

PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT

THIS PURCHASE OF SERVICE AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement"), made and entered into on the 16 day of ^{July} MONTH 2021, by and between the **LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT**, an urban county government of the Commonwealth of Kentucky created pursuant to KRS chapter 67A (hereinafter "Government"), 200 East Main Street, Lexington, Kentucky 40507, on behalf of its Department of Social Services (hereinafter "Sponsor"), and **THE CARNEGIE CENTER FOR LITERACY AND LEARNING**, with offices located **251 WEST SECOND STREET, LEXINGTON KY 40507**, (hereinafter "Organization").

WITNESSETH

That for and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein expressed, the Government and the Organization agree as follows:

1. Government hereby retains Organization for the period beginning on **July 1, 2021**, and continuing for a period of one (1) year from that date unless within that period Government gives the Organization thirty (30) days written notice of termination of this Agreement in which case this Agreement shall terminate thirty (30) days from the date notice is given to the Organization.
2. Government shall pay Organization the sum of **\$120,000** for the services required by this Agreement, said services being more particularly described in the Addendum attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit A, one-half (1/2th) of which shall be payable in September 2021 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice, with one-half (1/2th) payable in January 2022 or shortly thereafter upon receipt of an invoice and the first six month detailed program report., **The first invoice required by this section shall be submitted by September 17th, 2021. The second invoice and the first six month detailed program report shall be due January 21st 2022. A detailed program report shall be submitted by April 15th, 2022. A year-end program report shall be submitted by July**

22nd, 2022. Failure to submit the April 2022 program report and the July 2022 year-end program report shall result in the Organization repaying one-half (1/2th) of total funds provided under this Agreement. Reports shall reflect the services and programs directly related to the funding provided by Lexington Fayette Urban County Government with emphasis on measurable outcomes, and specifically outlined in the funding application. Forms for both the quarterly financial and program reports will be provided.

3. In the event of termination of this Agreement by Government as provided for in paragraph 1 above, Organization shall be entitled to that portion of total compensation due under this Agreement as the service rendered bears to the service required herein.

4. Organization shall perform all duties and services included in the Addendum attached hereto faithfully and satisfactorily at the time, place and for the duration prescribed herein. Compensation paid pursuant to this Agreement shall be used exclusively for the services set forth in the Addendum and for no other purpose. Any alteration in the nature of such services and duties constitutes an amendment to this Agreement and must be in writing signed by both parties. Organization shall keep itself fully informed of all federal and state laws and all municipal ordinances and regulations in any manner affecting the work or performance of this Agreement, and shall at all times observe and comply with such laws, ordinances and regulations, whether or not such laws, ordinances or regulations are mentioned herein, and

5. Organization shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Government, its officers, agents and employees, from and against any and all liabilities, claims, demands, losses, damages, costs, and/or expenses arising out of, from, relating to, and/or based on the Organization's violation of any such laws, ordinances or regulations or Organization's breach of this Agreement.

6. Organization represents that it has filed all federal, state and local income tax returns required by law in the legally prescribed time and manner. This Agreement shall not become effective unless and until copies of all of the executed originals of the aforementioned tax returns filed for the Organization have been registered for the current tax year by the Organization in the office of the Sponsor, and the Organization shall not be compensated unless and until such registration has taken place.

7. The Organization shall, on such forms as the Sponsor shall provide, submit to Sponsor an annual report and financial statement which summarize the previous year's activities regarding the services enumerated in the addendum attached hereto.

8. Books of accounts shall be kept by the Organization and entries shall be made therein of all money, goods, effects, debts, sales, purchases, receipts, payments and any other transactions of the Organization. The books of accounts, together with all bonds, notes, bills, letters and other writings belonging to the Organization, shall be maintained at the principal place of business of the Organization as set forth in this Agreement. Government shall have free and complete access to the books, papers and affairs of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, at all reasonable times, and if it desires, it may have the books and papers of the Organization, that relate to the performance of this Agreement, audited and examined by auditors, accountants or attorneys. Any examination shall be at the expense of the Government.

9. Government may designate such persons as may be necessary to monitor and evaluate the services rendered by the Organization. The Government, its agents and employees, shall, at all times, have unrestricted access to all places where or in which the services required hereunder are being carried on and conducted. Inspection and monitoring of the work by these authorities shall in no manner be presumed to relieve in any degree the

responsibility or obligations of Organization, nor to constitute the Organization as an agent of the Government.

