## Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting Lexington, Kentucky August 26, 2021

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on August 26, 2021 at 6:02 p.m. Present were Vice-Mayor Kay in the chair presiding, in the absence of Mayor Gorton, and the following members of the Council: Sheehan, Worley, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, Ellinger, Kloiber, Lamb, McCurn, Moloney, Plomin, and Reynolds. Absent were Council Members Baxter and LeGris.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 72-2021 and Resolutions No. 424-2021 through 426-2021, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Council Member Kathy Plomin.

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Upon motion by Ms. Plomin, seconded by Mr. Ellinger, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the August 12, 2021 Council Meeting were approved.

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An Ordinance levying Ad Valorem Taxes for municipal purposes for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022, on the assessed value of all taxable property within the taxing jurisdictions of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government (all taxes on each \$100.00 of assessed valuation as of the January 1, 2021 assessment date), as follows: General Services District, \$.0800 on real property, including real property of public service companies, \$.0890 on personal property, including personal property of public service companies, noncommercial aircraft, and noncommercial watercraft, \$.1500 on insurance capital, \$.0150 on tobacco in storage, and \$.0450 on agricultural products in storage; Full Urban or Partial Urban Services Districts based on urban services available on real property, including real property of public service companies, \$.1426 for Refuse Collection, \$.0213 for Street Lights, \$.0097 for Street Cleaning, \$.0920 on insurance capital, \$.0150 on tobacco in storage, \$.0450 on agricultural products in storage; abandoned urban property \$1.00; and levying an ad valorem tax for municipal

purposes at the rate of \$.0880 on each \$100.00 of assessed value on all motor vehicles and watercraft within the taxing jurisdiction of the Lexington Fayette Urban County Government as of the January 1, 2022 assessment date was on the docket to receive second reading.

At 6:04 p.m., Vice Mayor Kay declared open a public hearing and invited public comment.

At 6:04 p.m., with no one appearing to speak, Vice Mayor Kay declared the public hearing closed.

Ms. Bledsoe moved to amend the ordinance by reducing the following Urban Services Taxes: Refuse Collection from .1426 to .1423; Street Lights from .0213 to .0212; and Street Cleaning from .0097 to .0096. As a result of these adjustments the PSC tax was also reduced from .1736 to .1731. In addition, she moved to schedule a special meeting of the Urban County Council on Tuesday August 31, 2021 at 3:00 p.m. with the sole agenda item being this Ad Valorem Tax ordinance as amended. Mr. Worley seconded and the motion passed by unanimous vote.

Mr. Ellinger asked if the amendment was in response to correspondence the Council had received regarding a 4% increase. Ms. Bledsoe responded.

and watercraft within the taxing jurisdiction of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government as of the January 1, 2022 assessment date received first reading and was ordered to be placed on file for public inspection until August 31, 2021.

Vice Mayor Kay asked at which point in the meeting it would be appropriate for the new ordinance to be read. Dave Barberie, Dept. of Law, responded. Vice Mayor Kay stated that unless there were objections, the amended ordinance would be read in place of Ordinance #10 during Ordinances for First Reading.

(1) On July 3, 2021 Officer M. Barrett failed to report to duty as previously scheduled. Officer Barrett previously submitted a leave request for this date and was denied due to staffing levels. On Saturday, July 3<sup>rd</sup>, Officer Barrett notified his supervisor that he was sick and would be able [sic] to report for duty. After further inquiry it was determined that Officer Barrett was not sick, but was out of town on vacation.

Officer Barrett violated the above policy which states "Officers shall report for duty, including court and overtime assignments, at the time and place required, being both physically and mentally fit, and properly equipped and aware of the information required for the proper performance of his duties."

This is Officer Barrett's first sustained formal complaint since being employed on May 14, 2018. He understands his actions violated policy and has accepted full responsibility.

The appropriate punishment for this conduct is Written Reprimand.

Upon motion by Mr. Ellinger, seconded by Mr. McCurn and approved by unanimous vote, the disciplinary recommendation was approved.

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Ms. Lamb reminded Council Members of the Special Meeting of the Council for a Zone Change Public Hearing that was scheduled to be held on Thursday, September 2, 2021 at 5:00 p.m. Vice Mayor Kay asked if there were any Council Members unable to attend the meeting, to ensure quorum would be met.

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Upon motion by Ms. Plomin, seconded by Ms. Lamb, and approved by unanimous vote, the meeting adjourned at 7:20 p.m.
