- 2. <u>Finalization of Agreement</u>. Organization shall return this Agreement to the Council Administrator's Office on or before October 2nd, 2024. If Organization fails to sign and return this Agreement within 30 days, Organization shall be deemed to have forfeited the Neighborhood Development Funds and Organization shall be deemed ineligible to receive Neighborhood Development Funds for a period of one (1) year.
- 3. Receipt of Funds. Upon return of the signed Agreement to the Council Administrator's Office, the Council Administrator shall issue the check to the Organization. The check shall be timely deposited by the Organization within 60 days of receipt. If the Organization fails to deposit the check within 60 days of receipt, the Organization shall be deemed ineligible to receive Neighborhood Development Funds for a period of one (1) year. Under no circumstances shall a check that the Organization fails to deposit within sixty (60) days of receipt be re-issued by the Government.
- 4. Required Documentation. Organization shall submit all relevant receipts and financial documentation to Councilmember Lynch's office, documenting the use of the granted funds for the specified lawful public purpose, within six (6) months of receiving the Neighborhood Development Fund check. If Organization fails to provide the required documentation, the Organization shall be deemed ineligible to receive Neighborhood Development Funds for a period of one (1) year.

- 5. Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons; prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or age between 40 and 70; promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program of equal employment and cause each of its subcontracting agencies to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.
- 6. In any written or oral communications, the Organization shall identify the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government as the source of the above-referenced funds; the Organization shall not specifically identify an individual Councilmember as being responsible for the funds donated by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government.

June 25, 2024 Summary and Motions

Chair James Brown called the meeting to order at 1:05 p.m. Vice Mayor Dan Wu and Council Members Chuck Ellinger, Hannah LeGris, Liz Sheehan, Preston Worley, Fred Brown, Jennifer Reynolds, and Kathy Plomin were in attendance. Council Members Tayna Fogle, Shayla Lynch, and Dave Sevigny were also present as non-voting members. Council Member Whitney Baxer was absent.

I. Approval of March 19, 2024 Committee Summary

A motion by Sheehan to approve the March 19, 2024 Committee Summary, seconded by LeGris, the motion passed without dissent.

II. Monthly Financial Update – March 2024

Commissioner Hensley provided a brief update on the monthly financials. Revenue continues to run a positive variance to budget, primarily due to greater than budgeted insurance premium tax collections, investment income, and EMS fees. Payroll withholding tax collections fell slightly to 5.6% growth over prior year. Net profits are trending under FY2023 collections.

While there are significant budgetary savings shown, 10% more has been spent in FY2024 on operating costs than in FY2023. The operating budget currently shows a \$25.7 million positive variance, however, much of that savings is encumbered and will be carried forward to FY2025.

No action was taken on this item.

III. Public Infrastructure Program Update

This item was reported out early at the July 2nd, 2024 Work Session.

IV. Economic Contingency Fund Update

Ashley Simpson, Deputy Chief of Finance, presented on the economic contingency fund update. A history of the ordinance was shared. The original ordinance was approved in 1996 with a budget of \$8.3 million intended to provide sufficient working capital for emergencies and to reduce borrowing costs. The ordinance was also updated in 2006 and 2016 with modifications to the policy and budgetary contributions.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused unpredictable budget years that required budgeting based on projected decreases or very low growth in business taxes. Contributions to the Economic

Contingency fund were suspended during the FY20 – FY22 budget cycles. Federal funding created unexpected fund balances during early COVID years, allowing for additional influx to offset suspended contributions.

LFUCG saves for financial strength, to provide stability during economic volatility, and to provide cash flow and available resources in a state of emergency. Saving provides strong basis for credit ratings and ensures the ability to borrow funds for capital. Moody's scorecard recommends that a AA rated government have between 30-15% of revenue saved as a fund balance.

The proposed changes to the Economic Contingency fund ordinance are to increase the monthly contributions to \$75,000 instead of \$50,000 and to recommend allocating 10% of the unassigned fund balance to be deposited into the fund unless the 10% funding goal has been met. Only the amount needed to attain the 10% goal will be committed to the fund. For example, an estimated contribution of \$4 million would be necessary to reach the 10% goal for FY24.

A motion by Plomin to amend ordinance 50-2016 pertaining to the contingency designation fund policy, seconded by Sheehan, the motion passed without dissent.

V. Adjournment

A motion by LeGris to adjourn at 2:46pm, seconded by Wu, the motion passed without dissent.

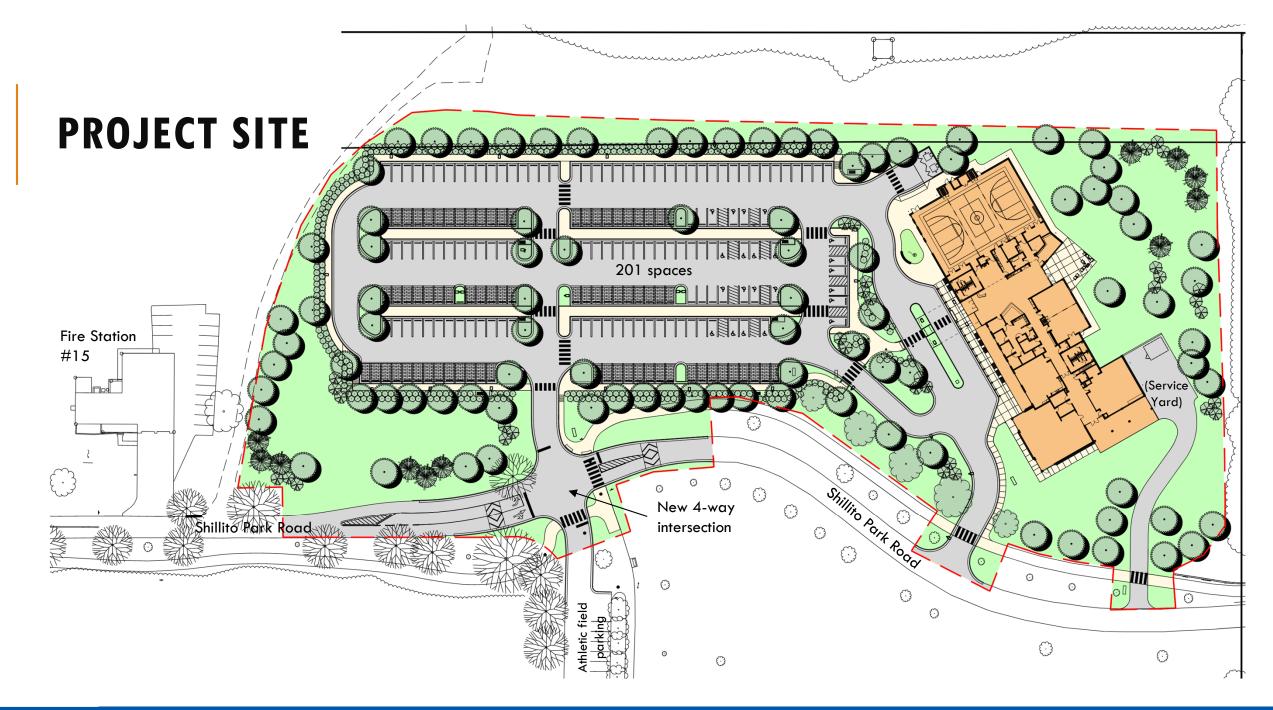

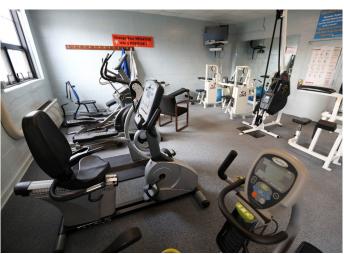

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT, made and entered into on the day of 2024, by and between the **LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT**, an urban county government of the COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY created pursuant to KRS Chapter 67A ("LFUCG"), 200 East Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507, and Prime AE, a Kentucky corporation, ("Organization") with offices located at 651 Perimeter Dr, Suite 300, Lexington, Kentucky 40517. LFUCG intends to proceed with the Town Branch Commons Corridor, TIGER grant post-construction bike and pedestrian user counts and reporting as outlined in Request for Proposals No. 36-2024.

WITNESSETH

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants set forth herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE; TERM.</u> This Agreement shall commence on January 1, 2025 and shall last for a period of 3 year(s) unless terminated by LFUCG at an earlier time.
- **2. RELATED DOCUMENTS.** This Agreement shall consist of the terms herein as well as the following additional documents, which are attached hereto as exhibits and incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated:
 - a. Exhibit "A" Request for Proposals
 - b. Exhibit "B" Addendum of Services
 - c. Exhibit "C" Prime AE RFP Submittal

To the extent that there is any conflict between or among any of these documents, the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall prevail, followed by terms and provisions of Exhibit "A", "B", and "C" in that order.

