## Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting Lexington, Kentucky September 11, 2025

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on September 11, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding and the following members of the Council: Elliott Baxter, Hale, Higgins-Hord, LeGris, Lynch, Morton, Reynolds, Sevigny, Sheehan, Wu, Beasley, Curtis, and Ellinger. Absent were Council Members Boone and Brown.
