## Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting Lexington, Kentucky July 13, 2023

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on July 13, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Vice Mayor Wu in the chair presiding, in the absence of Mayor Gorton, and the following members of the Council: Sevigny, Sheehan, Worley, Wu, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, Elliott Baxter, Fogle, Gray, LeGris, Lynch, Plomin, and Reynolds. Absent was Council Member Monarrez.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Brown, and seconded by Ms. Reynolds, a Communications from the Mayor (For Information Only) was placed on the docket and was as follows: (1) the Unclassified Civil Service Appointment of Michael Keith Horn, Comm. of Planning and

Preservation, Grade 537E, \$6,116.32 biweekly in the Dept. of Planning and Preservation, effective July 17, 2023.

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Chief Lawrence Weathers, Div. of Police, presented a disciplinary matter regarding Officer Johnathan Coyle. An allegation has been made that Officer Coyle has committed the offense of Body-Worn Camera Procedures and Operation of Vehicles which constitutes misconduct under the provisions of KRS 95.450 and/or KRS 15.520 and General Order 1973-02K Disciplinary Procedures of Sworn Officers, Appendix B, Operational Rule 1.04 and 1.13 in that on the 17th day(s) of March 2023, he/she allegedly:

- (1) On Monday, March 20<sup>th</sup>, 2023, an informal complaint was received from a citizen in reference to a driving complaint involving Officer Johnathan Coyle. The complainant stated he observed an unmarked white police truck speed up behind him on Interstate 75. The police vehicle activated its emergency lights and the complainant thought he was being pulled over for speeding. As he pulled over, the police vehicle continued south and he observed the police truck use emergency lights multiple times as it got behind other vehicles.
- (2) During the investigation it was further discovered Officer Coyle did not activate his body worn camera during this encounter and did not have it in buffering mode for a fifteen (15) day period.

At the conclusion of the investigation it was determined Officer Coyle was in violation of General Order 2015-15C Body-Worn Cameras and General order 1973-03S Operation and Maintenance of Department Vehicles.

This is Officer Coyle's second sustained formal complaint since his employment began on October 19, 2015.

The appropriate punishment for this conduct is Two week suspension without pay and six (6) month suspension of home fleet.

Upon motion by Mr. Worley, seconded by Ms. Elliott Baxter and approved by unanimous vote, the disciplinary recommendation was approved.

Vice Mayor Wu inquired about the prior formal complaint. Chief Weathers responded. Vice Mayor Wu asked how the prior formal complaint affected the severity of the discipline. Chief Weathers responded.

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Ms. Gray announced the following upcoming events in Council District 6: Park Fitness Day on August 5, 2023 from 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Pleasant Ridge Park; Back to School Rally on August 6, 2023 from 2:00 p.m. to 5 p.m. at Constitution Park; and the showing of *The Super Mario Bros Movie* at Summer Movie in the Park on August 12, 2023 from 7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at Dixie Park.

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Mr. J. Brown spoke about a park bench dedication in Northeastern Park to memorialize Landon Hayes, and extended gratitude to the Div. of Parks and Recreation the Div. of LexTV, and other LFUCG for their participation in the event. He commended Ms. Fogle for her efforts coordinating the dedication. Mr. J. Brown announced Lex Litter Fest at Castlewood Park on July 14, 2023, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., which had been coordinated in part by a Council District 1 resident interning with the Dept. of Environmental Quality and Public Works. He encouraged Council Members to get rest over the Council Break as there was more to be done and wished City Employees an enjoyable break.

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Ms. Fogle expressed appreciation for Comm. of General Services Chris Ford for his hard work in coordinating the park bench dedication, and thanked others who participated in the event, noting in particular Chief Weather's speech. She announced the upcoming Pool Pageant at Douglass Park on July 30, 2023, which would be the last event before construction began on the pool. Ms. Fogle acknowledged the pool's history and age and stated an event would be held after demolition began, to allow patrons to collect pieces of the structure to keep. She requested an update upon Council's return from break, on the judge's mediation court project. Ms. Fogle expressed gratitude for the opportunity to serve the 1st District and pledged her continued dedication to housing the homeless residents in her district.

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Mr. Sevigny invited everyone to attend upcoming events at the Moondance Amphitheatre: Summer Nights in Suburbia on July 21 and August 4, 2023 at 7 p.m. and the Southland Jamboree on July 13, July 20, July 27, August 3 and August 10, 2023 from

7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. He also announced Tahl Sound Concert Series Lexington Reggae Fest on the Oleika Temple Great Lawn on Southland Drive on July 23. Mr. Sevigny shared photos of a new mural on the railroad underpass installed as a part of the Rediscover Southland Project by LexArts. He announced the birth of his first granddaughter, Nora Riemen, before wishing everyone a happy break.

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Ms. Lynch announced several upcoming events in Council District 2: St. Martin's Village Day Family Reunion on July 29, 2023; Super Sunday at Douglass Park on July 16, 2023; and, Soulful Sundays at Douglass Park throughout the month of July.

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Dottie Bean, Council District 8, spoke about the monetary amounts and frequency of change orders issued across various city construction projects.

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Rick Day, Council District 3, spoke about the 2022 MAG study.

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Hearing no objection, Vice Mayor Wu declared the meeting adjourned at 6:50 p.m.
