INFORMATION ITEM

Continued Introduction of Key Task Force Recommendations

CAP Entry Point

- New connections to the sanitary sewer system will require a capacity or credit allocation.
- The CAP Entry Point policy refers to when a developer may reserve sewer capacity/credits.
- To meet the requirements of the Consent Decree, a CAP Entry Point no later than tap permit issuance is sufficient.

CAP Entry Point

CAP Entry Point

For developments requiring construction of public infrastructure, **Permanent Allocation** of capacity/credits may be requested upon <u>approval</u> of the *Preliminary Subdivision Plan, Final Development Plan, or Amended Final Development Plan*.

For developments <u>not</u> requiring construction of public infrastructure, Permanent Allocation of capacity/credits is required prior to issuance of building permit. In either case, a tap permit shall not be issued without certification of adequate capacity or proof of credit allocation.

A capacity/credit **Reservation** may be made anytime after <u>submission</u> of a Preliminary Development Plan. Reservations shall expire after 1-year. A 1-year extension may be requested. After 2 years, re-application will be necessary.

CAP Entry Point

Why?

- Minimizes risk to development community by allowing sewer capacity to be secured earlier in land development process than tap permit issuance.
- ✓ Complies with Consent Decree requirements.
- Precedence in other benchmark communities.
- ✓ Approved Preliminary Subdivision Plan, Final Development Plan, and Amended Final Development Plan represents a commitment by LFUCG to allow development to be built.
- ✓ Belief that recommendation has a fairness level that avoids a high administrative cost burden.
- ✓ Avoids potential negative impacts from Permanent Allocations too early in the land development process.



Use of Record

Use of Record

Refers to the sewage flow from an existing, developed property that is already accounted for in the hydraulic model (baseline condition).

Credits earned from redevelopment to a lesser sewer use will be retained with the property unless released by property owner.

Why?

- Credits earned from a change in property use were earned with private dollars.
- ✓ Loss of unused capacity by the property to the public credit bank could be considered a partial taking.
- Can be used by property at a future date.
- ✓ In other benchmark communities the unearned capacity is retained with the property.





Essential Services

- Defined in Consent Decree (CD) as:
 - Health care facilities
 - Public safety facilities
 - Public schools
 - Illicit connections (septic tank removals, etc.)
 Fayette County Health Dept. approval required.
 - Other facilities as agreed upon in writing by EPA and EPPC.
- New connections from Essential Services are authorized in CD even if no adequate capacity or sufficient banked credits.
- Deduction from credit bank still made.



Essential Services

Essential Services

Allow exception in Consent Decree for Essential Services.

Further define public schools and healthcare facilities as follows:

- Public schools must be a registered non-profit in tax code
 501(c)(3) or as defined by the State.
- Health care facilities must be licensed by Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services and meet the definition in KRS 216B.015, or be a building or facility that is contiguous to or connected to a licensed hospital and which serves as a medical office building, site for delivery of outpatient healthcare services or is otherwise integral to hospital operations or which building or facility is required to have Certificate of Need under KRS 216B.010, et. seq.

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TASK FORCE RECOMMENDATIONS

No.	Recommendation	Description	Decision
1.	Credit Banking Unit	Bank accounts at SSO locations, treatment plants, major pump stations, and capacity-limited trunk sewers.	Plan
2.	Credit Harvest Date	Negotiate with EPA for the date of the baseline condition in hydraulic models (Group 1 = 8/19/2008; Groups 2&3 = 6/1/2009)	Plan
3.	Use of Record	Credits earned from redevelopment to a lesser sewer use will be retained with the property unless released by property owner.	Implement
4.	Essential Services	Allow exception in CD for Essential Services.	Plan
5.	Third-Party Trading	No third-party trading of publicly or privately earned credits.	Implement
6.	Developer-Earned Credit Program (DECP)	Include provision for voluntary DECP. Developer enters contract with LFUCG. LFUCG either does work or has stop-work authority.	Implement

9.	CAP Entry Point	If construction of public infrastructure or subdivision of property, permanent credit allocation at approval of Preliminary Subdivision Plan (PSP) or Final Development Plan (FDP). If no construction of public infrastructure, then permanent allocation required prior to building permit issuance. Reservation may be made anytime after submission of Preliminary Development Plan and has 1-year expiration (with 1-year renewal upon request).	Plan
10.	Grandfathering	All developments with an approved PSP, FDP, or Amended FDP will receive a permanent credit allocation (grandfathered). All developable property within EA#2 will also be grandfathered, regardless if an approved Plan is on file.	Plan
11.	Essential Services	Established criteria to further define public schools and health care facilities to guide reviewer during CAP implementation. Public schools must document non-profit status in tax code 501(c)(3) or as defined by state. Health care facilities must meet KRS 216B.015 definition and be licensed by the state. Amended to include ancillary buildings adjacent to licensed health care facilities. (Companion to Recommendation No. 4.)	Implement



No.	Recommendation	Description	Decision
12.	Administrative Fee	Payment of a non-refundable, administrative/processing fee will be required for capacity/credit requests.	Implement
13.	Deposit/Charge for Credit Allocations	A deposit will be assessed for capacity/credit reservations. The reservation deposit will be applied to Capacity Charge. A non-refundable Capacity Charge will be assessed for permanent capacity/credit allocations.	Implement
14.	Schedule for Full Implementation	CAP will be fully-implemented within 180 days of EPA approval of CAP Plan. LFUCG has set internal target date of July 3, 2013.	Plan
15.	Review Time	Set a goal of 10 days from the date that a completed sewer capacity request is received for a determination letter to be sent to applicant. Average review time will be assessed quarterly.	Implement
16.	Appeals Process	A written appeal may be submitted to Commissioner of Environmental Quality and Public Works. A determination will be made by the Commissioner within 30 days. If appeal based on technical data, then must submit the technical data with appeal.	Implement

17.	Conditional Approvals	Conditional approval may be granted if approved by both the Commissioner of Finance and Commissioner of Planning. LFUCG to set aside dedicated funding to perform sewer improvements necessary to support conditional approval (i.e. will not reprioritize/delay other planned neighborhood or RMP projects).	Implement
18.	Public/Stakeholder Access	Maps illustrating bank boundaries, bank balances, transaction history, and waiting lists will be made available to the public via the internet. Quarterly reports to EPA are also publicly available.	Implement
19.	Program Auditing	CAP to be audited after 2 years and every other year after that. Audit to be performed by third party (i.e. not internal audit).	Implement
