

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky December 6, 2022

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on December 6, 2022 at 5:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Lamb, LeGris, McCurn, Plomin, Reynolds, Sheehan, Worley, Elliott Baxter, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, Kay, and Kloiber. Absent was Council member Moloney.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 130-2022 through 132-2022, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 637-2022 through 660-2022, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Kory Wilcoxson, Senior Minister of Crestwood Christian Church.

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Upon motion by Mr. McCurn, seconded by Vice Mayor Kay, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the November 17, 2022 Council Meeting were approved.

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Anne Gay Donworth, Development Officer of the Lexington Public Library, Heather Dieffenbach, Executive Director of the Lexington Public Library, and Ramsey Bova, Co-Chair of the Lexington Public Library Foundation Board of Directors, recognized the Council for their support of the Lexington Public Library in honor of National Philanthropy Day.

Ms. Dieffenbach shared some of the projects that were made possible by the American Rescue Plan Act Funds provided by Council, which included the Marksbury Family Branch.

Vice Mayor Kay accepted the award on behalf of the Council.

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Mayor Gorton asked Nathan McPeek, Head Coach of the Frederick Douglass High School Football Team, to join her at the podium, along with members of the Frederick

Douglass High School Broncos football team, and read a Proclamation declaring December 6 2022 as Frederick Douglass Football State Champion's Day in Lexington.

She awarded each member and coach of the team with a "Spirit of Lexington" certificate.

An Ordinance changing the zone from a Wholesale and Warehouse Business (B-4) zone to a Light Industrial (I-1) zone for 2.3827 net (2.5584 gross) acres, for property located at 101 and 109 W. Loudon Avenue. (Northyard, LLC; Council District 1).

An Ordinance changing the zone from a Two Family Residential (R-2) zone to a High Density Apartment (R-4) zone, for 1.089 net (1.346 gross) acres, for property located at 530 East High St. (Winterwood, Inc.; Council District 3).

from equipping vehicles with certain emergency equipment and establishing a penalty for violation; and amending Section 22-55.1 of the Code of Ordinances, related to local Constitutional Officers, to increase the amount of the bond that must be provided by a Constable to \$25,000; all effective January 1, 2023.

An Ordinance amending and restating Ordinance No. 51-2017, which created the Public Infrastructure Program, in its entirety, and providing for its purpose, program fund protections, priorities, limitations, criteria, an application process, administration by the Mayor's Chief Development Officer with oversight by the Economic Development Investment Board, and a Program Fund; all effective upon date of passage.

An Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 203-80, as previously amended, relating to the Economic Development Investment Board, to include oversight over the Lexington Public Infrastructure Program, with final approval of funding to be made by the Urban County Council.

An Ordinance amending the authorized strength by abolishing one (1) vacant unclassified position of Engineering Technician, Grade 515N, and restoring funding for one (1) classified position of Municipal Engineer Sr., Grade 528E, all in the Div. of Engineering, effective upon passage of Council.

An Ordinance providing that all full time and part time employees included in the unified pay plan shall receive a three percent (3.0%) pay increase; providing that sections 21-29(b) and 22-26(b) notwithstanding, all employees at or above the maximum of the grade salary range shall receive a three percent (3%) pay increase; amending Section 23-32(d) of the Code of Ordinances increasing the existing step structure for the positions of Police Chief, Grade 324E, and Fire Chief, Grade 324E, by three percent (3%) and adjusting the salaries accordingly; and increasing the salary by three percent (3%) for three (3) positions of Law Clerk - P/T, within the Dept. of Law; one (1) position of Council Administrator within the Office of the Urban County Council; and one (1) position of Park Patrol Coordinator - P/T, within the Div. of Parks and Recreation, all to become effective on January 2, 2023.

An Ordinance providing a one-time supplement payment for full-time non-bargaining employees included in the unified pay plan, including the Council Administrator, as follows: a one thousand dollar (\$1,000) payment for eligible employees

making seventy five thousand dollars (\$75,000) or less per year; a seven hundred and fifty dollar (\$750) payment for eligible employees making more than seventy five thousand dollars (\$75,000) but less than or equal to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) per year; a five hundred dollar (\$500) payment for eligible employees making more than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) but less than or equal to one hundred and twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000) per year; and a two hundred and fifty dollar (\$250) payment to eligible employees making more than one hundred and twenty five thousand dollars (\$125,000) per year, effective upon passage of Council.

An Ordinance amending Section 2-3.2 in Chapter 2 of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government to establish procedures and guidelines for redistricting Council Districts.

An Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government to provide \$1,000,000 for the Jefferson Street Viaduct Project and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, Schedule No. 24.

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An Ordinance amending the authorized strength by creating twenty one (21) sworn positions of Firefighter, Grade 311N, in the Div. of Fire and Emergency Services, effective upon passage of Council received first reading.

Ms. Lamb asked that before the Flock Cameras are installed, a presentation be made to the Council about the efficacy of the Automatic License Plate Reader Program. She noted the concerns that were shared during public comment, but expressed that she thought the program was a good tool for law enforcement.

Vice Mayor Kay stated that his reasoning for voting against the resolution was his concern about the lack of evaluation of the Automatic License Plate Reader Program.

Mr. Ellinger asked whether the Flock cameras would be owned by LFUCG or if they were being leased.

Commander Matthew Greathouse, Div. of Police, responded that the cameras would be leased and need to be funded again in FY 2024.

Ms. Sheehan asked for confirmation that a presentation was going to be made about the efficacy of the Flock cameras before they were installed. Commander Greathouse responded.

Ms. LeGris shared that she had questions about the Flock cameras that had gone unanswered at the previous Council Work Session to which she attributed her “no” vote. She expressed that she looked forward to receiving more information about the cameras.

Mr. J. Brown explained that it would be best to continue to communicate with the public after the proposed presentation on the Flock cameras.

Mr. Kloiber reiterated the need for more information before the Automatic License Plate Reader Program was expanded.
