## Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting Lexington, Kentucky October 28, 2021

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on October 28, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Gorton in the chair presiding, and the following members of the Council: Ellinger, Kay, Kloiber, Lamb, McCurn, Moloney, Plomin, Reynolds, Sheehan, Worley, Baxter, Bledsoe, F. Brown, and J. Brown. Absent was Council Member LeGris.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 94-2021 through 98-2021, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 547-2021 through 572-2021, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Pastor Brian Bolton of CenterPointe Christian Church.

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Upon motion by Ms. Plomin, seconded by Ms. Baxter, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the October 14, 2021 Council Meeting were approved.

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Upon motion by Mr. Moloney, seconded by Ms. Lamb, and approved by unanimous vote, a presentation honoring Don Pratt was added to the docket.

Mayor Gorton asked Don Pratt to join her at the podium, along with Mr. Moloney, and read a Proclamation declaring October 28, 2021 as Don Pratt Day in Lexington.

Mr. Pratt emphasized the importance of maintaining awareness about child abuse, particularly noting the increase in cases which resulted from the COVID-19 pandemic. He acknowledged that the voluminous backpack, duffel bag, and suitcase donations to foster children over the years would not have been possible without the generosity of Kentuckians throughout the state. Mr. Pratt also expressed appreciation for the media coverage he had received which helped to draw attention to the donation program, stating his desire to see the program evolve into a national effort. He thanked the Mayor and the Council for his award and recognition, and encouraged them to listen the Malcolm Smith's

presentation on gun violence, originally given at the 18<sup>th</sup> Annual Bluegrass Regional Grandparents Raising Grandchildren Conference.

Mr. Moloney shared how he and his wife had first learned about Mr. Pratt's donation program and thanked him for his compassionate service with foster children.

Mayor Gorton thanked Mr. Pratt for all that he does for the community.

Upon motion by Vice Mayor Kay, seconded by Ms. Bledsoe, and approved by unanimous vote, the rules were suspended and public comment was moved from the end of the docket to after Ordinances for First Reading.

Mr. Worley asked if the motion was to hear only public comment pertaining to the Ordinances walked onto the docket, or for all issues. Vice Mayor Kay responded.

Ms. Lamb clarified when public comment should be heard and suggested it occur after the walked-on Ordinances received first reading.

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Hamilton Cole, Larkwood Dr., spoke about the essential workers' pay for employees who worked throughout the pandemic, but had recently retired.

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Fayette Co. Sheriff Kathy Witt addressed remarks made in a prior meeting regarding the Sheriff's Office budget and premium pay allotted by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). She spoke about the duties of the employees throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, and their general duties as a Fayette County agency, mentioning an email she had sent to the Council earlier in the day. Sheriff Witt shared that she had consulted the Department of Local Government on her office's qualifications under the CARES Act and ARPA, and requested that she and her employees be included in premium pay disbursement.

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Dion Henry, Council District 7, asked for all Div. of Waste Management employees seated in the audience to stand up. He stated his dissatisfaction with the proposed 3% raise for the Div. of Waste Management essential workers. Mr. Henry expressed pride in the Div. employees and spoke about the daily challenges they face. He thanked Chief Administrative Officer Sally Hamilton and the Commissioner for their efforts.

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Thomas Hager, Div. of Waste Management, spoke about employee morale in the Division and premium pay for the essential employees.

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Javier Perez, Div. of Waste Management, spoke of the employees' dedication to keeping Lexington clean and of his dissatisfaction with the proposed 3% raise.

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Brittanie Price, Red Mile Rd., spoke about their past military service, and their experience as a veteran volunteer. They thanked the military veterans in the armed forces, various law enforcement agencies, police officers and the Sheriff's Dept. for their hard work and for keeping peace in the United States.

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Bernard McCarthy, District 1, spoke about public transportation planning policies.

Mr. Moloney expressed concerns regarding the issues brought forward in Sheriff Witt's comments.

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Ms. Bledsoe shared that she had been unaware of Sheriff Witt's email and apologized for inadvertently overlooking it. She expressed interest in reconsidering allocating ARPA funds to the Sheriff's Office staff and suggested the relative financial information be presented for discussion during the Special Committee of the Whole meeting on Tuesday, November 2, 2021 at 5:00 p.m. Ms. Bledsoe noted that approving the compensatory ARPA ordinances currently on the docket would not preclude any future compensatory allocations for the Sheriff's Office, or other applicable agencies.

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Mr. Worley concurred with Ms. Bledsoe's remarks, and spoke in support of approving the compensatory ARPA ordinances on the docket.

Ms. Reynolds inquired if the compensatory ARPA ordinances were time sensitive in nature. Comm. Erin Hensley, Dept. of Finance, responded. Ms. Reynolds expressed concerns regarding the issues brought forward in Sheriff Witt's comments and spoke in support of postponing the approval of the compensatory APRA ordinances, if possible.

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Vice Mayor Kay agreed with Ms. Bledsoe and Mr. Worley, in that the approval of the ordinances in question would not preclude any additional requests or considerations. He emphasized ARPA fund allocations were still undergoing considerations and nothing was off the table as of yet. Vice Mayor Kay spoke in support of approving the compensatory ARPA ordinances in order to ensure the supplements would be distributed timely and suggested other concerns be shared during the November 2 Special Committee of the Whole meeting.
