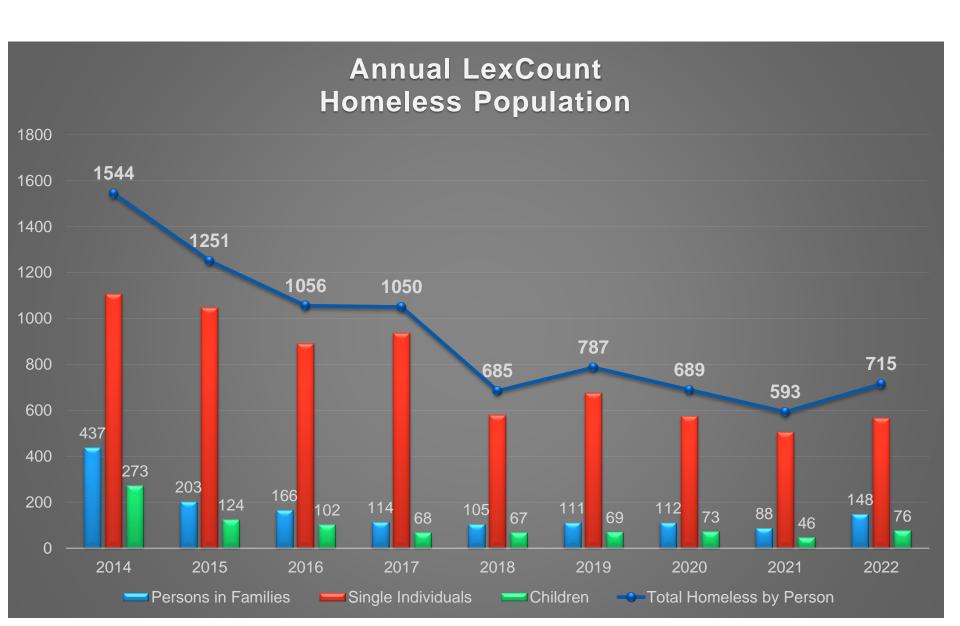

Highlights

- United States Interagency Council on Homelessness Designation of "Effectively Ending Veteran Homelessness"
- Built a Coordinated Entry system
- Designated Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) Lead
- Development innovative programming
 - 50 New Programs
- Coordinated a comprehensive, effective response to a historic pandemic
- Increased Continuum of Care partners from 16 to over 75 diverse and in organizations
- In full compliance with Department of Housing and Urban Development
- Increase federal funding by 35%
 - 2015: \$1,589,681 2021: \$2,139,207
 - Funded over 100% of ask in 2018 and 2020

- Eviction Diversion and Mediation Program (\$1,500,000 first year)
- Expand Existing Reentry Program into Jails (\$65,000 annually)

- Enhance Use of Lex End Homelessness Fund at Bluegrass Community Foundation (\$120,000 annually)

Expanding Permanent Supportive Housing

- Establish Homeless Preference for Housing Choice Vouchers (no additional cost)
- Establish Moving on Strategies with Housing Authority (no additional cost)
- Expand Permanent Supportive Housing Units (\$2 million annually chronically homeless base cost estimates as high as \$8 million annually for full impact)