- **3. SCOPE OF SERVICES.** Organization shall perform the services outlined in the attached Exhibit "A" and "B" for LFUCG in a timely, workmanlike and professional manner (the "Services").
- **PAYMENT.** LFUCG shall pay Organization a total amount not to exceed <u>Sixty-Nine Thousand Four-Hundred Dollars (\$69,400)</u> for the performance of the Services. Payments shall be made in two installments annually, for a total of 6 payments, as set forth in Exhibit B. The funds are limited to the services provided herein and may not be spent by the Organization for any other purpose without the prior written consent of

- LFUCG. Absent any additional written agreement stating otherwise any travel or other expenses are included in the above payment.
- a. LFUCG shall make payment under this Agreement upon timely submission of an invoice(s) from Organization specifying that the Services have been performed, accompanied by data satisfactory to LFUCG to document entitlement to payment for the Services performed to date. LFUCG shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the invoice to pay the invoice amount. LFUCG reserves the right to refuse payment if it is determined by LFUCG that the Services performed or materials provided for the Services are inadequate or defective.
- b. LFUCG also reserves the right to reject any invoice submitted for services more than sixty (60) days after the services were rendered.
- **TERMINATION.** LFUCG, through the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, may terminate this Agreement for any reason whatsoever by providing Organization with at least thirty (30) days advance written notice. Organization shall be entitled for payment of all work performed up to that period of time, calculated on a reasonable basis.
- a. In the event of a termination based upon a material condition of non-performance or default by Organization, LFUCG shall provide Organization advance written notice and a reasonable period of time to cure the breach.
- b. Organization may only terminate this Agreement based upon LFUCG's failure to timely pay for properly invoiced and accepted work. Organization shall provide LFUCG with at least thirty (30) days advance written notice and an opportunity to cure prior to termination.
- c. Organization acknowledges that LFUCG is a governmental entity, and that the validity of this Agreement is based upon the availability of appropriated funding. In the event that such funding is not appropriated in a future fiscal year, LFUCG's obligations under this Agreement shall automatically expire without penalty to the LFUCG thirty (30) days after written notice to Organization. LFUCG shall exercise any application of this provision in good faith.
- **6. REPORTING.** Organization shall provide LFUCG with timely reports and updates related to the provisions of the Services in the form and manner reasonably specified by LFUCG.
- **REGISTRATION; COMPLIANCE; AUTHORITY TO SIGN.** Organization shall be lawfully registered or authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Lexington-Fayette County and shall at all times comply with any and all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations. LFUCG may request proof that Organization has timely filed federal, state, or local tax forms which shall be provided by

Organization on a timely basis. The person signing this Agreement on behalf of Organization is fully authorized to do so.

8. INSURANCE; INDEMNITY.

The risk management provisions of RFP No. 36-2024 attached hereto and copied below. Copies of the required Certificates of Insurance shall be provided to the LFUCG as required therein.

INDEMNITY:

- 1. It is understood and agreed by the parties that Contractor hereby assumes the entire responsibility and liability for any and all damages to persons or property caused by or resulting from or arising out of any act or omission on the part of Contractor or its employees, agents, servants, owners, principals, licensees, assigns or subcontractors of any tier (hereinafter "CONTRACTOR") under or in connection with this agreement and/or the provision of goods or services and the performance or failure to perform any work required thereby.
- 2. CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, save, hold harmless and defend the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and its elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, volunteers, and successors in interest (hereinafter "LFUCG") from and against all liability, damages, and losses, including but not limited to, demands, claims, obligations, causes of action, judgments, penalties, fines, liens, costs, expenses, interest, defense costs and reasonable attorney's fees that are in any way incidental to or connected with, or that arise or are alleged to have arisen, directly or indirectly, from or by CONTRACTOR's performance or breach of the agreement and/or the provision of goods or services provided that:

 (a) it is attributable to personal injury, bodily injury, sickness, or death, or to injury to or destruction of property (including the loss of use resulting therefrom), or to or from the negligent acts, errors or omissions or willful misconduct of the CONTRACTOR; and (b) not caused solely by the active negligence or willful misconduct of LFUCG.
- 3. In the event LFUCG is alleged to be liable based upon the above, CONTRACTOR shall defend such allegations and shall bear all costs, fees and expenses of such defense, including but not limited to, all reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses, using attorneys approved in writing by LFUCG, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- 4. These provisions shall in no way be limited by any financial responsibility or insurance requirements, and shall survive the termination of this agreement.
- 5. LFUCG is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that LFUCG is unable to provide indemnity or otherwise save, hold harmless, or defend the CONTRACTOR in any manner.

6. Notwithstanding, the foregoing with respect to any professional services performed by CONTRACTOR hereunder (and to the fullest extent permitted by law), CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, save, hold harmless and defend LFUCG from and against any and all liability, damages and losses, including but not limited to, demands, claims, obligations, causes of action, judgments, penalties, fines, liens, costs, expenses, interest, defense costs and reasonable attorney's fees, for any damage due to death or injury to any person or injury to any property (including the loss of use resulting therefrom) to the extent arising out of, pertaining to or relating to the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of CONTRACTOR in the performance of this agreement.

INSURANCE: Organization shall maintain for the duration of this Agreement:

General Liability \$1 million per occurrence, \$2 million aggregate

(Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01) or \$2 million combined single limit

Auto Liability \$1 million per occurrence

The policies above shall contain the following conditions:

- a) All Certificates of Insurance forms used by the insurance carrier shall be properly filed and approved by the Department of Insurance for the Commonwealth of Kentucky (DOI). LFUCG shall be named as an additional insured in the General Liability Policy and Commercial Automobile Liability Policy using the Kentucky DOI approved forms.
- b) The General Liability Policy shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance retained by LFUCG.
- c) LFUCG shall be provided at least 30 days advance written notice via certified mail, return receipt requested, in the event any of the required policies are canceled or non-renewed.
- d) Said coverage shall be written by insurers acceptable to LFUCG and shall be in a form acceptable to LFUCG. Insurance placed with insurers with a rating classification of no less than Excellent (A or A-) and a financial size category of no less than VIII, as defined by the most current Best's Key Rating Guide shall be deemed automatically acceptable.

RENEWALS: After insurance has been approved by LFUCG, evidence of renewal of an expiring policy must be submitted to LFUCG, and may be submitted on a manually signed renewal endorsement form. If the policy or carrier has changed, however, new evidence of coverage must be submitted in accordance with these Insurance Requirements.

SAFETY & LOSS CONTROL:

CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local safety standards related to the performance of its works or services under this Agreement and take necessary action to

protect the life, health and safety and property of all of its personnel on the job site, the public, and LFUCG.

VERIFICATION & COVERAGE:

CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish LFUCG with all applicable Certificates of Insurance signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf prior to final award, and if requested, shall provide LFUCG copies of all insurance policies, including all endorsements.

RIGHT TO REVIEW, AUDIT & INSPECT:

CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that LFUCG may review, audit and inspect any and all of its records and operations to insure compliance with these Insurance Requirements.

DEFAULT:

CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that the failure to comply with any of these insurance, safety, or loss control provisions shall constitute default and that LFUCG may elect at its option any single remedy or penalty or any combination of remedies and penalties, as available, including but not limited to purchasing insurance and charging BIDDER/CONTRACTOR for any such insurance premiums purchased, or suspending or terminating the work.

- **9. RECORDS.** Organization shall keep and make available to LFUCG any records related to this Agreement as are necessary to support its performance of the services for a period of at least five (5) years following the expiration or termination of this Agreement, or as otherwise required depending upon the source of funds. Books of accounts shall be kept by Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of Organization related to this Agreement and shall be made available to LFUCG upon request.
- a. LFUCG shall be the owner of all final documents, data, studies, plans, reports, and information prepared by Organization under this Agreement.
- b. Organization understands and agrees that this Agreement and any related documents may be subject to disclosure under the Kentucky Open Records Act and will comply with any reasonable request by LFUCG to provide assistance with such a request.
- **10.** <u>ACCESS.</u> Organization shall allow LFUCG any necessary reasonable access to monitor its performance under this Agreement.
- **11. CONTRACTUAL RELATIONSHIP ONLY.** In no event shall the parties be construed, held or become in any way for any purpose the employee of the other party, or partners, associates or joint ventures in the conduct of their respective endeavors or otherwise.
- **EQUAL OPPORTUNITY; FAIRNESS ORDINANCE.** Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, and shall (a) prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, or handicap, (b) promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program of equal employment, and (c) cause any subcontractor or

agency receiving funds provided pursuant to this Agreement to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices. Organization agrees to comply with LFUCG's Fairness Ordinance (Ordinance No. 201-99) and all sources of applicable law, including those specified in any Exhibit attached to this Agreement and incorporated herein by reference.

- **SEXUAL HARASSMENT.** Organization must adopt or have adopted a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. ANNUAL AUDIT.** Organization agrees that all revenue and expenditures related to this Agreement shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountants who shall express an opinion as to whether or not revenue and expenditures during the year audited have conformed to state and local law and regulation. A copy of this audit, or clean audit opinion letter from an independent certified public accountant, shall be submitted to LFUCG each year of the Agreement.
- **15. INVESTMENT**. Any investment of the funds received pursuant to this Agreement must fully comply with any restrictions imposed by law.
- **16. NO ASSIGNMENT**. Organization may not assign any of its rights and duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of LFUCG.
- **17. NO THIRD PARTY RIGHTS.** This Agreement does not create a contractual relationship with or right of action in favor of a third party against either Organization or LFUCG.
- **18. KENTUCKY LAW AND VENUE.** This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and venue for all actions shall lie in the Circuit Court of Fayette County, Kentucky.
- **19. AMENDMENTS.** By mutual agreement, the parties to this Agreement may, from time to time, make written changes to any provision hereof. Organization acknowledges that LFUCG may make such changes only upon approval of its legislative authority, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council, and the signature of its Mayor.
- **20. NOTICE.** Any written notice required by the Agreement shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following:

PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT, is made and entered into on the 2024 day of 2024, by and between the LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT, an urban county government of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to KRS chapter 67A (hereinafter Government) on behalf of its Department of Public Safety (hereinafter Sponsor), and LEXINGTON-FAYETTE ANIMAL CARE AND CONTROL, LLC, a Kentucky limited liability company (hereinafter Organization), with offices located at 1600 Old Frankfort Pike, Lexington, KY 40504;

WITNESSETH:

That for and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein stated, Government and Organization agree as follows:

- 1. Government hereby retains Organization for the period beginning on July 1, 2024, and continuing for a period of twelve (12) months from the date.
- Government shall pay Organization the sum of Two Million Forty-six Thousand Dollars (\$2,046,000.00) for the services required by this Agreement, said services being more particularly described in the Addendum attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference, one-twelfth (1/12) of which shall be payable on or before the fifteenth day of each month, July-June, inclusive.
- 3. Government shall lease thirteen (13) vehicles to Organization as further consideration for the services required by this Agreement. Said vehicles shall only be used for purposes of animal control, shall be leased to Organization for use during the term and for the purposes authorized by this Agreement and shall be subject to the additional terms of a lease agreement between the parties.
- 4. Organization shall perform all duties and services included in the Addendum attached hereto faithfully and satisfactorily at the time, place and for the duration prescribed herein.
- 5. Organization shall keep itself informed of all national and state laws and all municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance of this Agreement, and shall at all times observe and comply with such laws, ordinances and regulations, whether or not such laws, ordinances or regulations are mentioned herein, and shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Government, its officers, agents and employees against any liability arising from or based on violation or alleged violation of any such laws, ordinances or regulations.
- 6. Organization represents that it has filed federal, state and local income tax returns required by law in the legally prescribed time and manner. Upon request, Organization will provide copies of all executed originals of the aforementioned tax returns filed for Organization's most recent or current tax year.