10. Organization shall provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, shall prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and shall cause each of its subcontracting agencies to do so. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

11. Organization shall adopt a written sexual harassment policy, which shall, at a minimum, contain a statement of current law; a list of prohibited behaviors; a complaint process; and a procedure which provides for a confidential investigation of all complaints. The policy shall be given to all employees and clients and shall be posted at all locations where Organization conducts business. The policy shall be submitted to Sponsor for review within thirty (30) days of the execution of this Agreement.

12. This instrument, and the Addendum incorporated herein, contains the entire agreement between the parties, and no statement, promises or inducements made by either party or agent of either party that is not contained in this written Agreement shall be valid and binding; and this Agreement may not be enlarged, modified or altered except in writing signed by the parties and endorsed hereon.

13. Organization agrees that it shall apply all funds received by it from the Urban County Government in accordance with the following investment policy guidelines:

- A. Objectives: Capital preservation with surety of income. Reasonable competitive income consistent with high investment quality and purpose of funds. All investments shall conform with state and local law and regulations and these policies.
- B. Investment Funds Management: The governing board may elect to either:

(1) Manage its investment through its executive director where the size or complexity of funds to be managed is deemed by the board to be within the training, expertise and/or available time capacity of the executive director and the operating staff; or

(2) Utilize the professional investment management facilities of a local bank trust department acting in a fiduciary capacity within the same approved investment policies and federal, state, local and trust laws and regulation. The trust department may utilize its regular short-term one hundred percent (100%) US Treasury Fund for daily funds investment.

The election of option 1 or 2 should be made consistent with the relative cost incurred and in the case of option 2 the cost shall be competitive among local trust departments.

C. Investment Policies - - Safety and Prudence.

(1) Short-term liquidity funds shall be invested in "riskless" investment, i.e., deposits in Kentucky commercial banks or savings and loan associations that are fully federally insured or deposits collateralized by U.S. Treasury securities with a current market value of at least one hundred percent (100%), or in direct obligations of U.S. Treasury securities.

Investments shall be diversified according to maturity in order to meet projected cash flow needs.

Collateral pledged to secure uninsured deposits shall be held at a federal reserve bank with the receipt providing absolute control by the agency.

(2) Retirement funds, endowment funds, long-term capital reserve funds and any other special funds may be held and invested by a local bank trust department under investment objectives and diversification in accordance with the individual nature of the funds and pursuant to the "prudent man" investment rule as well as general trust law.

(3) All investments shall be reviewed monthly by a finance or investment committee of the agency.

(4) Local brokerage firms may hold and invest funds provided that investments are located within Kentucky and are full insured.

D. Audit - - All investments shall be audited at least annually by independent certified public accountant who shall express an opinion as to whether or not investments during the year audited have conformed with state and local law and regulation and with the approved investment policies.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government hereby requests proposals for **RFP #10-2021 Childhood & Youth Development – Extended Social Resources (ESR) Grant Program** to be provided in accordance with terms, conditions and specifications established herein.

Proposals will be received **online only** at <https://lexingtonky.ionwave.net> until **2:00 PM**, prevailing local time, on **May 14, 2021**.

Proposals received after the date and time set for opening proposals will not be considered for award of a contract/grant. It is the sole responsibility of the Proposer to assure that his/her proposal is submitted online before the date and time set for opening proposals.

Additional copies of this Request For Proposals are available from the Division of Central Purchasing, Room 338 Government Center, 200 East Main Street, Lexington, KY 40507, (859)-258-3320, at no charge.

Proposals, once submitted, may not be withdrawn for a period of sixty (60) calendar days.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, and to waive technicalities and informalities when such waiver is determined by the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to be in its best interest.

Electronic signature online at <https://lexingtonky.ionwave.net> constitutes acceptance by the Proposer of terms, conditions and requirements set forth herein.

Pre-Proposal Meeting will be held on **April 30th, 2021 at 10:00AM EST** via Zoom (see section 3.1 in Scope of Work document for meeting link).

Minor exceptions may not eliminate the proposal. Any exceptions to the specifications established herein shall be listed in detail on a separate sheet and attached hereto. The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government shall determine whether any exception is minor.

