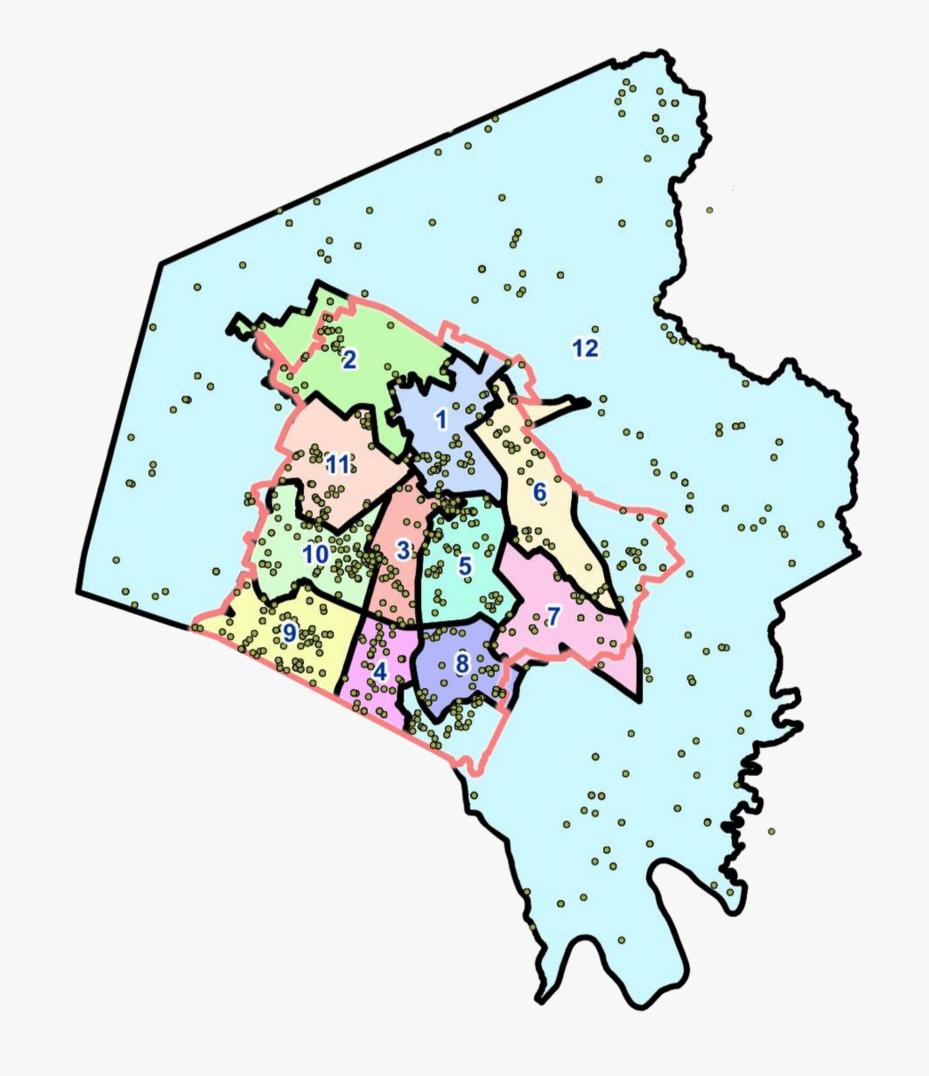

EXPANSION OF SERVICES

For the first time in FCCD history, more individual conservation projects were installed inside the Urban Service Boundary than what took place in the rural area of the county.

Here's a breakdown of urban projects.

543 soil samples analyzed.

273 raised bed vegetable gardens installed.

191 pollinator gardens planted.

111 Soil amendments applied.

83 native trees or shrubs planted.

69 rain barrels installed.

50 composters established.

36 wildlife habitats established.

32 lawns diversified.

27 rain gardens planted.

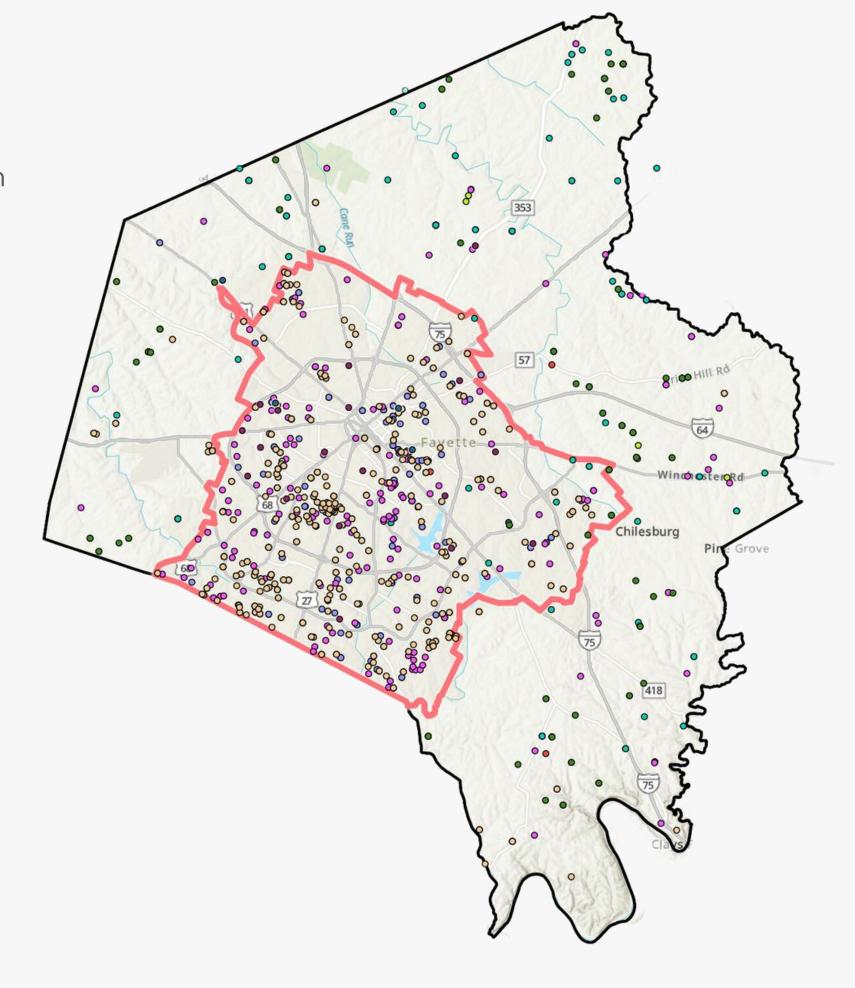
20 garden tools and irrigation supplies utilized

13 container vegetable gardens planted.

13 apiaries augmented.

9 greenhouses constructed or repaired.

3 permeable areas established.

36%	\$221,444.29 Intergovernmental Revenues Tobacco Settlement funding for programs and direct aid.	32%	\$177,659.72 Personnel and Operating Costs Salaries, professional services, supplies, and utility costs.

68% of FCCD's budgeted funds were administered directly to taxpayers through program and education initiatives.

BENEFIT

Whether by matching, donating, or partnering, FCCD allocated 62% of its total budget to conservation projects. Program participants not only dedicated their time to completing projects but also made their own financial contributions in the amount of