- 7. Organization shall, at the end of each month and by no later than the fifteenth (15th) working day of the succeeding month, on such forms as the Sponsor shall provide, submit to Sponsor: a report containing, for each of the services enumerated in the Addendum attached hereto, which were provided in the preceding month, (a) a description of the services provided, including the quantity of services provided, and (b) any monies collected on behalf of the Urban County Government with an invoice requesting payment. Any and all provisions of the Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, the compensation of the Organization for each month of the Agreement shall not be paid unless and until Organization submits the monthly report and invoice required hereunder.
- 8. Books of accounts related to this Agreement shall be kept by Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transaction of Organization. The books of accounts, together with all bonds, notes, bills, letters and other writings belonging to Organization, shall be maintained at the principal place of business of Organization set forth in this Agreement. Government shall have free and complete access to the books, papers and affairs of Organization at all reasonable times and, if it desires, it may have the books and papers of Organization audited and examined by auditors, accountants or attorneys. Any examination shall be at the expense of the Government.
- 9. Government may designate such persons as may be necessary to monitor and evaluate the services rendered by Organization. Government should have reasonable access to all places where or in which the services required hereunder are being carried on and conducted. Inspection and monitoring of the work by these authorities shall in no manner be presumed to relieve in any degree the responsibility or obligations of Organization, or to constitute Organization an agent of the Government.
- 10. Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, shall prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, sexual orientation or gender identity, or handicap, and shall promote equal opportunity in employment through a positive, continuing program of equal opportunity employment. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.
- 11. Organization shall adopt a written sexual harassment policy. Which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure that provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. The policy shall be given to all employees and shall be posted at all locations where Organization conducts business. The policy shall be submitted to the Commissioner of the Department of Public Safety for review within thirty (30) days of the execution of this Agreement.
- 12. Unless either party, not less than ninety (90) days prior to June 30, 2025, gives the other party notice in writing that this Agreement shall not be extended, the Agreement shall

automatically be extended for successive periods of three (3) months each upon the expiration of each period, upon the same terms and conditions as are contained herein, unless either party shall, not less than ninety (90) days preceding the termination of any period, give the other party notice in writing that this Agreement shall not be so extended.

- 13. This instrument and the Addendum incorporated herein contain the entire agreement between the parties and no statement, promise or inducement made by either party or agent of either party that is not contained in this written Agreement shall be valid and binding; and this Agreement may not be enlarged, modified or altered except in writing signed by the parties and endorsed thereon.
- 14. The Organization agrees that all revenue and expenditures shall be audited annually by independent certified public accountants who shall express an opinion as to whether or not revenue and expenditures during the year audited have conformed to state and local law and regulation. Such audit may be performed in conjunction with and as part of an audit of the Lexington Humane Society, or independently, in the discretion of the Organization. A copy of the audit shall be submitted to Government within ten (10) days of completion.
- 15. Organization agrees that it shall apply all funds received by it from Government in accordance with the following investment policy guidelines:
 - a. Objectives—Capital preservation with surety of income. Reasonable competitive income consistent with high investment quality and purpose of funds. All investments shall conform with state and local law regulations and these Policies.
 - b. Investment Funds Managements—The governing board may elect to either:
 - Manage its investment through its president where the size or complexity of funds to be managed is deemed by the board to be within the training, expertise and/or available time capacity of the president and the operating staff;

Or

- ii. Utilize the professional investment management facilities of a local bank and trust department acting in a fiduciary capacity within the same approved investment policies and federal, state, local and trust laws and regulations. The trust department may utilize its regular short-term 100% U.S. Treasury Fund for daily funds investment. The election of option 1 or 2 should be made consistent with the relative cost incurred and in the case of option 2 the cost shall be competitive among local trust departments.
- c. Investment Policies—Safety and Prudence.
 - i. Short-term liquidity funds shall be invested in "riskless" investments, i.e., deposits in KY commercial banks or savings and loan associations that are fully federally insured or deposits collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities

with a current market value of at least 100%, or in direct obligations of U.S. Treasury securities.

Investments shall be diversified according to maturity in order to meet projected cash flow needs.

Collateral pledged to secure uninsured deposits shall be held at a federal reserve bank with the receipt providing absolute control by the agency.

- ii. Retirement funds, endowment funds, long-term capital reserve funds and any other special funds may be held and invested by a local bank trust department under investment objectives and diversification in accordance with the individual nature of the funds and pursuant to the "prudent man" investment rule as well as general trust law.
- iii. All investments shall be reviewed monthly by a finance or investment committee of the agency.
- iv. Local brokerage firms may hold and invest funds provided that investments are located within KY and are fully insured.
- 16. Any notice or consent required to be given by or on behalf of either party upon the other shall be given by hand delivery or U.S. Mail. If mailed, such notice shall be via certified mail, return receipt requested.

ADDENDUM

- 1. Organization shall operate the Urban County Government's animal care and control program.
- 2. Pursuant to Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances (the "Code") Section 4-22(a), Organization shall provide and maintain an animal shelter as the urban-county animal shelter and designated licensing facility for Government's use. The animal shelter and designated licensing facility shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws.
- 3. In compliance with all applicable federal, state and local laws, Organization shall employ and maintain a staff of animal control officers for the pick-up and handling of animals within Fayette County in accordance with Code Sections 4-2 through 4-10.1, 4-11.1 (to the extent facilities and qualified staff are available for enforcement of Section 4-11.1), 4-12.2, 4-12.3, 4-12.4, 4-12.5, 4-13, 4-13.1, 4-14, 4-16 through 4-22 (excluding the provisions in Section 4-21.1 and 4-21.2 related to the implementation of the Spay and Neuter Grant Program, but including the enforcement provisions thereof), and Article III of Chapter 4 as it relates to the mistreatment of horses. Organization will assist, to the best of its ability, with emergency situations involving natural disaster and other large-scale events as outlined in the MOU with Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government (LFUCG). The staff shall include a minimum of ten individuals with animal control authority at all times. Exceptions to the minimum staff requirement are authorized for reasonable periods to accommodate normal employee turnover.
- 4. Due to the nature of the duties involved and possibility of conflict between Organization's employees and the general public, Organization shall make every reasonable effort to train and counsel employees so that they are able to conduct themselves in a courteous and professional manner while carrying out their duties.
- 5. Organization shall employ sufficient personnel to respond to requests for services during regular business hours and after-hours in response to emergency calls. Emergency calls are defined as calls involving injured animals when the location and type of animal involved is provided, police or fire assistance with animals or animal bite cases when police or fire personnel remain on scene with the animal until the Organization responds, and livestock running at-large. Organization shall not be required to respond to citizen requests after 11:00pm on Monday through Saturday and after 6:00pm on Sunday.

- 6. Organization shall provide for response to emergency calls from the Government's Division of Police and Division of Fire and Emergency Services on a 24-hour daily basis, including weekends and holidays.
- 7. Organization shall maintain an office at least six hours per day, six days per week, exclusive of legally declared urban county government holidays, for the purpose of returning to owners animals picked up or received by Organization, collecting fees, and issuing licenses.
- 8. Under normal circumstances and when determined by Organization to be necessary and feasible, Organization shall provide for patrols to seek out and capture animals running at-large within the county. Organization shall establish the routes of said patrols in an effort to provide more frequent coverage of those areas that prove to be problem areas.
- Organization shall make a reasonable effort to notify the owner of any properly tagged or microchipped animal that it picks up or receives prior to the transfer or euthanasia of the animal.
- 10. Organization shall, in addition to other duties enumerated herein, assist the public in capturing loose dogs, injured animals and animals that pose a threat to public safety; capture and impound, for the purpose of quarantining, any dog, cat or ferret which has bitten someone. Organization's duty to assist the public in capturing loose animals extends only to assistance serving a public purpose, not on private property. Accordingly, Organization is not required to assist the public in capturing wildlife (as defined by KRS 150.010(41), including animals such as ducks, geese, squirrels, skunks, raccoons or opossums) that is a private nuisance or inconvenience and does not pose a risk to public health or safety.
- 11. Organization shall collect and remit to the Urban County Government twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) of the pick-up fee for livestock and fowl set forth in Section 4-21 (c) of the code and shall maintain records indicating the number of and type of animal picked up, the disposition of said animals, and the amount received therefore.
- 12. Organization shall collect the redemption fee set forth in Section 4-21 (d) of the code for impounded dogs and cats, twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) of which shall be remitted to the Urban County Government and the balance of which shall be used for the Spay and Neuter Grant Program.
- 13. Organization shall act as Government's agent for the issuance of animal licenses and may retain six dollars (\$6) of the fee for each altered dog or cat license and ten

dollars (\$10) for each unaltered dog or cat license that it (or its agent) issues pursuant to Section 4-12.3(e) of the Code.

Discrimination and Harassment

LFACC is committed to providing a work environment free of all forms of discrimination and harassment based upon race, sex, color, religion, national origin, age, disability, marital status, veteran status or any other legally protected status. As an associate, you have an obligation to refrain from discrimination and harassment. Harassment is verbal or physical conduct that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion towards a person because of sex, color, race, religion, national origin, marital status, veteran status, age or any other protected category. It includes but is not limited to epithets, slurs or negative stereotyping, threatening, hostile or intimidating acts, and written or graphic material that denigrates or shows aversion towards a person.

HARASSMENT RELIEF

Associates who feel they have been subjected to harassment or know of harassment existing in the workplace, must immediately contact Human Resources and report the facts. All complaints of harassment will be promptly and thoroughly investigated. No adverse action will be taken against any associate who makes a good-faith report of harassment, and retaliation of any kind against such an associate will not be tolerated.