Please do not contact any LFUCG staff member or any other person involved in the selection process other than the designated contact person(s) regarding the project contemplated under this RFP while this RFP is open and a selection has not been finalized. Any attempt to do so may result in disqualification of the firm's submittal for consideration.

Laws and Regulations

All applicable state laws, municipal ordinances and regulations of all authorities having jurisdiction over the project shall apply to the contract, and shall be deemed to be incorporated herein by reference.

Equal Employment Opportunity

The Entity (regardless of whether construction contractor, non-construction contractor or supplier) agrees to provide equal opportunity in employment for all qualified persons, to prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age, and to promote equal employment through a positive, continuing program from itself and each of its subcontracting agents. This program of equal employment opportunity shall apply to every aspect of its employment policies and practices.

Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act

The Kentucky Equal Employment Opportunity Act of 1978 (KRS 45.560-45.640) requires that any "county, city, town, school district, water district, hospital district, or other political subdivision of the state shall include in directly or indirectly publicly funded contracts for supplies, materials, services, or equipment hereinafter entered into the following provisions:

"During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

- (1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;
- (2) The contractor will state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractors that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, or national origin;

(3) The contractor will post notices in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, setting forth the provision of the nondiscrimination clauses required by this section; and

(4) The contractor will send a notice to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under the nondiscrimination clauses."

The Act further provides:

"KRS 45.610. Hiring minorities -- Information required

(1) For the length of the contract, each contractor shall hire minorities from other sources within the drawing area, should the union with which he has collective bargaining agreements be unwilling to supply sufficient minorities to satisfy the agreed upon goals and timetables.

(2) Each contractor shall, for the length of the contract, furnish such information as required by KRS 45.560 to KRS 45.640 and by such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto and will permit access to all books and records pertaining to his employment practices and work sites by the contracting agency and the department for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with KRS 45.560 to 45.640 and such rules, regulations and orders issued pursuant thereto.

KRS 45.620. Action against contractor -- Hiring of minority contractor or subcontractor

(1) If any contractor is found by the department to have engaged in an unlawful practice under this chapter during the course of performing under a contract or subcontract covered under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the department shall so certify to the contracting agency and such certification shall be binding upon the contracting agency unless it is reversed in the course of judicial review.

(2) If the contractor is found to have committed an unlawful practice under KRS 45.560 to 45.640, the contracting agency may cancel or terminate the contract, conditioned upon a program for future compliance approved by the contracting agency and the department. The contracting agency may declare such a contractor ineligible to bid on further contracts with that agency until such time as the

contractor complies in full with the requirements of KRS 45.560 to 45.640.

(3) The equal employment provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 may be met in part by a contractor by subcontracting to a minority contractor or subcontractor. For the provisions of KRS 45.560 to 45.640, a minority contractor or subcontractor shall mean a business that is owned and controlled by one or more persons disadvantaged by racial or ethnic circumstances.

KRS 45.630 Termination of existing employee not required, when

Any provision of KRS 45.560 to 45.640 notwithstanding, no contractor shall be required to terminate an existing employee upon proof that employee was employed prior to the date of the contract.

KRS 45.640 Minimum skills

Nothing in KRS 45.560 to 45.640 shall require a contractor to hire anyone who fails to demonstrate the minimum skills required to perform a particular job."

It is recommended that all of the provisions above quoted be included as special conditions in each contract. In the case of a contract exceeding \$250,000, the contractor is required to furnish evidence that his workforce in Kentucky is representative of the available workforce in the area from which he draws employees, or to supply an Affirmative Action plan which will achieve such representation during the life of the contract.

LFUCG Non-Appropriation Clause

Contractor acknowledges that the LFUCG is a governmental entity, and the contract validity is based upon the availability of public funding under the authority of its statutory mandate.

In the event that public funds are unavailable and not appropriated for the performance of the LFUCG's obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically expire without penalty to the LFUCG thirty (30) days after written notice to Contractor of the unavailability and non-appropriation of public funds. It is expressly agreed that the LFUCG shall not activate this non-appropriation provision for its convenience or to circumvent the requirements of this contract, but only as an emergency fiscal measure during a substantial fiscal crisis, which affects generally its governmental operations.

