Part 1 - GENERAL OVERVIEW

Section 1.1 - Mission or Goal Statement

The Lexington Police Department supports Kentucky's mission and goals in supporting the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's (FMCSA's) goal to reduce roadway fatalities, injuries and property damage involving large trucks and buses. The Lexington Police Departments goal is to increase the number of Level One, Level Two and Level Three inspections performed for the 2023-2025 grant year to reduce commercial motor vehicle (CMV) crashes and fatalities. The department will increase the number of all Level inspections by two percent (2%) each calendar year. The Lexington Police Department will continue to utilize activities of enforcement, public awareness, and other traffic safety methods to reduce the large truck and bus collision and fatality rates in Fayette County, KY.

Section 1.2 – Program Structure

The Lexington Police Department's certified commercial motor vehicle (CMV) inspection officers performed 1,042 commercial vehicle inspections in the calendar year (CY) 2022. Of these inspections, 259 vehicles and 61 drivers met the out-of-service (OOS) criteria, which resulted in the vehicle and/or driver being removed from the roadway until the violations were corrected.

MCSAP Grant overtime was responsible for directly funding 700 inspections of the total CMV inspections conducted by Lexington police officers in the CY2022. These inspections were completed on an overtime basis and paid for with MCSAP or TACT Grant funds. This represents 67.17% of the total inspections conducted by Lexington Police Department CMV inspectors during 2022. The Lexington Police Department's certified inspectors worked 1078 overtime hours on MCSAP and TACT Grant time in CY2022.

The Lexington Police Department's 202 goals were to reduce the fatal collision rate involving large trucks and buses per 100 million vehicle miles traveled (VMT) by .005 each calendar year in 2020, 2021, and 2022. To date there has been 0 fatalities in 2022 involving commercial motor vehicles. The Department will continue to utilize activities of enforcement to meet the fatality reduction goals set out in the grant. It is likely the number of crashes and fatalities due to commercial motor vehicles will be down due to the reduced number of vehicles, personal and commercial motor, traveling the roadways due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Below is a chart of inspections completed for the fiscal years 2022, 2021 & 2020 for comparison.

Inspections for the physical year 2020 were decreased due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Inspections through the fiscal year 2022 could also be reduced due to the ongoing pandemic.

In CY 2019 there were 504 collisions involving Commercial motor vehicles. Of the 504 collisions there were 0 fatalities and 53 collisions with 75 reported injuries. In CY 2020 there were 336 collisions involving Commercial motor in Fayette County. Of the 336 collisions there were 0 fatalities and 39 collisions with 61 reported injuries.

The Lexington Police Department, using MCSAP funds, will continue to provide in-service or advanced training in areas of interdiction, roadside inspection, driver fatigue, passenger carrier inspection, and hazmat inspection. Six Lexington Police officers completed NAS Part A and B training during 2020 and 2021, bringing the total number of Lexington Police Department certified truck inspectors to 23.

The Lexington Police Department will continue our goal of increasing inspections on local carriers and interstate carriers utilizing local streets. The Lexington Police Department will request schools to certify additional officers in North American Standards Part A & B, Hazardous Materials, Tank inspections and Passenger Carrier inspections. Lexington lost 4 inspectors in 2019 but gained one new inspector in 2020. The number of commercial vehicle inspectors decreased to 23 in 2020 compared to 28 inspectors in 2018.

The Lexington Police Department will use traffic enforcement and inspection activities as tools to address driver behavior at the time violations occur with the goal of changing the driver's future behavior. Accompanying inspections often reveal additional violations and the information gathered as a result of these CMV inspection activities are entered into the carriers profile in the national database to be used to identify carriers with consistently unsafe practices. Traffic enforcement prevents crashes and removes unsafe vehicles/drivers from the road. Commercial vehicle inspection activities allow officers to "inspect" the driver for signs of fatigue, substance abuse, and for disqualification. All CMV inspection officers have access to PBT units for roadside use and all MCSAP officers are trained in the use of these PBT units.

NOTE: Fatalities Rates per 100 million VMT for years 2017-2019 were calculated using the number of fatalities resulting from Large Truck collisions in Fayette County divided by vehicles miles traveled by ALL vehicles traveling Fayette County roadways. Narrative:

An analysis of the daily vehicle miles traveled provided by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KTC), Central Planning Office shows over an estimated 8,000 million vehicle miles were traveled in Fayette County, KY in 2020 and the KYOPS collision database shows there were 0 fatalities from large truck collisions during the same time period. The fatality rate for collisions involving large trucks per 100 million total vehicles miles traveled (VMT) was 0 in 2020 in Lexington-Fayette County.

In 2019, 8,057 million vehicle miles were traveled in Fayette County, KY and the KYOPS collision reporting database shows there were 0 fatalities involving large trucks during the same time period. The fatality rate per 100M (million) VMT for Fayette County KE in 2019 was 0.

In 2018, 8,054 million vehicle miles were traveled in Fayette County, KY and the KYOPS collision reporting database shows there was 4 fatality in a large truck collision during the same period. The fatality rate per 100M (million) VMT for Fayette County, KY in 2017 was 0.0000004.