With respect to sexual harassment, LFACC prohibits unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and all other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual or otherwise offensive nature, as well as offensive comments, jokes, innuendoes, and other sexually oriented statements. Examples include, but are not limited to:

Touching, rubbing, or brushing against another's body
Violating someone's "personal space"
Whistling or "cat calling"
Lewd, off-color, sexually oriented comments or jokes
Foul or obscene language that is lewd or off-color
Leering, staring, stalking
Suggestive or sexually explicit posters, calendars, photographs, etc.
Unwanted or offensive letters or poems
Offensive e-mail, voice mail or text messages, and/or
Any other conduct or behavior deemed inappropriate by LFACC

Any associate who wants to report an incident of sexual or other unlawful harassment should promptly report the matter to his or her supervisor. If the supervisor is unavailable, the associate feels uncomfortable or believes it would be inappropriate to contact the person, the associate should contact Human Resources. Associates can raise concerns and make reports without fear of reprisal.

Supervisors and managers at all levels are responsible for ensuring the LFACC work environment is free from sexual and other forms of harassment. If they learn of sexual harassment, whether through an employee complaint, personal observation, or any other source, they have an affirmative obligation to report such information to Human Resources immediately. All efforts will be made to maintain the privacy and confidentiality of any incidents reported and investigated. Anyone engaging in sexual or other unlawful harassment will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

All harassment investigations will be handled in as confidential a manner as possible, consistent with a thorough investigation, and only those persons necessary for the investigation and resolution of the complaint will be given necessary information regarding the case. After concluding the investigation, Human Resources will ordinarily contact the complaining associate to advise him/her with respect to the resolution of the matter. Any affected associate should immediately report any recurrence of harassment or retaliation of any kind to Human Resources.

WHEREAS, the Purchase of Service Agreement between Government and Organization obligates Government to lease thirteen (13) vehicles to Organization to be used for purposes of animal control: and

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein expressed and further contained in the Purchase of Service Agreement, Government and Organization agree as follows:

1. Lease of Equipment:

Government hereby demises, leases and lets to Organization, and Organization rents, leases and hires from Government thirteen (13) vehicles more particularly described in Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The use of all vehicles provided to Organization by Government shall continue to be governed by the terms of this Lease Agreement.

- 2. <u>Lease Term</u>. This Lease shall commence on the date hereof and shall continue until the termination of the Purchase of Service Agreement between Government and Organization.
- 3. <u>Rental</u>. Government and Organization understand and intend that the obligation of Organization to provide animal control services for Government is and shall be sufficient consideration for the rent of the vehicles.
- 4. <u>Title of the Equipment</u>. Title to the vehicles, including any and all repairs and replacements thereof, but excluding any additions made thereto by Organization, shall at all times during the Lease Term be in Government.

- 5. Maintenance of Equipment. Organization agrees that at all times during the Lease Term it shall maintain, preserve, and keep the vehicles in good repair, working order, and condition and that Organization shall from time to time make or cause to be made all necessary and proper repairs, replacements, and renewals. Organization shall obtain regular and routine vehicle maintenance and repair services from Government's Division of Facilities and Fleet Management. At Organization's request, Government will provide such services for Organization, provided, however, that the cost to Government shall not exceed the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) and any cost in excess of this sum shall be borne by Organization. Government shall submit a statement to Organization for the actual parts, supplies and costs incurred by Government in providing these services to Organization, in excess of the not-toexceed amount, and Organization will reimburse Government for such costs within thirty (30) days of receipt of the statement. Upon request, Government will provide Organization with an estimate of anticipated costs of repair and will inform Organization of the then current total cost incurred by Government in providing vehicle maintenance and repair services for Organization. Organization shall use its best efforts to fully comply with all applicable Division of Facilities and Fleet management policies and procedures.
- 6. Taxes and Charges. In the event that use, possession, or acquisition of any vehicle is found to be subject to taxation in any form, Organization will pay during the Lease Term all taxes and governmental charges of any kind whatsoever that may at any time be lawfully assessed or levied against or with respect to the vehicles, and any vehicle or other property acquired in substitution for or as a replacement of the vehicles, s well as all other charges incurred in the operation, maintenance, use, and upkeep of the vehicles.
- 7. <u>Insurance</u>. Organization shall, at its own expense, cause casualty and property damage insurance coverage to be carried and maintained with respect to the vehicles, in an amount not less than \$500,000, which coverage shall be sufficient to protect the Full Insurable Value of the vehicles and to protect Government and Organization from liability in all events. All insurance proceeds from casualty losses shall be payable to Government and Organization as their interest in vehicles, and additions thereto, may appear.
- 8. <u>Disclaimer of Warranties</u>. GOVERNMENT MAKES NO WARRANTY OR REPRESENTATION, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, AS TO THE VALUE, CONDITION, MERCHANTABILITY, OR FITNESS FOR PARTICULAR PURPOSE OR FITNESS FOR USE OF THE VEHICLE, OR ANY WARRANTY WITH RESPECT THERETO. In no event shall

Government be liable for any incidental, indirect, special or consequential damage in connection with, or arising out of, this Lease Agreement.

- 9. <u>Use of Equipment.</u> Organization will not install, use, operate, or maintain the vehicles improperly, carelessly, in violation of any applicable law, or in a manner contrary to that contemplated by the Purchase of Service Agreement between Government and Organization. Organization shall obtain and maintain all permits and licenses, if any, necessary for use and operation of the vehicles. In addition, Organization shall comply in all respects with all laws of the jurisdiction in which it operates any of the vehicles.
- 10. <u>Assignment of Lease</u>. This Lease and the interest of the Organization in the vehicles may not be assigned or encumbered in whole or part by Organization for any reason without the prior written consent of Government.
- 11. <u>Indemnification</u>. Organization shall indemnify, protect and hold harmless Government from and against any and all liabilities, obligations, losses, claims and damages whatsoever, regardless of the cause thereof, and expenses in connection therewith, arising out of, or as the result of entering into this Lease Agreement and the use of any of the vehicles.

AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government previously assisted Commerce Lexington, Inc. ("Commerce Lex") with creating and funding a Regional Economic Development Collective (or hereinafter the "Initiative") to support counties within the Bluegrass Region of Kentucky, including Bourbon, Clark, Fayette, Franklin, Jessamine, Madison, Montgomery, Scott, and Woodford ("the Counties"), by entering into a series of agreements to provide funding to Commerce Lex for efforts related to the Initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and Commerce Lex agreed that a separate not for profit entity should be created to administer the Initiative, and Greater Lex, Inc., has been created specifically to do so; and

WHEREAS, to assist Greater Lex, Inc. in the administration of the Initiative, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and Commerce Lex assigned the December 31, 2021 and the November 14, 2022 agreements which provided funding for the Initiative to the non-profit organization; and

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government desires to further invest \$322,000.00 for the Initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government wishes to continue to partner with Greater Lex to administer this regional economic development planning and collaboration initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government ("Lexington") has determined that this Initiative fulfills a public purpose by providing for economic development assistance; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants set forth herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Greater Lex, will administer the Regional Economic Development Collaborative ("the Initiative"), as further described in Section 3 and the attached Exhibit A (Scope of Work), which is incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated, on behalf of Lexington.
- 2. Lexington shall provide Greater Lex with \$322,000 in funding for the Initiative, contingent upon the final approval by the Urban County Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government's Fiscal Year 2025 budget, which must be spent on Lexington's behalf in a manner consistent with paragraph 3 and the attached Exhibit A (Scope of Work), unless otherwise agreed to by the parties. No funds provided under this Agreement shall be expended on administrative costs unless agreed to in advance by Lexington. In no event shall administrative costs exceed \$30,000 in total.

- 3. The Initiative is a collaboration between governmental and economic development partners across the Bluegrass on the following non-excusive list of priorities:
 - a) Emphasizing strategies to increase workforce participation in the region;
 - b) Improving availability and affordability of housing for the region;
 - c) Developing new leaders and engage more people in regional collaboration efforts;
 - d) Working within the region to have a supply of shovel-ready sites for economic development projects;
 - e) Investing more regionally in workforce/job training efforts;
 - f) Emphasizing on infrastructure improvements; and
 - g) Providing more work experience for students in the region.

The expectation is that by no later than January 1, 2025, the Counties will provide pro rata funding based upon their population size in accordance with attached Exhibit B, which is incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated. Should this not occur, Greater Lex shall repay all funds provided by Lexington that remain unspent, at the option of Lexington.

- 4. Greater Lex agrees that the businesses and/or partnership entities are not required to obtain membership in Greater Lex or Commerce Lex.
 - 5. Before receiving any funds under this Agreement, Greater Lex shall:
 - a) ensure that their Executive Committee and full board have been appointed and have met for the first time;
 - b) have their completed Articles of Incorporation filed with the Secretary of State and Bylaws approved by the Greater Lex Executive Board; and

- c) forward the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws to Lexington's Chief Development Officer upon approval.
- 6. Greater Lex will provide Lexington with regular progress updates on the program pursuant to this Agreement on at least a semi-annual basis to the Lexington Economic Development Investment Board and will appear before the Urban County Council or any of its committees to provide progress updates upon Lexington's reasonable request. Greater Lex shall also complete the reports provided as the attached Exhibits B, C, and D and provide to Lexington by January 5, 2025 and July 5, 2025.
- 7. Greater Lex will keep and make available to Lexington any records related to this Agreement such as are necessary to support its performance thereof. Books of accounts shall be kept by Greater Lex and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of Greater Lex related to this Agreement be made available to Lexington upon request. This provision shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 8. Either party may terminate this Agreement for a material breach in performance after placing the breaching party with written notice of the breach and the opportunity to cure. The period to cure the breach shall be reasonable, but in all instances must be at least thirty (30) days. Any unencumbered funds held by Greater Lex at the time of termination of this Agreement shall be returned to Lexington within (30) days of receiving notice. In the event Greater Lex is dissolved any such funds attributed to Lexington shall be returned to Lexington within thirty (30) days of said dissolution.
- 9. Greater Lex shall keep itself fully informed of all national and state laws and all municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance

of this Agreement, and shall at all times observe and comply with such laws, ordinances and regulations, whether or not such laws, ordinances or regulations are mentioned herein, and shall indemnify Lexington, its officers, agents and employees against any claim or liability arising from and based on Greater Lex's violation of any such laws, ordinances or regulations. This indemnification provision shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

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- 10. Unless otherwise provided herein, each party shall be solely responsible for its actions and those of its officials, employees and agents in the performance of this contract and any matters related thereto. This provision shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 11. In no event shall the parties be construed, held or become in any way for any purpose the employee of the other party, or partners, associates or joint ventures in the conduct of their respective endeavors or otherwise.
- 12. Greater Lex shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, shall prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, sexual orientation or gender identity, or handicap, shall promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program of equal employment, and shall cause any agency receiving funds provided pursuant to this Agreement to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.
- 13. Greater Lex represents that is has adopted, or will adopt, a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of

prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints.