In the event of a change in the LFUCG's statutory authority, mandate and mandated functions, by state and federal legislative or regulatory action, which adversely affects the LFUCG's authority to continue its obligations under this contract, then this contract shall automatically terminate without penalty to the LFUCG upon written notice to Contractor of such limitation or change in the LFUCG's legal authority.

AFFIDAVIT

Comes the Affiant, Neil Chethik, and after being first duly sworn, states under penalty of perjury as follows:

1. His/her name is Neil Chethik and he/she is the individual submitting the proposal or is the authorized representative of the Carnegie Center for Literacy and Learning, the entity submitting the proposal (hereinafter referred to as "Proposer").
2. Proposer will pay all taxes and fees, which are owed to the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government at the time the proposal is submitted, prior to award of the contract and will maintain a "current" status in regard to those taxes and fees during the life of the contract.
3. Proposer will obtain a Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government business license, if applicable, prior to award of the contract.
4. Proposer has authorized the Division of Central Purchasing to verify the above-mentioned information with the Division of Revenue and to disclose to the Urban County Council that taxes and/or fees are delinquent or that a business license has not been obtained.
5. Proposer has not knowingly violated any provision of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky within the past five (5) years and the award of a contract to the Proposer will not violate any provision of the campaign finance laws of the Commonwealth.
6. Proposer has not knowingly violated any provision of Chapter 25 of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances, known as "Ethics Act."

7. Proposer acknowledges that "knowingly" for purposes of this Affidavit means, with respect to conduct or to circumstances described by a statute or ordinance defining

an offense, that a person is aware or should have been aware that his conduct is of that nature or that the circumstance exists.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGREEMENT

The Law

- Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (amended 1972) states that it is unlawful for an employer to discriminate in employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age (40-70 years) or national origin.
- Executive Order No. 11246 on Nondiscrimination under Federal contract prohibits employment discrimination by contractor and sub-contractor doing business with the Federal Government or recipients of Federal funds. This order was later amended by Executive Order No. 11375 to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex.
- Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 states:

The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of physical or mental disability.

- Section 2012 of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Act of 1973 requires Affirmative Action on behalf of disabled veterans and veterans of the Vietnam Era by contractors having Federal contracts.
- Section 206(A) of Executive Order 12086, Consolidation of Contract Compliance Functions for Equal Employment Opportunity, states:


The Secretary of Labor may investigate the employment practices of any Government contractor or sub-contractor to determine whether or not the contractual provisions specified in Section 202 of this order have been violated.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government practices Equal Opportunity in recruiting, hiring and promoting. It is the Government's intent to affirmatively provide employment opportunities for those individuals who have previously not been allowed to enter into the mainstream of society. Because of its importance to the local Government, this policy carries the full endorsement of the Mayor, Commissioners, Directors and all supervisory personnel. In following this commitment to Equal Employment Opportunity and because the Government is the benefactor of the Federal funds, it is both against the Urban County Government policy and illegal for the Government to let contracts to companies which knowingly or unknowingly practice discrimination in their employment practices. Violation of the above mentioned ordinances may cause a contract to be canceled and the contractors may be declared ineligible for future consideration.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. Each Respondent shall comply with all Federal, State & Local regulations concerning this type of service or good.

The Respondent agrees to comply with all statutes, rules, and regulations governing safe and healthful working conditions, including the Occupational Health and Safety Act of 1970, 29 U.S.C. 650 *et. seq.*, as amended, and KRS Chapter 338. The Respondent also agrees to notify the LFUCG in writing immediately upon detection of any unsafe and/or unhealthful working conditions at the job site. The Respondent agrees to indemnify, defend and hold the LFUCG harmless from all penalties, fines or other expenses arising out of the alleged violation of said laws.