Section 2.2 – Motorcoach/Passenger Fatality Reduction Goals: 2018 - 2020

KYOPS shows no passenger carrying commercial vehicles were involved in any of the reported fatal collisions in Fayette County, KY from January 01, 2019 to December 31, 2020. The Lexington Police Department currently deploys 3 CMV inspectors certified to conduct inspections on passenger carrying vehicles. These CMV inspectors conduct terminal inspection of passenger carrying commercial vehicle including jurisdictional mandate inspections. Jurisdictional mandate inspections provide an opportunity to conduct safety checks on vehicles used to provide transportation services to disabled or youth populations. No specific goals were established during this time frame for fatality reduction involving passenger carrying vehicles.

Narrative:

No specific goals were established during this time frame for fatality reduction involving commercial motor vehicles transporting hazardous materials cargo. KYOPS shows no vehicles transporting hazardous materials were involved in any of the reported fatal collisions in Fayette County, KY from January 01, 2020 to December 31, 2020. The Lexington Police Department currently 9 deploys CMV inspectors certified to conduct inspections on commercial motor vehicles transporting hazardous materials. Four of 9 hazardous materials CMV inspectors are also certified to conduct cargo tank inspections.

Narrative:

Section 2.5 – Outreach and Education Goals from Previous Years – Report on Outcomes

Overall, the Lexington Police Department was able to make positive steps toward safer commercial vehicle operation in Fayette County, KY. The Lexington Police Department continuously evaluates outreach opportunities and community outreach is a key component of the Lexington MCSAP Grant program.

Activity: Provide an outreach program on FMCSA regulations to local commercial motor carriers Goal: Provide 2 outreach activities annually to local carriers in 2022, 2023, and 2024 Narrative: Lexington provides email and personal assistance in learning the FMCSA website upon request which is especially important to new, local carriers. Lexington is prohibited from acting in a consultant role for a single carrier and most small local companies lack the resources to pay employees to attend free training classes. Lexington CMV inspection officers were involved in various outreach activities including an outreach event for several passenger carrier companies at a local bus terminal.

Activity: Provide an outreach program on Driver Safety to local commercial motor carriers Goal: Provide 2 local driver safety educational activities annually in 2022, 2023, and 2024 Narrative: Lexington is prohibited from acting in a consultant role for a single carrier and most small local companies lack the resources to pay employees to attend free training classes.

Activity: Provide an outreach programs on vehicle safety and FMCSR guidelines Goal: Provide 2 outreach activities annually on vehicle safety / FMCSR guidelines in 2022, 2023, and 2024

Narrative: Carrier's trucks are needed during business hours and Lexington is prohibited from going to one place of business to provide vehicle safety classes for one carrier. Lexington plans to provide outreach activities through training such as Traffic Incident Management or conferences provided by sections or agencies outside the Lexington Police Department Traffic Unit.

Activity: Provide a seat belt usage program for local commercial motor carriers Goal: Provide 2 seat belt usage outreach activities annually to local carriers in 2022, 2023, 2024 . Narrative: Lexington CMV inspection officers discussed seat belt usage at each of the outreach activities during 2020.

minimize lost productivity.

Narrative: Lexington CMV inspection officers discussed seat belt usage at each of the outreach activities during 2020.

Activity: Provide outreach programs/classes on vehicle safety and FMCSR guidelines

Goal: Educate local carriers on FMCSRs.

Narrative: Lexington provides email and personal assistance in learning the FMCSA website upon request which is especially important to new local carriers. Carrier's trucks are needed during business hours. We plan on providing safety inspection outreach activities during early morning or late evening hours to accommodate motor carriers.

Problem Statement Narrative: The Lexington Police Department continues to identify commercial vehicle collision problem areas using the most current crash data available. Lexington has provided additional enforcement resources in areas identified as problem areas. There were 504 total commercial motor vehicle (CMV) collisions in 2019 resulting in 53 injured motorists and 0 fatalities.

Program Activity Plan: The Lexington Police Department will use traffic enforcement and inspection activities in CY 2022, 2023, and 2024 as tools in addressing driver behavior at the time of occurrence to encourage safer driving behavior in the future. Accompanying inspections often reveals additional violations and the information gathered as a result of these activities is entered into the carrier's profile in the national database to identify carriers with a culture of unsafe practices. Traffic enforcement and CMV inspections prevents crashes and removes unsafe vehicle/drivers from the road. Conducting commercial vehicle inspections allow officers to "inspect" the driver for signs of fatigue, substance abuse or impairment, and for disqualification.

The agency will monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of its CMV Crash Reduction Goal by quarterly and annually by evaluating the following data elements:

Performance Measurement 1 (Required) – How will the agency monitor its crash reduction goal throughout the year?

Using traffic enforcement activities and commercial vehicle inspection activities, the Lexington Police Department will increase the number of Level One inspections (2%), the number of Level Two inspections (2%) and the number of Level Three inspections (2%) compounded annually to decrease total collisions and fatalities involving commercial motor vehicles by 2024.