14. Lexington may designate such persons as may be necessary to monitor and evaluate the services rendered hereunder by Greater Lex. Lexington, its agents and employees, shall, at all times, have unrestricted access to all places where or in which the services required hereunder are being carried on and conducted. Inspection and monitoring of the work by these authorities shall in no manner be presumed to relieve in any degree the responsibility or obligations of Greater Lex.

15. Greater Lex agrees that all revenue and expenditures shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountants who shall express an opinion as to whether or not revenue and expenditures during the year audited have conformed to state and local law and regulation. A copy of this audit shall be submitted to the Government within ten (10) days of completion.

16. Notice – Any written notice required by the Agreement shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following:

17. Neither party may assign any of its rights and duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other party.

- 18. This Agreement does not create a contractual relationship with or right of action in favor of a third party against either Greater Lex or Lexington.
- 19. If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, this Agreement shall remain in full force and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.
- 20. This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and venue for all actions shall lie in Fayette County, Kentucky.
- 21. By mutual agreement, the parties to this Agreement may, from time to time, make written changes to any provision hereof. Greater Lex acknowledges that Lexington may make a material change only upon approval of its legislative authority, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council, and the signature of its Mayor.
- 22. This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties and no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, oral or otherwise, which are not embodied herein shall be effective for any purpose. This Agreement shall replace any previous agreement between the parties on the same subject matter.

Purpose of Request: The Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention (OHPI) funded the Hope Center, Inc. to provide street outreach services in response to RFP 24-2023, approved for an initial term by the Urban County Council on July 13, 2023 (RES 400-2023). The Hope Center proposed and was selected for a term of three years to provide street outreach services; due to a change in funding source, a separate agreement was required for years two and three.

Street outreach services are a vital part of Lexington's homelessness response system. With 82 individuals found to be experiencing unsheltered homelessness on the evening of the 2024 Point-in-Time Count and many more persons at risk of experiencing unsheltered homelessness, street outreach brings housing-focused supportive service to those most unlikely or unable to seek assist for themselves. Hope Center's team includes peer support specialists, peer mentors, a housing navigator, a licensed clinician, and a SOAR specialist for connection with SSI/SSDI benefits. This team works in coordination with the OHPI, LFUCG Community Paramedicine, Lexington Police Department, Eastern State Hospital, and other are providers while not duplicating efforts.

PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT, made and entered into on the day of September 2024, by and between the **LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT**, an urban county government of the COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY created pursuant to KRS Chapter 67A, and located at 200 East Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507 (hereinafter referred to as "LFUCG"), and **HOPE CENTER**, **INC.**, a Kentucky non-profit corporation pursuant to KRS Chapter 273, whose post office address is P.O. Box 6, Lexington, KY 40588 (hereinafter referred to as "Organization").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Organization provides street outreach case management services to individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness or at risk of experiencing unsheltered homelessness;

WHEREAS, the parties previously entered into a Subrecipient Agreement on July 17, 2023 in which LFUCG provided funding to the Organization under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) for the Organization's street outreach services.

WHEREAS, the above mentioned services are no longer funded by ARPA.

WHEREAS, LFUCG now wishes to provide local funding for the continuation of the above mentioned services.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants set forth herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which are acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. **EFFECTIVE DATE; TERM.** This Agreement shall be for the term beginning on August 1, 2024, and ending July 30, 2025, unless terminated by LFUCG at an earlier time. This Agreement is subject to automatic renewal for one (1) additional term, beginning on August 1, 2025, and ending July 30, 2026, unless LFUCG determines it does not wish to exercise the option to renew. The renewal amount for the additional term shall not exceed the amount provided in the initial term and shall be subject to and contingent upon sufficient funds being appropriated and future approval by the Urban County Council.
- **RELATED DOCUMENTS.** This Agreement shall consist of the terms herein as well as the following additional documents, which are attached hereto as exhibits and incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated:
 - a. Exhibit "A" RFP #24-2023

- b. Exhibit "B" Organization's Response to RFP #24-2023
- c. Exhibit "C" Revised Budget

To the extent that there is any conflict between or among any of these documents, the terms and provisions of this Agreement shall prevail, followed by terms and provisions of Exhibit "A", "C", and "B" in that order.

- **3. SCOPE OF SERVICES.** Organization shall perform the services outlined in the attached Exhibits for LFUCG in a timely, workmanlike and professional manner (the "Services").
- 4. PAYMENT. LFUCG shall pay Organization a total amount not to exceed Three Hundred and Sixteen Thousand and Six Hundred and Forty Dollars and 00/100 Cents (\$316,640.00) for the performance of the Services. Payments shall be made monthly for expenditures the Organization actually incurred, only after receipt of the monthly invoice(s). The funds are limited to the services provided herein and may not be spent by the Organization for any other purpose without the prior written consent of LFUCG. Absent any additional written agreement stating otherwise, any travel or other expenses are included in the above payment.
- a. LFUCG shall make payment under this Agreement upon timely submission of an invoice(s) from Organization specifying that the Services have been performed, accompanied by data satisfactory to LFUCG to document entitlement to payment for the Services performed to date. LFUCG shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the invoice to pay the invoice amount. LFUCG reserves the right to refuse payment if it is determined by LFUCG that the Services performed or materials provided for the Services are inadequate or defective.
- b. LFUCG also reserves the right to reject any invoice submitted for services more than sixty (60) days after the services were rendered.
- **TERMINATION.** LFUCG, through the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, may terminate this Agreement for any reason whatsoever by providing Organization with at least thirty (30) days advance written notice. Organization shall be entitled for payment of all work performed up to that period of time, calculated on a reasonable basis.
- a. In the event of a termination based upon a material condition of non-performance or default by Organization, LFUCG shall provide Organization advance written notice and a reasonable period of time to cure the breach.
- b. Organization may only terminate this Agreement based upon LFUCG's failure to timely pay for properly invoiced and accepted work. Organization shall provide LFUCG with at least thirty (30) days advance written notice and an opportunity to cure prior to termination.

- c. Organization acknowledges that LFUCG is a governmental entity, and that the validity of this Agreement is based upon the availability of appropriated funding. In the event that such funding is not appropriated in a future fiscal year, LFUCG's obligations under this Agreement shall automatically expire without penalty to the LFUCG thirty (30) days after written notice to Organization. LFUCG shall exercise any application of this provision in good faith.
- **REPORTING.** Organization shall provide LFUCG with timely reports and updates related to the provisions of the Services in the form and manner reasonably specified by LFUCG.
- **REGISTRATION; COMPLIANCE; AUTHORITY TO SIGN.** Organization shall be lawfully registered or authorized to do business in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Lexington-Fayette County and shall at all times comply with any and all applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations. LFUCG may request proof that Organization has timely filed federal, state, or local tax forms which shall be provided by Organization on a timely basis. The person signing this Agreement on behalf of Organization is fully authorized to do so.
- **8. INSURANCE; INDEMNITY.** The risk management provisions of RFP #24-2023 are incorporated herein by reference as if fully stated. Copies of the required Certificates of Insurance shall be provided to LFUCG as required therein.
- **9. RECORDS.** Organization shall keep and make available to LFUCG any records related to this Agreement as are necessary to support its performance of the services for a period of at least five (5) years following the expiration or termination of this Agreement, or as otherwise required depending upon the source of funds. Books of accounts shall be kept by Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of Organization related to this Agreement and shall be made available to LFUCG upon request.
- a. LFUCG shall be the owner of all final documents, data, studies, plans, reports, and information prepared by Organization under this Agreement.
- b. Organization understands and agrees that this Agreement and any related documents may be subject to disclosure under the Kentucky Open Records Act and will comply with any reasonable request by LFUCG to provide assistance with such a request.
- **10.** <u>ACCESS.</u> Organization shall allow LFUCG any necessary reasonable access to monitor its performance under this Agreement.
- **11. CONTRACTUAL RELATIONSHIP ONLY.** In no event shall the parties be construed, held or become in any way for any purpose the employee of the other party,

or partners, associates or joint ventures in the conduct of their respective endeavors or otherwise.

- **EQUAL OPPORTUNITY; FAIRNESS ORDINANCE.** Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, and shall (a) prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, or handicap, (b) promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program of equal employment, and (c) cause any subcontractor or agency receiving funds provided pursuant to this Agreement to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices. Organization agrees to comply with LFUCG's Fairness Ordinance (Ordinance No. 201-99) and all sources of applicable law, including those specified in any Exhibit attached to this Agreement and incorporated herein by reference.
- **SEXUAL HARASSMENT.** Organization must adopt or have adopted a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. The policy shall be given to all employees and clients and shall be posted at all locations where Organization conducts business. The policy shall be made available to LFUCG upon request.
- **14. ANNUAL AUDIT.** Organization agrees that all revenue and expenditures related to this Agreement shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountants who shall express an opinion as to whether or not revenue and expenditures during the year audited have conformed to state and local law and regulation. A copy of this audit, or clean audit opinion letter from an independent certified public accountant, shall be submitted to LFUCG each year of the Agreement.
- **15. INVESTMENT**. Any investment of the funds received pursuant to this Agreement must fully comply with any restrictions imposed by law.
- **16. NO ASSIGNMENT**. Organization may not assign any of its rights and duties under this Agreement without the prior written consent of LFUCG.
- **17. NO THIRD PARTY RIGHTS.** This Agreement does not create a contractual relationship with or right of action in favor of a third party against either Organization or LFUCG.
- **18. KENTUCKY LAW AND VENUE.** This Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and venue for all actions shall lie in the Circuit Court of Fayette County, Kentucky.
- **19. AMENDMENTS.** By mutual agreement, the parties to this Agreement may, from time to time, make written changes to any provision hereof. Organization acknowledges

that LFUCG may make such changes only upon approval of its legislative authority, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council, and the signature of its Mayor.