2. Failure to submit ALL forms and information required in this RFP may be grounds for disqualification.
3. Addenda: All addenda, if any, shall be considered in making the proposal, and such addenda shall be made a part of this RFP. Before submitting a proposal, it is incumbent upon each proposer to be informed as to whether any addenda have been issued, and the failure to cover in the bid any such addenda may result in disqualification of that proposal.
4. Proposal Reservations: LFUCG reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, to award in whole or part, and to waive minor immaterial defects in proposals. LFUCG may consider any alternative proposal that meets its basic needs.
5. Liability: LFUCG is not responsible for any cost incurred by a Respondent in the preparation of proposals.
6. Changes/Alterations: Respondent may change or withdraw a proposal at any time prior to the opening; however, no oral modifications will be allowed. Only letters, or other formal written requests for modifications or corrections of a previously submitted proposal which is addressed in the same manner as the proposal, and received by LFUCG prior to the scheduled closing time for receipt of proposals, will be accepted. The proposal, when opened, will then be corrected in accordance with such written request(s), provided that the written request is contained in a sealed envelope which is plainly marked "modifications of proposal".
7. Clarification of Submittal: LFUCG reserves the right to obtain clarification of any point in a bid or to obtain additional information from a Respondent.
8. Bribery Clause: By his/her signature on the bid, Respondent certifies that no employee of his/hers, any affiliate or Subcontractor, has bribed or attempted

to bribe an officer or employee of the LFUCG.

9. Additional Information: While not necessary, the Respondent may include any product brochures, software documentation, sample reports, or other documentation that may assist LFUCG in better understanding and evaluating the Respondent's response. Additional documentation shall not serve as a substitute for other documentation which is required by this RFP to be submitted with the proposal,
10. Ambiguity, Conflict or other Errors in RFP: If a Respondent discovers any ambiguity, conflict, discrepancy, omission or other error in the RFP, it shall immediately notify LFUCG of such error in writing and request modification or clarification of the document if allowable by the LFUCG.
11. Agreement to RFP Terms: In submitting this proposal, the Respondent agrees that it has carefully examined the specifications and all provisions relating to the work to be done attached hereto and made part of this proposal. By acceptance of a Contract/Grant under this RFP, proposer states that it understands the meaning, intent and requirements of the RFP and agrees to the same. The successful Respondent shall warrant that it is familiar with and understands all provisions herein and shall warrant that it can comply with them. No additional compensation to Respondent shall be authorized for services or expenses reasonably covered under these provisions that the proposer omits from its Proposal.
12. Cancellation: If the services to be performed hereunder by the Respondent are not performed in an acceptable manner to the LFUCG, the LFUCG may cancel this contract for cause by providing written notice to the proposer, giving at least thirty (30) days notice of the proposed cancellation and the reasons for same. During that time period, the proposer may seek to bring the performance of services hereunder to a level that is acceptable to the LFUCG, and the LFUCG may rescind the cancellation if such action is in its best interest.

A. Termination for Cause

- (1) LFUCG may terminate a contract because of the contractor's failure to perform its contractual duties
- (2) If a contractor is determined to be in default, LFUCG shall notify the contractor of the determination in writing, and may include a specified date by which the contractor shall cure the identified deficiencies. LFUCG may proceed with termination if the contractor fails to cure the deficiencies within the specified time.

- (3) A default in performance by a contractor for which a contract may be terminated shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to:
- (a) Failure to perform the contract according to its terms, conditions and specifications;
 - (b) Failure to make delivery within the time specified or according to a delivery schedule fixed by the contract;
 - (c) Late payment or nonpayment of bills for labor, materials, supplies, or equipment furnished in connection with a contract for construction services as evidenced by mechanics' liens filed pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 376, or letters of indebtedness received from creditors by the purchasing agency;
 - (d) Failure to diligently advance the work under a contract for construction services;
 - (e) The filing of a bankruptcy petition by or against the contractor; or
 - (f) Actions that endanger the health, safety or welfare of the LFUCG or its citizens.


B. At Will Termination

Notwithstanding the above provisions, the LFUCG may terminate this contract at will in accordance with the law upon providing thirty (30) days written notice of that intent, Payment for services or goods received prior to termination shall be made by the LFUCG provided these goods or services were provided in a manner acceptable to the LFUCG. Payment for those goods and services shall not be unreasonably withheld.

No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege under or in respect of this Contract shall affect the rights, remedies, powers or privileges of LFUCG hereunder or shall operate as a waiver thereof.
15. **Authority to do Business:** The Respondent must be a duly organized and

All parties expressly consent to personal jurisdiction and venue in such Court for the limited and sole purpose of proceedings relating to this Contract or any rights or obligations arising thereunder. Service of process may be accomplished by following the procedures prescribed by law.
17. **Ability to Meet Obligations:** Respondent affirmatively states that there are no actions, suits or proceedings of any kind pending against Respondent or, to the knowledge of the Respondent, threatened against the Respondent before or by any court, governmental body or agency or other tribunal or authority which would, if adversely determined, have a materially adverse effect on the authority or ability of Respondent to perform its obligations under this Contract, or which question the legality, validity or enforceability hereof or thereof.
18. Contractor understands and agrees that its employees, agents, or subcontractors are not employees of LFUCG for any purpose whatsoever. Contractor is an independent contractor at all times during the performance of the services specified.
19. If any term or provision of this Contract shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of the contract shall remain in full force and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.

