

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky April 13, 2017

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on April 13, 2017 at 6:04 p.m. Present were Mayor Gray in the chair presiding, and the following members of the council: Higgins, Kay, Lamb, Moloney, Mossotti, Plomin, Scutchfield, Stinnett, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, Evans, Gibbs, and Henson. Absent was Council Member Farmer.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 33-2017 through 40-2017, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 130-2017 through 187-2017, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

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The Invocation was given by Chaplain Laura Babbage of the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

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Mr. Farmer arrived at the meeting.

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Ms. Scutchfield moved to approve the minutes of the Zone Change Meetings on January 19 and 24, 2017, and the Council Meeting on January 31, 2017. The motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer.

Ms. Lamb made a motion, seconded by Mr. Farmer, to amend Ms. Scutchfield's motion and postpone the approval of the minutes of the January 19, 2017 Zone Change Meeting to April 27, 2017.

Mr. Stinnett commented on how votes are reflected in the minutes.

The motion to amend was approved by unanimous vote.

The amended motion to approve the minutes of the January 24, 2017 Zone Change Meeting and the January 31, 2017 Council meeting passed by unanimous vote.

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Mayor Gray asked Ms. Mossotti to join him at the podium, along with the members of the Lexington Div. of Police Explorer's Post #357. Mayor Gray talked about the activities of the post and several recent awards it has received, and read a proclamation declaring April 13, 2017 as Police Explorer's Post #357 Day in Lexington.

Ms. Mossotti also congratulated the members of the Explorer's Post and commented on their well-deserved commendations.

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Mr. Stinnett moved to cancel the April 13, 2017 Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment (ZOTA) Meeting scheduled for 7:00 p.m. and move second reading of an Ordinance amending Article 23A-10 of the Zoning Ordinance to allow for new land uses within the expansion area to the April 27, 2017 Council Meeting. Ms. Henson seconded the motion.

Vice Mayor Kay asked for information on the reasoning behind the motion. Mr. Stinnett advised the Council that the land owners, Div. of Planning staff members, and other interested parties are working to resolve the matter without a hearing.

The motion was approved by unanimous vote and the April 13, 2017 ZOTA Meeting was canceled and second reading of the ordinance was scheduled for the April 27, 2017 Council Meeting.

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An Ordinance amending Section 14-37 of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government relating to curfew for minors, amending the definitions of "minor", "remain", and "allow"; amending the curfew time to 1:00 a.m. for all days; and deleting exceptions for reasonable necessity, sidewalk adjacent to residence, inside a motor vehicle, and homeless youth received second reading.

Mr. Stinnett moved to amend the Ordinance to change the time of 1:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. Mr. Moloney seconded the motion.

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Commander Greene presented a disciplinary matter regarding Officer Roman A. Sorrell. It is alleged that Officer Sorrell committed the offense of Violating Operation of Vehicles in violation of KRS 95.450 and General Order 1973-02/I Disciplinary Procedures, Appendix B, Operational Rules, Section 1.13 in that Officer Roman A. Sorrell allegedly, on Sunday, February 5 at 10:15 a.m., was responding from West Roll Call to an Officer Needs Assistance Call on Dewese Street. Officer Sorrell was traveling inbound on Old Frankfort Pike with his lights and siren activated and was involved in a collision at the intersection of Old Frankfort Pike at S. Forbes Rd. After reviewing the incident, it is alleged Officer Sorrell failed to operate his issued department vehicle with due regard or in a careful, prudent manner. The appropriate disciplinary action is Twenty (20) Hours Suspension Without Pay and Emergency Driver Retraining.

Ms. Henson made a motion to approve the disciplinary action. The motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer.

Ms. Evans asked for clarification and Commander Greene responded.

The motion was approved by unanimous vote and the disciplinary action was approved.

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Chief John Gosper, Div. of Fire, presented a disciplinary matter regarding Firefighter Gregg Shroyer. It is alleged that Firefighter Shroyer has committed the offense of sending out unauthorized "LFD-all" in violation of KRS 95.450 (inefficiency, misconduct, insubordination or violation of law or rule) and violation of UDG 2.01 Conduct Unbecoming, in that on the 22<sup>nd</sup> day of December 2016 he allegedly sent out an email that was not authorized and derogatory of the department. The appropriate disciplinary action is a Written Reprimand.

Upon motion by Mr. Farmer, seconded by Ms. Plomin, and approved by unanimous vote, the disciplinary action was approved.

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Upon motion by Mr. Stinnett, seconded by Mr. Moloney, and approved by unanimous vote, the meeting adjourned at 7:26 p.m.
