

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky June 27, 2024

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on June 27, 2024 at 6:11 p.m. Present were Vice Mayor Wu in the chair presiding, in the absence of Mayor Gorton, and the following members of the Council: Lynch, Monarrez, Plomin, Reynolds, Sevigny, Sheehan, Worley, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, Fogle, and LeGris. Absent were Council Members Elliott Baxter and Gray.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 051-2024 through 054-2024, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 282-2024 through 301-2024, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by John Rhodes, Chaplain in the Div. of Community Corrections.

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Upon motion by Ms. Monarrez, seconded by Ms. Fogle, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the May 9, 2024, May 16, 2024, June 11, 2024, and June 13, 2024 Regular Council Meetings were approved.

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Vice Mayor Wu asked Angela Justice to join him at the podium, along with Mr. J. Brown, and read a Proclamation declaring June 27, 2024 as Angela Justice Day in Lexington.

Vice Mayor Wu spoke of the importance of and respect he had for special education teachers, noting his wife was also a special education teacher.

Mr. J. Brown read a statement on behalf of Ms. Elliott Baxter in her absence. The statement held Ms. Justice in high esteem noting her energy and ability to connect with her students, and included warm sentiments made by the children of Ms. Elliott Baxter.

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An Ordinance amending the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Zoning Ordinance as follows: amending Article 1-11, relating to definitions; amending Article 3-6, relating to Workforce and Affordable Housing Bonuses; amending Articles 8-11(b), (c), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i), (m), and (o), relating to the Mixed Low-Density Residential (R-2) zone; amending Articles 8-13(d), (f), (g), (h), (m) and (o), relating to the Medium Density Residential (R-4) zone; amending Articles 8-14(d), (g), (h), (i) and (m), relating to the High Density Residential (R-5) zone; amending Articles 8-16(b), (c), (d), (e), (h), (m), and (o), relating to the Neighborhood Business (B-1) zone; amending Articles 8-20(b), (c), (d), (e), (h), (j), (k), (l) and (o) and creating Article 8-20(o)(3), relating to the Corridor Business (B-3) zone; creating Article 8-25, relating to the Corridor Node (CN) zone; amending Articles 9-1, 9-2, 9-3, and 9-6 and creating Article 9-8, relating to Group Residential Projects; amending Articles 11-2(a), (b), and (h), relating to the Interchange Service Business (B-5P) zone; amending Article 12-3(g) and creating Article 12-3(i), relating to the Commercial Center (B-6P) zone; and amending Articles 17-11(d) and (g), relating to signs permitted by specific zone, all in order to modernize the R-2, R-4 and R-5 zones, provide clear delineation between the B-1 and B-3 zones, create a New Corridor Node zone and propose density bonuses for affordable housing was on the docket for second reading.

Upon motion be Mr. Ellinger, seconded by Mr. F. Brown and approved by majority vote (Lynch, Reynolds, Sheehan, Wu, Fogle, LeGris voted No), the Council agreed to allow public comment prior to the second reading of the ordinance.

Mr. Bruce Simpson, attorney, spoke on behalf of several business owners regarding the potential negative impacts of the proposed ordinance and implored the Council to postpone the item until the July 2nd meeting.

Ms. Lynch asked if the postponement would be prudent. Mr. Ellinger responded.

Vice Mayor Wu asked Mr. Worley a question regarding parliamentary procedure. Mr. Worley responded.

Ms. Lynch voiced support to postpone.

Ms. LeGris asked a question about parliamentary procedure. Mr. Worley responded.

Ms. Reynolds asked a procedural questions. Mr. Worley responded. Ms. Reynolds asked Mr. Simpson a question regarding his clients' awareness of the legislation. Mr. Simpson responded.

Mr. J. Brown spoke about the legislative process and asked about the timeline to prepare an amendment. Mr. Simpson responded. Mr. J. Brown asked Dir. Jim Duncan, Div. of Planning, a question regarding potential changes, effects and deadlines to apply for exceptions. Mr. Duncan responded.

Ms. Fogle asked about the timeframe regarding compliance to the ordinance. Mr. Simpson responded.

Mr. Sevigny spoke about notification of the legislation.

Mr. Ellinger motioned, seconded by Mr. F. Brown, to postpone the second reading of the ordinance until July 2, 2024. The motion failed by the following vote:

An Ordinance amending Section 13-13(B) of the Code of Ordinances to create five (5) Medicinal Cannabis Business (Cultivator, Dispensary, Processor, Producer, and Safety Compliance Facility) special fees licenses and setting their fees; creating Section 13-83 of the code to define terms regarding the regulation of Medicinal Cannabis Businesses; creating Section 13-84 of the Code to require an entity who operates a Medicinal Cannabis Business to obtain the applicable special fees license(s), as further defined in Sections 13-85 through Section 13-89, and to provide the information required in the application for a Medicinal Cannabis Business special fees license, and to set the criteria by which the Dir. of Revenue may deny an application, refuse to renew a license, or revoke a license; creating Section 13-90 to require payment of occupational license fees on net profits and on withholdings; creating Section 13-91 of the Code to provide the authority to issue subpoenas to the Administrative Hearing Board, created pursuant to Section 12-6 of the Code, to determine whether violations of this Ordinance have occurred, and setting penalties for violations, and specifying the manner of appeal for citations; and creating Section 13-92 of the Code to provide the procedure to use before denying an application, revoking a license, or refusing to renew a license; and authorizing the Div. of Revenue to amend its regulations consistent with this Ordinance.

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An Ordinance amending Section 23-30(b)(4)(a) of the Code of Ordinances, relating to employees of the Div. of Fire and Emergency Services who are appointed to the positions of Assistant Fire Chief and Fire Battalion Chief, to provide that employees appointed to those positions shall receive a bi-weekly stipend in an amount authorized by the Urban County Council; authorizing a stipend for the appointed position of Fire Battalion Chief in the amount of \$771 bi-weekly; and authorizing a stipend for the appointed position of Assistant Fire Chief in the amount of \$1,471 bi-weekly; all effective July 1, 2024 received first reading.

An Ordinance amending the compensation system salary schedules to provide a one and one-half percent (1.5%) structure movement, applicable to all full-time and part-time positions in the Unified Pay Plan, to the position of Council Administrator, and to two (2) positions of Police and Fire Pension Benefits Specialist; providing that all full-time and part-time employees included in the Unified Pay Plan shall receive a three percent (3.0%) pay increase for FY2025; providing that the Council Administrator and two (2) positions of Police and Fire Pension Benefits Specialist shall receive a three percent (3%) pay increase for FY2025; providing that Sections 21-29(b) and 22-26(b) notwithstanding, all employees at or above the maximum of the grade salary range shall receive a three percent (3.0%) pay increase for FY2025; amending Section 23-28(a) to increase the existing step structure for the positions of Police Chief, Grade 324E, and Fire Chief, Grade 324E, by three percent (3.0%) and adjusting salaries accordingly; and increasing the salary by three percent (3.0%) for three (3) positions of Law Clerk - P\T within the Dept. of Law and one (1) position of Park Patrol Coordinator - P/T within the Div. of Parks and Recreation, all effective July 1, 2024.