5.1 Program Proposal & Design

5.1.1 Needs Statement—Purpose of the Program Proposal / Problem Statement

Lexington is facing the greatest educational crisis in generations due to learning loss during the pandemic. Research shows the loss is most profound in early readers. Without reading skills, they cannot learn any subject effectively. Before the pandemic, a significant achievement gap already existed for Lexington's poorest families and children of color, some gaps with a 40%-plus difference. With interruptions to the 2020-2021 school year—closed school buildings and unstable internet in homes—that gap has widened. Without intervention, this literacy divide will grow and negatively impact the people and Lexington's economy for decades; low-literacy individuals tend to earn less, pay fewer payroll taxes, and require more government resources during their lives.

The Carnegie Center literacy programs have proven results and long records of success, making it a trusted leader in education outside the school system. Our 29-year-old tutoring program has helped thousands of at-risk students with reading and math. This school year, 75% are children of color and 72% are from low income homes. We also offer reading groups, math classes, writing workshops, academic enrichment camps, family literacy programs, author visits in Title I schools, book giveaways, and much more. These programs serve students from most Fayette Co. schools and are designed to impact 5,000 children, primarily those at risk and/or underserved. FCPS administrators are seeking Carnegie's help in shrinking learning loss this summer and next school year by providing our outreach programs for their failing students. The literacy problems run deep, but they are not insurmountable.

5.1.2 Service Delivery Model

We provide experienced, expert instructors; hands-on learning made fun; many free programs; scholarships to all in need; and program designs recognized both locally and nationally for programming excellence.

Children do not receive a grade or complete a certificate through our Childhood Learning Loss Remediation Programs; rather, learners strive to meet their personal learning goals. In our tutoring program, working toward the child's identified learning needs becomes the focus of one-on-one tutoring sessions for an hour each week in our school-year session, six-week summer session, or 15-17-week semester sessions in schools. Other Carnegie programs are designed for a group/class, varying by program. Educational classes span 1-12 weeks for an hour to an hour-and-a-half. Six Camp Carnegie offerings each last half-a-day for a week in July. Family Fun & Learning events occur five times a year and last two hours. We'll offer ten or more Youth Meeting Authors visits, lasting one to two hours. In FCPS, outreach classes, tutoring, and other programs will meet teachers' and students' needs. Free books are given away through programs, author school visits, book distributions in 60+ Little Free Libraries, in Triangle Park, and elsewhere.

We break down barriers to learning. These programs are free or low cost with scholarships available to eliminate financial barriers and attract children from low-income families. We help children access reading materials by giving books away. Outreach and publicity efforts help us serve an inclusive demographic of students from across Lexington and instructors of color help attract diverse students.

5.1.3 Client Eligibility and Requirements

5 Points

Eligibility requirements are minimal, and expectations are clearly conveyed. The in-house tutoring program is for children in grades K-12 who are performing behind their peers in school, and we have a one-time registration fee on a sliding scale of \$5-\$60; outreach tutoring sites have no fees and are for children from that elementary school. To remain in our tutoring programs, children must regularly attend. Our free Family Fun & Learning events are for families of elementary-aged children. Camp Carnegie serves rising middle school students, costing \$25-\$75 per camp. Educational classes are for all ability levels in targeted age groups and often are free, though the \$45 ACT review classes includes a book. For every program with a fee, scholarships are given to those in need. We require parent participation in early learner programs targeting children ages 0-5.

When selecting outreach sites for our Youth Meeting Authors program, Carnegie Club outreach tutoring sites, and other educational programs, we seek schools and community spaces primarily serving children of color and/or low-income families. We place a priority on schools whose standardized test scores are low. Teachers in those schools often select students in grades 1-2 for our outreach tutoring program, based on need. We don't charge the outreach site for our programming and we often bring additional benefits, such as free books for their students or their libraries. We're working with FCPS to tackle learning loss in their schools with the greatest needs.

