## Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting Lexington, Kentucky April 20, 2023

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on April 20, 2023 at 6:01 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: J. Brown, Ellinger, Fogle, Gray, LeGris, Lynch, Monarrez, Plomin, Sevigny, Sheehan, Worley, Wu, and F. Brown. Absent were Council Members Elliott Baxter and Reynolds.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 022-2023 through 037-2023, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 128-2023 through 208-2023, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Queen Mother Osunnike Anke, President and cofounder of Institute of Whole Life Healing.

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Upon motion by Mr. Ellinger, seconded by Mr. Worley, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the March 9, 2023 Council Meeting and the March 23, 2023 Council Meeting were approved.

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Mayor Gorton asked Mr. William Faulconer, a Boy Scout from Troop 98, to join her at the podium and read a Proclamation declaring April 20, 2023 as William Faulconer Day in Lexington.

Mayor Gorton explained Mr. Faulconer's commitment to service and announced that he would be earning the rank of Eagle Scout at a ceremony the next day.

Mr. Faulconer thanked his family and his troop for their support.

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Mayor Gorton asked Ms. Donna George to join her at the podium, along with Council Member Gray, and read a Proclamation declaring April 20, 2023 as Donna M. George Day in Lexington.

Mayor Gorton stated that Ms. George was the first female principal in Fayette County as well as the first African American principal in Fayette County.

Ms. George spoke of her parents' support to help her reach her goals and accomplish her achievements as well as her faith, which she described as paramount to her success. She thanked those at Bryan Station High School who had worked with her during her time working there.

Council Member Gray shared her pride in presenting Ms. George, who had been her principal when she attended Bryan Station High School, with this honor and gave a reading of the Maya Angelou poem, "Phenomenal Woman." She thanked Ms. George for her support and mentorship.

by written approval of the urban forester or their designee; amending Section 17B-9 to require replacement trees to meet street tree requirements; repealing Section 17B-11 and amending Section 17B-10 to describe suggested tree species and unacceptable tree species; renumbering Section 17B-12 as Section 17B-11; renumbering Section 17B-13 as Section 17B-12 and amending Section 17B-12 to provide that appeals from citations for violations of Chapter 17B of the Code shall be taken to the Infrastructure Hearing Board, with enforcement procedures to conform to Chapter 2B of the Code; and amending Section 16-76 of the code to designate the infrastructure hearing board as the Code Enforcement Board hearing matters relating to enforcement of Ordinances by the Div. of Environmental Services.

An Ordinance amending certain of the Budgets of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government to reflect current requirements for municipal expenditures, and appropriating and re-appropriating funds, FY 2023 Schedule No. 33.