Section 3.2 – -Specific Safety Program Objective 1: Driver Fatigue Reduction

Problem Statement Narrative: According to the Commercial Motor Vehicle Driver Fatigue and Alertness Study (1996) conducted by the Federal Highway Administration, driver fatigue has been identified as a contributing factor the in CMV collision. The strongest variable influencing driver was time of day, specifically during the hours of midnight to dawn. The Lexington Police Department implemented driver inspections (Level III) during CY 2020 and will continue this effort in 2022, 2023, and 2024.

Performance Objective: To reduce crashes and fatalities by identifying driver fatigue impariment, and disqualification through increased roadside Level III inspections by 2% annually. Lexington completed 127 Level III inspections in 2020. The department has set a goal to complete 130 Level III inspections in 2022, 133 Level III inspections in 2023 and 136 Level III Inspections in 2024.

The Lexington Police Department will deploy CMV inspectors to identify driver fatigue in CMV drivers during all hours of the day and night with special emphasis on 4 pm to 4 am hours. The Lexington Police Department implemented driver inspections (Level III) during nighttime hours in CY2015 and this effort will continue.

The Lexington Police Department continues to use a roadside inspection program for the majority of commercial vehicle inspection activity. If need arises, Lexington officers also assist Kentucky State Police, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement at fixed facility areas. The MCSAP Coordinator will ensure inspection blitzes are performed on local streets to encourage inspection of local carriers.

The Lexington Police Department will continue to deploy CMV inspectors on local streets and at least one commercial vehicle inspection blitz will be conducted on a local roadway annually.

Section 4.3 – Traffic Enforcement

The Lexington Police Department has 23 certified inspectors providing traffic enforcement and inspections of commercial motor vehicles. Additionally, a supervisor serves as MCSAP Coordinator with the responsibility to oversee all MCSAP functions, including inspector inservice training, inspection reviews, and CMV Awareness Training to all Lexington officers. Lexington MCSAP officers are trained in Part A & B commercial vehicle inspections with several inspectors certified to inspect hazardous materials, tankers and/or passenger carrying vehicles. Lexington will continue to request additional training classes in each of these specialized areas. CMV crashes and fatalities in Lexington will be reduced by increasing the use of mobile patrol units to increase traffic enforcement and inspection activity to ensure commercial vehicles are being operated safely and noncommercial vehicles around commercial vehicles are also operated safely. Lexington utilizes crash information from the Kentucky crash reporting system to identify high crash areas within Lexington. The Lexington Police Department will then deploy additional traffic enforcement in these areas to reduce CMV collisions by 2% from the previous year. Specific manpower allocation is dependent on current staff levels and MCSAP officer availability. The MCSAP Grant allows flexibility in scheduling based on manpower availability and assigns duties per high crash corridors and other activities as required. Lexington has worked with TACT funding on the I-75 corridor in the past several years and hopes to continue in this effort if funding becomes available.

Lexington will continue to enforce FMCSRs and Kentucky Revised Statues through MCSAP blitzes and enforcement patrols in Fayette County. Officers will continue to only issue citations for the most serious OOS violations, serious commercial vehicle violations and moving hazardous violations.

Section 4.4 – Public Education & Awareness

Problem Statement Narrative: (A separate problem statement is not required if the public education and awareness activities are generally supportive of goals established earlier in this document.)

The Lexington Police Department will continue to use materials available through FMCSA and CVSA, purchased with MCSAP funds, to increase CMV Awareness to drivers of smaller vehicles. The Lexington Police Department will continue to provide its MCSAP officer with updated training, using MCSAP funds, in areas of CMV inspections along with hazardous materials and passenger transportation.

Performance Objective:

The Lexington Police Department will perform outreach programs and educate drivers of passenger cars about CMV's by providing multiple in-person presentations to desired groups as well as other types of media and outreach materials. Lexington will expect to continue participation in outreach activities in calendar year 2022, 2023, and 2024.

Program Activity Plan:

The Lexington Police Department plans at least 1 outreach presentations annually in 2022, 2023, and 2024. MCSAP officers will conduct driver safety activities with materials provided. (Materials paid with MCSAP funds). The program will utilize the Lexington public information employee to inform the media and general public regarding all areas that involve traffic safety, driver education, and commercial vehicle enforcement. The Lexington Police Department expects to participate in approximately 1 educational program presentations annually.

The Lexington Police Department will participate in Training, Research and Education for Driving Safety (TREDS) covering a curriculum of, "Just Drive: Deliver Distraction-Free" which covers distracted driving for CDL holders.

Performance Measurement Plan:

The Lexington Police Department will maintain a high level of education and outreach activities documented along with normal monthly and quarterly activity. While it is difficult to predict a performance target, Lexington will expect the outcome to be consistent with the goal of 1 outreach activity annually. The MCSAP coordinator will make assurances that activities will be documented to assure that Lexington is making strong efforts towards public awareness.