5.1.4 Evidence-Based/Best Practice

Our family literacy programs, including Family Fun & Learning events and early learner book groups, use a family engagement model to encourage participation between children and their guardians (sources 1, 4). When parents are involved in their kids' learning experiences, children are more likely to have higher grades, attendance, social skills, behavior, reading acquisition, and graduation rates (sources 3, 5). Our tutoring program and children's classes use several research-based best practices such as high-quality literature, integrated phonics instruction, balanced student-teacher interactions, in-class reading time, and one-on-one or small group work (source 2).

5.2.1 Service Efficacy & Desired Outcomes

Carnegie’s Childhood Learning Loss Remediation Programs supplement and complement what children are learning at school—helping them catch up—and provide important literacy resources such as books that make learning fun. As reading, writing, and math skills improve, a child’s confidence improves, which translates to other areas of life. By breaking down barriers—financial, language, and others—we help them succeed in their learning goals, and for some, end a cycle of illiteracy and poverty.

Some goals help children improve academic performance and grades at school; inspire an interest/love of learning, reading, and writing; and help children prepare for college and potential careers. To work toward these goals, we provide a friendly, stimulating learning atmosphere. For in-person class and camp settings, children face each other while socially distanced so they can interact. We encourage children to talk with authors on visits. Tutoring students find comfy spots to read, sidewalk chalk for math problems outside, and individually-packaged snacks to fill hungry bellies.

Success in our children’s programs is measured in terms of the child gaining new knowledge. How much is gained, and in which areas, varies from program-to-program and student-to-student. Pre- and post- tutoring assessments, and parent and teacher reports help measure tutoring success; on average, a child gains 1.5 grade levels after a year in our program—even during the pandemic. In other programs, impact and knowledge gained is measured through evaluations and feedback. We have nearly a 100% rate of success in teaching children new skills and useful knowledge.

5.2.2 Client Empowerment & Community Impact

A Yale study expects to find a “coronavirus slide” of at least a “30% loss in learning compared to a normal school year.” What about children who were already falling behind or who are at-risk due to limited resources? We will primarily serve those students to help level the playing field. Childhood Learning Loss Remediation Programs provide deep and meaningful learning opportunities with long-term impacts, opening up a world of potential through learning. The pandemic may have widened the achievement gap, but Carnegie is here to help these kids recover.

A parent of a tutoring child said, “Thanks again for all your work with Annie. She got in the car this week and told me ‘before I knew it I raised my hand in math and solved an entire problem correctly!’ That’s certainly not the Annie we’ve seen in the past!”

When we featured award-winning children’s author Marcia Thornton Jones for a virtual Youth Meeting Authors visit with Glendover Elementary’s 3rd grade this spring, the teachers were ecstatic:

- * “She’s FABULOUS! You can totally tell she’s a teacher. My kids are SILENT and hanging on every word.”
- * “I love that she has all the pages marked and her thoughts all ready!”
- * “They were super excited to each get a book. This has been a total hit!”

A former Carnegie student who’s now an adult teaching our kids’ classes said during the pandemic, “Thank you for all you do to make the Carnegie Center a place that continues to change lives.”

5.2.3 Data Assessment & Quality Improvement

With former teachers and education experts on staff, an assessment strategy is part of each program.

Our in-house tutoring program uses pre-tutoring assessments on each child (200/school year) to help determine areas of need, and post-tutoring assessments on a random sample to determine programming effectiveness. We also receive parent reports on grades and on progress from tutors. Evaluations of Family Fun & Learning events and large-group programs are based on qualitative anecdotes from the 800-1,200 participants and their parents/teachers. The stories we hear about the positive impacts of these programs continue to show us how effective and important these programs are to the community.

At the end of each class, participants complete surveys. The wording for teens and younger children matches reading level, asking questions such as "Did you enjoy this class?" and "Name one thing you learned in this class." Parents help with early learners' evaluations. Most of these 1,000 participants are present when evaluations are distributed. We also receive unsolicited feedback from students/their parents.

We use the collected information to decide on and improve future classes and programs regarding instructors and content. This includes ideas for future classes, which we consider in regards to matching our mission, our access to qualified instructors, and educational opportunities the community needs. Feedback helps determine effectiveness of our programs and ensures that students are learning. Success will be measured in terms of meeting our program goals, reaching targeted attendance numbers, creating quality experiences, and impacting the local community.