20. NOTICE. Any written notice required by the Agreement shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the following:

ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties and no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, oral or otherwise, which are not embodied herein shall be effective for any purpose. This Agreement shall replace any previous agreement between the parties on the same subject matter.

Determine additional BMPs, if any, needed to achieve water quality standards/benchmarks.

Update Water Quality Maps.

Objective: Update WRWMP BMP Table.

Activities:

Reconvene Wolf Run Watershed Council (WRWC) and meet, at a minimum, every quarter during grant. Update WRWMP BMP Table using information from Goal Objective 3.2 and following Chapter 6 of the Kentucky (KY) Watershed Planning Guidebook.

Update WRWMP BMP Maps.

Create an addendum in the WRWMP showing all projects completed to date.

Plan of Work

The overall goal of implementing water quality projects recommended in the WRWMP (2013) and by updating the BMP Table in the WRWMP is to continue the momentum to improve water quality that the residents, professionals, and government officials have created over the years of dedication to the Wolf Run Watershed. This will be achieved through several activities noted above and detailed below.

One project the WRWMP BMP Table (#48) recommends is to retrofit a commercial basin that drains 22 acres of professional office area. There is 500LF of concrete channel running through this basin, 280LF is classified as an ephemeral stream, and the entire concrete channel will be removed and a more natural drainage waterway within the detention basin will be created. This drainage channel will not be a full stream restoration due to constraints and integrity of the detention basin; however, by removing the concrete channels, it will encourage infiltration, dispersal of stormwater flows across more of the basin bottom, and filtration through native plants and trees. The basin is currently turf mowed, but through this retrofit process, the grass and any invasive species will be removed and native plants and trees installed. In addition, evaluation of the necessity of the chain-link fence will occur. If possible, this fence will be removed and benches will be placed at the edges of the basin to provide an outdoor setting for passive recreation.

LFUCG Division of Water Quality (DWQ) completed a portion of WRWMP BMP #49 - Southland Association's Green Infrastructure Feasibility Study (aka Southland Area Storm Drainage Project) in 2018. One project the Southland Study recommended was to divert stormwater from a drainage channel parallel to the railroad tracks (3,200 LF) into a filtration basin to capture pollutants, specifically sediment, from this drainage area (21 acres). There is a storm sewer system that captures this drainage area 75 feet from LFUCG-owned water quality lots off Derby Drive. This project proposes to divert this stormwater onto city property, thru an existing utility easement, and allow it to migrate through a filtration basin prior to it flowing back into the stormwater system off Regency Road. This property is within a small neighborhood and to enhance the look, along with function, flowering native plants and trees will be installed for color and to encourage pollinator species to use this area. Additionally, educational signage will be installed and this area will be used for BMP tours, a geocaching location, passive recreation (bird watching), etc.

To determine effectiveness of these two BMPs, pre- and post-construction monitoring at the instream outfall on Southland Drive will occur during 4 wet weather events (2 pre and 2 post). These monitoring events will follow the QAPP approved for the LFUCG Watershed-Focused Monitoring Program. The results will be incorporated into the updated WRWMP, 2013, discussed below.

Public input and education is a large part of the detention basin projects. As a part of this grant, the WRWC will be reactivated to meet, at a minimum, on a quarterly basis to discuss design ideas, educational signs, and monitoring results. The public will be invited to attend these meetings through advertisement in various platforms

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and outlets, such as, but not limited to, Facebook (Live Green Lexington, Friends of Wolf Run, etc.), Council Member Newsletters, Next Door, and email.

While the Council is reconvened, it is also an ideal time to update the BMP Table of the WRWMP using the Watershed Plan Update Guidance (KDOW 2022). The WRWC will also work closely with other stakeholders in the watershed, including but not limited to, Friends of Wolf Run, University of Kentucky, Kentucky River Watershed Watch, etc., to assist in updating this BMP Table.

Since the completion of the approved WRWMP, 2013, 30-40 projects have been implemented and recommended studies completed. In addition, the LFUCG Watershed-Focused Monitoring Program is completing an instream sampling within the Wolf Run Watershed in 2022-2023. The results from this monitoring program, and two additional wet weather monitoring events, will be used to compare to the original water quality data to see if these projects have made an improvement in the watershed. Not only will this comparison be made, the new water quality monitoring information will be used to update the pollutant load calculation worksheets and determine if any additional projects need to be added to the WRWMP BMP Table. Several other studies, such as the Urban Tree Canopy Report (UTC, 2022) will also be used to identify additional small scale projects with the watershed. The BMP Table will also be updated by removing the projects completed to date and creating an addendum to the WRWMP with project information. In addition, water quality maps and BMP implementation maps will be updated. This information will be shared through an interactive map on-line (similar to the tool created for the West Hickman Watershed). The end goal is to add this updated BMP Table as an approved addendum to the WRWMP, 2013.

Through the purchasing process, LFUCG will contract with a qualified engineering firm to complete all required work associated with the two detention basin projects and the BMP Table update. In addition, LFUCG will hire Friends of Wolf Run to assist in advertising and running on-site public input meetings and Wolf Run Watershed Council meetings.

Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP)

This section is only applicable if monitoring or sampling occurs during this project.

LFUCG will develop and submit to the Cabinet for review and approval, a QAPP for the environmental monitoring activities associated with the project described in this Agreement. No project monitoring activities will occur until the QAPP has been reviewed and approved by the Cabinet. LFUCG will ensure that all environmental monitoring activities in this Agreement will be conducted in accordance with the approved QAPP. The approved QAPP will be incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

The Kentucky Division of Water (DOW) requires submittal of a data package after each sampling period, which should include Chain-of-Custody forms, field notes, calibration records of all instrumentation, and a raw data file as submitted from the laboratory. The package will also include relevant notes from field work identifying issues encountered, action needed or changes made to the sampling plan or QAPP. All issues or changes must also be communicated to DOW nonpoint source staff as soon as possible.

A final summary of overall project quality assurance will be submitted at the end of the project. The final Quality Assurance (QA) report should explain and detail the quality processes and controls used in sampling, both by the laboratory and in the field. Examples of QA report content are listed below. The report should summarize the sampling results and outline any and all deficiencies or discrepancies in the data collection and analysis process.

Examples of a QA report content are:

Types and results of quality control samples; field blanks, field splits, field duplicates. Discussion of how the Quality Control (QC) samples met the precision, accuracy, completeness, bias data quality objectives from the QAPP. Explanation of data qualifiers and how it affected the data results (data that is flagged by the laboratory). Corrective action taken for any data quality issues.

Best Management Practices Implementation Plan

This section is only applicable if BMP's occur during this project.

LFUCG shall develop and submit to the Cabinet for review and approval, a Best Management Practices (BMP) Implementation Plan for all BMP implementation activities associated with the project described in this Agreement. No BMP implementation activities shall occur until the BMP Implementation Plan has been approved by the Cabinet. LFUCG shall ensure that all BMP implementation activities in this Agreement shall be conducted in

accordance with the approved BMP Implementation Plan. The approved BMP Implementation Plan shall be incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

The BMP Implementation Plan shall include: (1) a list of BMP technologies to be installed; (2) a description of the technology selection process, to include the estimated cost, relative treatment efficiency, and the minimum operation and maintenance required for the BMP to operate efficiently; (3) a description of how BMPs shall be targeted to specific locations and if locations are known, a map(s) clearly showing the location where the BMP technologies shall be demonstrated; (4) a means of notifying the Division of Water, Nonpoint Point Source (NPS) Section prior to BMP implementation; (5) a financial plan of action, which describes how financial assistance shall be provided for technology demonstration; (6) the type of maintenance agreement to be made with the landowner; and (7) a statement that ensures that all agricultural or forestry BMPs will be consistent with the Kentucky Agriculture Water Quality Act and/or the Forest Conservation Act.

Education Materials

LFUCG shall ensure that all materials to be used in school-based education shall conform to the Kentucky Academic Standards for Assessment. When materials are submitted, the corresponding section of the Kentucky Academic Standards must be cited.

LFUCG shall ensure that all outreach materials conform to the North American Association for Environmental Education's (NAAEE) Environmental Education Materials: Guidelines for Excellence (www.NAAEE.org).

Geographic Information System (GIS) Activities

LFUCG shall ensure that all geospatial data created shall be consistent with Federal Geographic Data Committee (FGDC) endorsed standards. Information on these standards shall be obtained from the web site "www.fgdc.gov" under the topics of "standards" and "publications".

Animal Feeding Operation (AFO) Activities

LFUCG shall ensure that any AFO receiving financial assistance from 319(h) funds will implement a nutrient management plan. An AFO is defined by 40 C.F.R. § 122.23(b) as any lot or facility (other than an aquatic animal production facility) where i) animals (other than aquatic animals) have been, are, or will be stabled or confined and fed or maintained for a total of 45 days or more in any 12 month period, and ii) where crops, vegetation forage growth, or post-harvest residues are not sustained over any portion of the lot or facility.

Training

All personnel involved in monitoring activities that are performed by LFUCG or sub-contractor will be provided (or required to develop) standard operating procedures (SOPs), and will be trained in sampling techniques by DOW staff. This training will be a part of the NPS project conditions, and will not incur any additional cost to the vendor.

Subrecipients must submit certification and disclosure forms required by 40 CFR 34.110 and the "Lobbying and Litigation" T&C for subawards in excess of \$100,000.

