

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky June 7, 2018

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on June 7, 2018 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gray in the chair presiding, and the following members of the council: Kay, Lamb, Moloney, Mossotti, Plomin, Smith, Stinnett, Worley, Bledsoe, F. The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 28-2018 and 29-2018, and Resolutions No. 289-2018 through 342-2018, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Rabbi David Wirtschafter of Temple Adeth Israel.