5.3 Capacity & Sustainability

Erica Cook, Children's Outreach & Volunteer Director: Erica has a degree in Communications with a nonprofit emphasis and is fluent in English and Spanish. She oversees outreach tutoring sites, coordinates outreach and family events, and recruits volunteers. She also serves on Fayette County Public Schools' Community Partners Leadership Team and is a member of the Central Kentucky Association of Volunteer Administrators.

Carol Jordan, Tutoring Coordinator: Once a certified kindergarten teacher, Carol now oversees our thriving tutoring program, including three tutoring staff and all tutors and students involved in the program. She's also the liaison with parents. While under her supervision the past nine years, our program has been named the "Best Tutoring Center in Lexington" each year by Lexington Family Magazine.

Marcia Thornton Jones, Tutoring Associate: Marcia assists Carol with tutors, students, and parents as needed. Marcia was a certified elementary teacher in the Fayette Co. Schools before retiring. She is also the author of over 130 children's books, including the Scholastic Books series, The Bailey School Kids—which is soon to be republished as a graphic novel for young readers.

Maddy Hamilton, Outreach Associate: Maddy works with younger children in Carnegie Clubs and coordinates Camp Carnegie and other programs. She also helps teenagers engage in poetry through therapeutic workshops and open mics, and previously worked as a camp coordinator.

5.3.2 Partnership & Resource Leverage

The Carnegie Center meets several of the identified priority areas, especially the new area addressing learning loss. We also provide affordable learning opportunities for babies to age 18, especially in regards to reading, writing, and math. We offer academic enrichment and introductions to potential careers through Camp Carnegie; college mentoring and help on the ACT, SAT, and college essays, applications, and scholarships; and tutoring and classes for English Language Learners. Free programs and scholarships assist families impacted by poverty, and parents find support through early learner programs and family literacy nights, which demonstrate how parents can be involved with their child's learning.

Formally, we're a God's Pantry partner, providing snacks for our tutoring program and Camp Carnegie students. Erica Cook is on the FCPS Community Partner Board (position: Secretary) and we're a Family University sponsor. Informally, we partner with FCPS (outreach programming), local universities (for tutors, including ELL tutors), and educational nonprofits like Lexington Public Library. We may revamp pre-pandemic partnerships with social service programs for teen mothers.

Board members assist with community connections and some tutor or volunteer at events. Carnegie's 300 volunteers/year are mostly tutors and children's programs volunteers.

Consistent funders include Toyota, William Stamps Farish Fund, Children's Charity of the Bluegrass, KU, Orphan Society, PNC, NFL player Wesley Woodyard's 16Ways Foundation (books, tutoring scholarships), & Blue Grass Community Foundation. Other past/potential supporters: William R. Kenan, Jr. Charitable Trust & Scholastic Books (book discounts).

5.3.3 Outreach & Inclusion Strategy

We are deliberate in providing a welcoming, inclusive atmosphere for our diverse community; every day, people of different ages, skin colors, sexual orientations, religions, economic levels, and educational backgrounds all intermingle through Carnegie programming. In an award-winning video about the Carnegie Center, a Black woman said, "It's a place where I've watched different communities converge in one particular building and form a cohesive community."

We break down barriers to participation. Our Children's Outreach Director is fluent in English and Spanish, we offer ELL classes for children and adults, and staff are experienced in assisting limited English proficiency speakers. Our building is handicap accessible and we also can accommodate learners with visual and hearing disabilities. Children with dyslexia characteristics receive help at the summer IDEA Camp. Most children's programming is offered at no cost, and for those with fees, scholarships are available to all in need (low- or moderate-income).

Carnegie has a Non-Discrimination Policy, adheres to LFUCG's Affirmative Action Plan, and is an Equal Opportunity Employer. We are a Kentucky Nonprofit Network Best Practices Partner. We've added more people of color for open staff and board positions, and program instructors/authors as part of our Strategic Plan.

We're helping Lexington fix problems identified by the Mayor's Commission on Racial Justice & Equality by 1) providing affordable access to our high-quality educational programs for children ages 0-18—especially those at-risk, 2) working with FCPS to serve Title I schools with the greatest needs, and 3) giving students educational resources (i.e., school supplies, books).