Uniform Grant Guidance Requirements (UGG)

Subrecipients must comply with 2 CFR Part 200 requirements when they award procurement contracts, make subawards, and incur other costs borne by EPA financial assistance.

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3. Environmental Authorities

These requirements typically apply when an EPA funded project involves construction, remediation of contamination in water, soil, or buildings, and similar activities which alter the physical environment. Other environmental laws may apply to a project independent of EPA funding. Financial assistance for research, training, technical assistance and related outreach, environmental education, program operations, or installation of pollution control equipment on vehicles or vessels, are generally not affected by these requirements. Note that this list of environmental authorities is for informational purposes only and is not intended to provide guidance on compliance in the context of a particular EPA assistance agreement.

Clean Air Act and Clean Water Act

Section 306 of the Clean Air Act (CAA) and section 508 of the Clean Water Act (CWA), as implemented by Executive Order 11738 (1973), prohibit performance of Federal assistance agreements at facilities disqualified due to certain violations of the CAA or CWA. Disqualified facilities are listed in the System for Award Management. Subrecipients are required to check SAM, to determine if facilities that will be used to perform contracts or subawards are listed in SAM.

National Environmental Policy Act

Where applicable, the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal agencies to conduct an environmental review of their proposed actions, with a view toward ensuring informed decision-making and public input. EPA's NEPA regulations are at 40 CFR Part 6, and note that certain EPA actions are exempt from NEPA. Pass-through entities and subrecipients may be required to assist EPA with NEPA compliance, where appropriate.

National Historic Preservation Act

Section 106 of the NHPA requires federal agencies to take into account the effects of their undertakings on historic properties and to provide the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) a reasonable opportunity to comment on such undertakings. Under the ACHP's regulations, consultations generally occur in the first instance with state and/or tribal historic preservation officials, with direct ACHP involvement in certain cases. EPA funded projects with the potential to affect historic properties – i.e., properties listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places – may implicate this statute. This may include, for instance, EPA-funded projects that involve alteration of structures (e.g., asbestos abatement) that are historic properties or construction/remediation on culturally sensitive lands. Pass-through entities should work with their Project Officer to ensure that subrecipients are available to work with EPA on any required consultation process with the State or Tribal Historic Preservation Office prior to commencing the project to ensure compliance with section 106 of the NHPA.

Protection of Wetlands, Executive Order 11990 (1973), as amended

EPA funded projects involving new construction in wetlands may implicate this Executive Order. The terms and conditions of the EPA assistance agreement may require pass-through entities to ensure that subrecipients assist EPA in determining whether a proposed project will be located in (or affect) a wetland, and if so, evaluating practicable alternative locations for the project or other mitigation.

Coastal Zone Management Act

This statute requires EPA to ensure that Agency funded activities in coastal areas are consistent with state coastal zone management plans that have been approved by the Department of Commerce. Pass-through entities and subrecipients should consult directly with the state Coastal Zone Management agency during the planning stages to ensure that the EPA funded project will be consistent with the state's coastal zone management plan.

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Coastal Barriers Resources Act

This statute restricts federal financial assistance that would encourage development in the Coastal Barriers Resources System, a collection of undeveloped and ecologically sensitive barrier formations along the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts of the United States, and the shore areas of the Great Lakes, and adjacent wetlands, marshes, estuaries, inlets, and near-shore waters. During the planning phase of a proposed project located in the Coastal Barriers Resources System, pass-through entities and subrecipients should consult with the state Coastal Zone Management agency to determine whether a proposed project will have an effect on the system, and if so, the alternative sites or mitigating measures that must be incorporated in the project's design.

Wild and Scenic Rivers Act

This statute prohibits federal assistance for water resource projects that would have direct and adverse effects on, invade, or unreasonably diminish, the special values of a congressionally designated wild and scenic river. Pass-through entities and subrecipients should consult with appropriate state or federal (National Park Service or Bureau of Land Management) agency to determine whether the project or any alternatives under consideration may affect a designated river.

Endangered Species Act (ESA)

This statute requires Federal agencies to ensure that their activities are not likely to jeopardize endangered species, adversely modify designated critical habitats, or incidentally take (injure or kill) endangered animals without authorization, in consultation with the appropriate federal wildlife agency (the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service or National Marine Fisheries Service) as described in 50 CFR Part 402. The ESA consultation process is triggered when an action "may affect" ESA-protected species or critical habitat. Pass-through entities and subrecipients should coordinate with EPA to ensure consultation occurs where appropriate."

Safe Drinking Water Act

Precludes the use of EPA financial assistance for projects that would contaminate sole source aquifers. Pass-through entities and subrecipients must contact state officials to determine whether a sole source aquifer is in the vicinity of the proposed project. If a sole source aquifer is in the project planning area, then the assistance recipient, in consultation with state ground water officials, must conduct investigations to determine if the aquifer could be contaminated by the project. If the project could potentially affect ground water supplies, the assistance recipient, in consultation with ground water officials, must elect an alternative site or devise adequate mitigating measures.

Build America, Buy America (BABA) Act

The Subrecipient agrees to comply with the BABA Act requirements in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, P.L. 117-58, §§ 70911-70917, as described in the EPA General Terms and Conditions. These requirements do not supersede the American Iron and Steel requirement; both requirements apply and work in conjunction.

Subrecipients of an award of Federal financial assistance are hereby notified that none of the funds provided under this award may be used for a project for infrastructure unless:

- all iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States—this means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- 2. all manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States—this means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States; and the cost of the components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product has been established under applicable law or regulation; and

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3. all construction materials are manufactured in the United States—this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States.

The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project, but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

DOMESTIC PREFERENCE REQUIREMENTS:

1. American Iron and Steel

The Subrecipient agrees that treatment works projects must comply with the American Iron and Steel requirement which provides that the iron and steel products used in the project must be produced in the United States, unless a waiver is granted.

- (a) Definitions. As used in this award term and condition-
 - (1) "iron and steel products" means the following products made primarily of iron or steel: lined or unlined pipes and fittings, manhole covers and other municipal castings, hydrants, tanks, flanges, pipe clamps and restraints, valves, structural steel, reinforced precast concrete, and construction materials.
 - (2) Steel means an alloy that includes at least 50 percent iron, between .02 and 2 percent carbon, and may include other elements.
- (b) Domestic preference.
 - (1) This award term and condition implements the Water Resources Reform and Development Act of 2014 (WRRDA) by requiring that all iron and steel products used for a project for the construction, alteration, or repair of a treatment work are produced in the United States except as provided in paragraph (b)(2) and (b) (3) of this section and condition.
 - (2) This requirement does not apply with respect to a project if a State agency approves the engineering plans and specifications for the project, in that agency's capacity to approve such plans and specifications prior to a project requesting bids, prior to January 17, 2014.
 - (3) This requirement shall not apply in any case or category of cases in which the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency finds that:—
 - (1) applying the requirement would be inconsistent with the public interest;
 - (2) iron and steel products are not produced in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available quantities and of a satisfactory quality; or
 - (3) inclusion of iron and steel products produced in the United States will increase the cost of the overall project by more than 25 percent.

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Memorandum of Agreement Standard Terms and Conditions Revised April 2024

1.00 Effective Date

All Memorandum of Agreements are not effective until the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet or his authorized designee has approved the agreement and until the agreement has been submitted to the government contract review committee. However, in accordance with KRS 45A.700, memoranda of agreement in aggregate amounts of \$50,000 or less are exempt from review by the committee and need only be filed with the committee within 30 days of their effective date for informational purposes.

KRS 45A.695(7) provides that payments on personal service contracts and memoranda of agreement shall not be authorized for services rendered after government contract review committee disapproval, unless the decision of the committee is overridden by the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet or agency head if the agency has been granted delegation authority by the Secretary.

The vendor shall be paid, upon the submission of proper invoices to the receiving agency at the prices stipulated for the supplies delivered and accepted, or services rendered. Unless otherwise specified, payment will not be made for partial deliveries accepted. Payments will be made within thirty (30) working days after receipt of goods or a vendor's invoice in accordance with KRS 45.453 and KRS 45.454.

2.00 EEO Requirements

The Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1978 applies to All State government projects with an estimated value exceeding \$500,000. The contractor shall comply with all terms and conditions of the Act.

3.00 Cancellation Clause

Both parties shall have the right to terminate and cancel this contract at any time not to exceed thirty (30) days' written notice served on the Contractor by registered or certified mail.

4.00 Funding Out Provision

The state agency may terminate this agreement if funds are not appropriated to the contracting agency or are not otherwise available for the purpose of making payments without incurring any obligation for payment after the date of termination, regardless of the terms of the agreement. The state agency shall provide the Contractor thirty (30) calendar day's written notice of termination of the agreement due to lack of available funding.

5.00 Reduction in Contract Worker Hours

The Kentucky General Assembly may allow for a reduction in contract worker hours in conjunction with a budget balancing measure for some professional and non-professional service contracts.

If under such authority the agency is required by Executive Order or otherwise to reduce contract hours, the agreement will be reduced by the amount specified in that document. If the contract funding is reduced, then the scope of work related to the contract may also be reduced commensurate with the reduction in funding. This reduction of the scope shall be agreeable to both parties and shall not be considered a breach of contract.

6.00 Access to Records

The state agency certifies that it is in compliance with the provisions of KRS 45A.695, "Access to contractor's books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence directly pertinent to the contract." The Contractor, as defined in KRS 45A.030, agrees that the contracting agency, the Finance and Administration Cabinet, the Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Legislative Research Commission, or their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, which are directly pertinent to this agreement for

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the purpose of financial audit or program review. The Contractor also recognizes that any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, received during a financial audit or program review shall be subject to the Kentucky Open Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884. Records and other prequalification information confidentially disclosed as part of the bid process shall not be deemed as directly pertinent to the agreement and shall be exempt from disclosure as provided in KRS 61.878(1)(c).

7.00 Violation of tax and employment laws

KRS 45A.485 requires the Contractor and all subcontractors performing work under the contract to reveal to the Commonwealth any final determination of a violation by the Contractor within the previous five (5) year period of the provisions of KRS chapters 136, 139, 141, 337, 338, 341, and 342. These statutes relate to corporate and utility tax, sales and use tax, income tax, wages and hours laws, occupational safety and health laws, unemployment insurance laws, and workers compensation insurance laws, respectively. Disclosure of any violations is required prior to the award of any state contract and throughout the duration the contract.

