter-Stevenson, in honor of Black History Month, for her achievements during her previous tenure as Winburn Middle School principal and founding director of the STEAM Academy.

Ms. Carter-Stevenson conveyed her surprise at the recognition and thanked Ms. Fogle for the honor. She spoke of her passion for caring for and educating youth and shared that she plans to serve as a mentor for other Fayette County school principals.

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Vice Mayor Wu spoke about the Lexington-Fayette County Parking Authority resolution, and expressed appreciation for the creative and cooperative efforts of everyone involved in the discussions. Ms. Fogle talked about other various events held earlier in the week, including Fairness Day, and Moms Demand Action. She spoke about the C.R.O.W.N. Act and expressed pride in being able to represent and serve her constituents in the 1st District.

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Ms. Gray thanked Mr. Sevigny for his recognition.

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Lillie Miller-Johnson, District 1, spoke about contract law as it relates to a personal court order agreement with Community Action Council and shared her career and academic history.

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Rock Daniels, District 11, spoke about exploring ways to create a more affordable housing market and provide potential solutions to reduce tenant eviction.

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Emily Jackson, District 3, spoke in support of a Tenant's Bill of Rights and noted how women are affected disproportionately across various facets in society, including tenancy.

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Beau Revlett, spoke in support of a Tenant's Bill of Rights and responded to questions previously asked by Councilmembers regarding the proposed Tenant's Bill of Rights. He thanked Ms. Lynch for referring seats on Boards and Commissions to tenants and Vice Mayor Wu for referring eviction diversion to the Council.

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Adrian Williams, District 3, spoke in support of a Tenant's Bill of Rights.
