

Comments from Craig Prater:

This contract falls under the Consent Decree.

Contractor is responsible for finding a water source, work with KY American Water Company.

Contractor can dump vactor trucks at Town Branch Waste Water Facility. Must be cautious of overflows when dumping. Fines for overflows and that will passed on to contractor.

Contractor responsible for obtaining any Traffic Permits and all traffic control.

No scaled wages.

Field Inspectors will be available.

This is a 1 (one) year contract with the possibility of a 4 (four) one year renewals. Both parties agree to the extension.

LFUCG is GIS based and can provide maps upon request from contractor.

Questions from Contractors:

Q: TS-11 states uncovering manholes. Does this mean in asphalt areas?

A: No. This is for landscape and lawn areas

Q: Is there a field in GIS to delineate between easement and ROW?

A: No.

Q: Do we have to measure and record depth of manholes?

A: Yes. Manhole depths is a required field in PACP.

Q: TS-21 states 2 copies of DVD/External Hard Drive. Is this necessary?

A: No. 1 External Hard Drive can be used. Currently we pass back and forth a hard drive for interim deliverables. At the end of the contract one hard drive is to contain all of the data from the contract.

2.02 B on TS13 describes equipment as being a Self-Propelled Lateral Inspection/Pan and Tilt Mainline Inspection system capable of operating in lateral pipes 2" and larger. Could you please confirm no lateral inspections will be necessary and a lateral unit will not be required?

Answer:

Lateral launch inspection is not required for this contract.

TS 2.02 D Paragraph 2 states The camera will stop and perform a 360-degree rotation at each service connection (lateral).

Question:

Could the GIS shapefiles be provided at this time so Contractors could evaluate off-road easement work versus sewer located in the paved rights-of-way?

Answer:

No. We can only supply shape files to entities under contract. The maps at the end of the bid document show two areas that have been chosen for this contract and represent an estimated 50% of the required footage.

If the unit price and the item total are illegible or are omitted, the bid may be determined nonresponsive. If a lump sum total price is illegible or is omitted, the bid may be determined nonresponsive.

For a lump sum based bid, the item total is the bid amount the Division uses for bid comparison.

For a unit price based bid, the sum of the item totals is the bid amount the Division uses for bid comparison.

The LFUCG's decision on the bid amount is final. This contract is a one year contract with the possibility of four (4) renewals. The Contractor cannot change prices on renewal without Owner's approval and verification from material supplier.

The contract, if awarded, will be on the basis of materials and equipment specified in the specifications without consideration of possible substitute or "or equal" items.

The estimated quantities of items of unit price work are not guaranteed and are solely for the purpose of comparison of bids and determining an initial Contract price. Determination of the actual quantities and classification of unit price work performed by the Contractor will be made by the Engineer in accordance with the General Conditions.

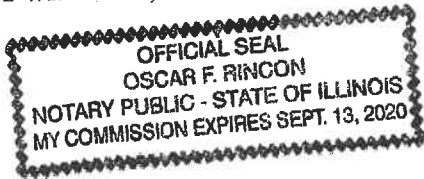

- 2) A Woman-Owned Business Enterprise (WBE) is defined as a business which is certified as being at least 51% owned, managed and controlled by one or more women.

- 3) A Disadvantaged Business (DBE) is defined as a business which is certified as being at least 51% owned, managed and controlled by a person(s) that are economically and socially disadvantaged.
- 4) A Veteran-Owned Small Business (VOSB) is defined as a business which is certified as being at least 51% owned, managed and controlled by a veteran and/or a service disabled veteran.
- 5) Good Faith Efforts are efforts that, given all relevant circumstances, a bidder or proposer actively and aggressively seeking to meet the goals, can reasonably be expected to make. 



PROFILE

Robinson Pipe Cleaning Company is a privately-owned company that is part of the Carylon Corporation. Our main office is in Pittsburgh, PA, and we also operate satellite facility in Louisville, KY. The Carylon Corporation is based in West Palm Beach, FL and owns 14 additional companies throughout the United States. All of the Carylon companies are engaged in similar businesses and share common equipment resources that can be mobilized as necessary for various projects throughout the country.

Long before "environment" became a household word, Carylon Companies were busy providing vital environmental maintenance services to the majority of municipalities and utilities and to more than half of the Fortune 500 companies throughout the United States.

CORPORATE SAFETY POLICY

Each of us must remember that using safe work practices and procedures is not a one-time or occasional part of our work routine. On-the-job safety must be treated as a continuous priority during your employee with our company

Each of us must fully commit ourselves to achieve successful results in our safety program.

COMPANY SAFETY EFFORT

Pre-job Survey

Our safety effort starts with a good job survey. A job is either called for schedule by a customer or a request for a proposal is solicited from a customer.

In either case, a "Call Survey Sheet" is completed by the superintendent/salesman assigned to review the project (see attachment). The form was expanded several years ago to focus on worker and environmental safety before dispatching crews to a job site. Providing the crew with the correct PPE and equipment to perform the service safely will help achieve our goal - loss reduction.

Pre-job Safety Tool Box Talks

A job site safety tool box talk by the job foreman is held prior to the start of a job. The meeting highlights the hazards anticipated and acts as a reminder to work safely. The extent of the safety meeting is dependent on the complexity and amount of hazards associated with the job.

Job Site Visits & Inspections

Executives, salesmen, superintendents visit job sites frequently and are responsible to review the work being performed from an operations and safety standpoint. A Supervisor's Daily Report is completed, along with a brief safety contact related to job site activities. The safety contacts will reinforce the positive attitude towards the safety program. Unsafe acts or conditions are corrected immediately at the job site. The Supervisor's Daily Reports are reviewed/discussed with field employees at the company safety meetings and again at the monthly management meeting.

Employee Safety Meetings

Employee safety meetings are held on a regular basis. The meetings are held to inform employees of the results of accident investigations, new safety procedures to be implemented and convey general safety information to the employees. Retraining and or recertification efforts may also be completed during these meetings.

Monthly Management Meetings

The management group at each subsidiary, from company president to superintendent, meet at a scheduled monthly meeting at which time the company's safety performance is reviewed; discussing any current accidents, safety training and D.O.T. driver file spreadsheets. The company utilizes a spreadsheet format to track safety training/driver file documentation as well as rescheduling necessary retraining topics (see attached enclosed spreadsheets).