Failure to disclose violations, shall be grounds for the Commonwealth's disqualification of a contractor or subcontractor from eligibility for future state contracts for a period of two (2) years.

To comply with KRS 45A.485, the Contractor and all subcontractors performing work under this contract shall report any such final determination(s) of any violation(s) within the previous five (5) years to the Commonwealth by providing a list of the following information regarding any violation(s): (1) specific KRS violated, (2) date of any final determination of a violation, and (3) state agency which issued the final determination.

A list of any disclosures made prior to award of a contract shall be attached to the contract. The Contractor affirms that it has not violated any of the provisions of the above statutes within the previous five (5) year period, aside from violations explicitly disclosed and attached to this contract. Contractor further affirms that it will (1) communicate the above KRS 45A.485 disclosure requirements to any subcontractors and (2) disclose any subcontractor violations it becomes aware of to the Commonwealth.

8.00 Discrimination

This section applies only to agreements disbursing federal funds, in whole or part, when the terms for receiving those funds mandate its inclusion. Discrimination (because of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or disability) is prohibited. During the performance of this agreement, the Contractor agrees as follows:

The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or age. The Contractor further agrees to comply with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), Public Law 101-336, and applicable federal regulations relating thereto prohibiting discrimination against otherwise qualified disabled individuals under any program or activity. The Contractor agrees to provide, upon request, needed reasonable accommodations. The Contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, religion, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age or disability. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following; employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensations; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.

In all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, the Contractor will, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment

The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance.

The Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965 as amended, and of the rules, regulations and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, as amended, and by the rules, regulations and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations and orders.

In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this agreement or with any of the said rules, regulations or orders, this agreement may be cancelled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further government contracts or federally-assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, as amended, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in or as otherwise provided by law.

The Contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) of section 202 of Executive Order 11246 in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations or orders of the Secretary of Labor, issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order No. 11246 of September 24, 1965, as amended, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance; provided, however, that in the event a Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the agency, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

BABA Contract Language

REQUIRED CONTRACT LANGUAGE

Any contracts that may include a project for infrastructure, including subcontracts, shall include the following terms:

Buy America Domestic Procurement Preference:

As required by Section 70914 of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (also known as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act), P.L. 117-58, on or after May 14, 2022, none of the funds under a federal award that are part of Federal financial assistance program for infrastructure may be obligated for a project unless all of the iron, steel, manufactured products, and construction materials used in the project are produced in the United States, unless subject to an approved waiver. The requirements of this section must be included in all subawards, including all contracts and purchase orders for work or products under this program.

Recipients of an award of Federal financial assistance are hereby notified that none of the funds provided under this award may be used for a project for infrastructure unless:

- 1. all iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States—this means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- 2. all manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States—this means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States; and the cost of the components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard that meets or exceeds this standard has been established under applicable law or regulation for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product; and
- 3. all construction materials are manufactured in the United States—this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States.

The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project, but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

Waivers

When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the Federal funding agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements, subject to review by the Made in America Office. The Federal funding agency may waive the application of the domestic content procurement preference in any case in which it is determined that one of the below circumstances applies:

- 1. Non-availability Waiver: the types of iron, steel, manufactured products, or construction materials are not produced in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available quantities or of a satisfactory quality;
- 2. Unreasonable Cost Waiver: the inclusion of iron, steel, manufactured products, or construction materials produced in the United States will increase the cost of the overall project by more than 25 percent; or
- 3. Public Interest Waiver: applying the domestic content procurement preference would be inconsistent with the public interest.

There may be instances where an award qualifies, in whole or in part, for an existing general applicability waiver. If the specific financial assistance agreement, infrastructure project, or non-domestic materials meets the criteria of an existing general applicability waiver within the limitations defined within the waiver, the recipient is not required to request a separate waiver for non-domestic materials.

If a general applicability waiver does not already apply, and a recipient believes that one of the above circumstances applies to an award, a request to waive the application of the domestic content procurement preference may be submitted to the financial assistance awarding officer in writing. Waiver requests shall include the below information. The waiver shall not include any Privacy Act information, sensitive data, or proprietary information within their waiver request. Waiver requests will be posted to the specific Federal funding agencies website and are subject to public comment periods of no less than 15 days. - 2. Recipient or subrecipient name and Unique Entity Identifier (UEI).
- 3. Federal agency who issued the award.
- 4. Federal financial assistance listing name and number.
- 5. Federal financial assistance title of project.
- 6. Federal Award Identification Number (FAIN).
- 7. Federal financial assistance funding amount.
- 8. Total estimated infrastructure expenditures, including all Federal and non-federal funds (to the extent known).
- 9. Infrastructure project description(s) and location(s) (to the extent known).
- 10. List of iron or steel item(s), manufactured goods, and construction material(s) the recipient seeks to waive from Buy America preference requirements. Include the name, cost, countries of origin (if known), and relevant <u>PSC</u> or <u>NAICS</u> code for each.
- 11. A certification that the recipient made a good faith effort to solicit bids for domestic products supported by terms included in requests for proposals, contracts, and nonproprietary communications with the prime contractor.

- 12. A statement of waiver justification, including a description of efforts made (e.g., market research, industry outreach) by the recipient, in an attempt to avoid the need for a waiver. Such a justification may cite, if applicable, the absence of any Buy America-compliant bids received in response to a solicitation.
- 13. Anticipated impact if no waiver is issued.

Approved waivers will be posted on the Federal funding agencies waivers website; recipients requesting a waiver will be notified of their waiver request determination by an awarding officer.

Questions pertaining to waivers should be directed to the financial assistance awarding officer.

Definitions

"Construction materials" includes an article, material, or supply that consists of only one of these items:

- Non-ferrous metals:
- Plastic and polymer-based products (including polyvinylchloride, composite building materials, and polymers used in fiber optic cables);
- Glass (including optic glass);
- Fiber optic cable (including drop cable);
- Optical fiber;
- Lumber;
- Engineered wood; and
- Drywall.

"Construction Materials" does **not** include cement and cementitious materials, aggregates such as stone, sand, or gravel, or aggregate binding agents or additives.

"Domestic content procurement preference" means all iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States; the manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States; or the construction materials used in the project are produced in the United States.

"Infrastructure" includes, at a minimum, the structures, facilities, and equipment for, in the United States, roads, highways, and bridges; public transportation; dams, ports, harbors, and other maritime facilities; intercity passenger and freight railroads; freight and intermodal facilities; airports; water systems, including drinking water and wastewater systems; electrical transmission facilities and systems; utilities; broadband infrastructure; and buildings and real property. Infrastructure includes facilities that generate, transport, and distribute energy.

"Project" means the construction, alteration, maintenance, or repair of infrastructure in the United States.

Contractors and subcontractors must submit the "EEC-003 — Contractor Certificate of Compliance with Build America, Buy America Provisions for Federally Assisted Contracts" form, to the awarding entity. Contractors and subcontractors certify that no federal financial assistance funding for infrastructure projects will be provided unless all the iron, steel, manufactured projects, and construction materials used in the project are produced in the United States. Contractors and subcontractors shall also disclose any use of federal financial assistance for infrastructure projects that do not ensure compliance with BABA domestic preference requirement. Such disclosures shall be forwarded to the awarding entity who in turn will forward the disclosures to the Federal funding agency."

The Build America, Buy America Act, enacted under Division G, Title IX of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), applies a domestic content procurement preference requirement (Buy America Requirement) to federally funded public "infrastructure projects." Per Section 70914 of the IIJA funds may not be obligated for an "infrastructure project" unless all of the iron and steel, manufactured products, and construction materials used in the project was produced in the United States or an applicable a waiver to the domestic content procurement preference requirement is used.

Subrecipient Responsibility

The subrecipient is responsible for ensuring the Buy America Requirement flows down to all contracts, subcontracts, and purchase orders for work performed under the proposed infrastructure project. Subrecipients of awards containing the Buy America Requirement must ensure that absent a waiver none of the funds provided under their award may be used for a project for infrastructure unless:

- 1. All iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States. This means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- 2. All manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States. This means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States, and the cost of the components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard that meets or exceeds this standard has been established under applicable law or regulation for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product; and
- 3. All construction materials are manufactured in the United States. This means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States.



The Buy America Requirement only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or permanently affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies brought into the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America Requirement apply to equipment and furnishings that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project.

Compliance Verification

Buy America requirements must flow down to all contracts, subcontracts and purchase orders for work performed under the infrastructure project; therefore, subrecipients must maintain certifications or equivalent documentation for proof of compliance that those articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, affixed to, or otherwise used in the infrastructure project, not covered by a waiver or exemption, are produced in the United States.

The Certificate of Compliance form (Form EEC-003) must be provided by contractor and subcontractors from the suppliers or manufacturers of the iron and steel, manufactured products, and construction materials and flow up from all contractors and subcontractors to the subrecipient.

Subrecipients must keep these certifications with the award/project files and be able to produce upon request from the Federal funding agency, Energy and Environment Cabinet, auditors or Office of Inspector General. Copies of the Certificate of Compliance form (Form EEC-003) may be requested from the Energy and Environment Cabinet.

Before properties are developed within the Fayette County urban service boundary, they are generally taxed solely for Police and Fire protection (Tax District 02 - General Services). However, once a property is recorded, divided and platted for new development, the new properties are moved to the appropriate tax district for other provided services. For example, properties on public streets are placed in the full service (01) tax district that provides refuse collection, streetlights, and street sweeping. Private streets are placed within the 03 tax district, which only includes refuse collection given that property owners maintain their own streets and provide their own streetlights if desired. Property owners also can petition to add city services with a tax district change through this process.

Kentucky Law requires that the Urban County Government notify each property owner by certified mail of a proposed increase in property tax and hold a public hearing. Per the attached schedule, the public hearing will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 12, 2024, during Council Work Session.
