Our knowledge of the Guidebook runs deep as we worked hand in hand with your team to write it meaning we know it better than anyone else and will put it to work on this project The LFUCG Corridors Commission needed a tool to evaluate, plan and implement strategic investments along the 31 corridors under its purview. With this in mind they selected Gresham Smith to produce the Corridors Commission Guidebook in early 2023.

The guidebook will serve as a framework for decision-making for the commission that will support long-term continuity for commission members; benefit the Neighborhood Enhancement Match Grant Program; and chart a path for equitable and sustainable investment in high-impact placemaking projects benefiting communities, visitors, the environment and much more.

The Gresham Smith team developed an easy-to-read guidebook that both the commission and the public could use. Focused on creating a welcoming environment for pedestrians, cyclists and transit users, with native plantings and durable materials As part of the Downtown Danville Master Plan, Gresham Smith partnered with the City of Danville to reimagine Main Street as a vibrant, inclusive public space. Our complete streets design prioritized safety, comfort and vibrancy, ensuring that Danville's most iconic district is welcoming and accessible for all.


To enhance safety, we proposed narrowing the roadway, removing unnecessary turn lanes, shortening crosswalks and improving pedestrian visibility. Comfort is achieved by reclaiming space for wider sidewalks, enhanced landscaping, tree canopies and thoughtfully placed street furnishings—

elements that make downtown more inviting. Lastly, vibrancy is at the heart of our design, creating new gathering spaces, expanding outdoor dining opportunities, and helping businesses extend their energy onto the street.

Building on earlier streetscape plans while incorporating modern best practices and community priorities, our design sets the stage for future investment in Downtown Danville. By transforming Main Street into a true destination, our work supports the city's broader efforts to revitalize downtown and create a welcoming, people-focused public space that fosters connection, activity and long-term growth.





Demonstrates how consistent materials system can scale from plazas to corridors, quickly delivering safer, more vibrant public spaces while maintaining long-term flexibility Street Plans is the lead on-call urban design firm for the Meatpacking Business Improvement District, advancing public space transformations envisioned in the District's Western Gateway Public Realm Vision Plan. To guide this work, our team developed the Tactical Materials Catalog—a temporary-to-permanent materials library with collections tailored to different project durations, from one-week pilots to multi-year interim redesigns. In 2023, Street Plans delivered Gansevoort Landing, a new plaza at 10th Avenue and Gansevoort Street connecting to the 5-acre Gansevoort Peninsula park.

The project featured an asphalt art mural curated by the Whitney Museum and installed with interim materials specified in the Catalog. Shortly after, our team transformed West 14th Street into a 16,000-square-foot pedestrian promenade linking the High Line, Little Island, and Pier 57. Installed in just two weeks, the design introduced ADA-compliant decks over historic cobbles, a modular system of granite blocks and large planters, new seating, and landscaping—all coordinated for year-round use, streamlined maintenance, and future reconfiguration.

Gresham Smith was selected to design Town Branch Commons, a 2.2-mile multimodal trail, greenway and park system in downtown Lexington, Kentucky. The project is a perfect example of how Lexington's primary corridors can create safe, beautiful, and environmentally friendly public rights-of-way. Town Branch Commons traces the route of Town Branch Creek, the city's original water source that now runs under Lexington's streets. In addition to its local role beautifying Midland Avenue and Vine Street, the greenway serves as the centerpiece of a city-wide park system, linking Lexington's urban core with the Bluegrass countryside.

The greenway accommodates pedestrians and cyclists, connecting more than 22 continuous miles of protected bike and pedestrian paths. The system connects urban, suburban and rural parts of the city, meaning residents who live near the 22-mile corridor will have safe, healthy mobility choices. In addition to improving connectivity and traffic, the greenway also introduces a number of environmental benefits and has been recognized nationally in 2022 by the Federal Highways Administration for environmental excellence. Thew project incorporates green infrastructure throughout downtown using features such as urban rain gardens, stormwater-capturing green streets, pervious paving and educational signage.



Complete Streets, Roads and Highways Manual

Gresham Smith developed a Complete Streets focused manual with KYTC, building upon the most current and emerging national best practices for safe, enjoyable and equitable transportation for all users. The new KYTC Complete Streets, Roads, and Highways Manual supports and guides planning and engineering practitioners, transportation agencies, and local communities with the development of complete streets throughout the Kentucky transportation network.

The Manual offers guidance, recommendations and resources for the consideration of Complete Streets in all transportation projects, as a tool to promote safety for all users as part of an equitable transportation network. It identifies and supports a variety of users on Kentucky streets and highways. The Manual provides flexible complete streets guidance and recommendations, which may be modified and implemented based on location-specific context with prevailing planning and engineering judgment.

Following successful completion of the manual, Gresham Smith was tasked with leading content development for a series of in-person and online training events. Our team successfully deployed multiple sessions across the Commonwealth to a diverse group of local and state level stakeholders.

Louisville's Main Remade

KYTC HSIP | Gresham Smith

This Main Street safety project, branded Main Remade, involves the reconfiguration of Main Street in downtown Louisville to improve safety and accessibility for all users. The existing corridor is 3 miles of urban one-way travel with a varied cross-section and changing user patterns which supported the project development decision to section the project into 3 lengths. The eastern portion (East Phase) is in active construction with an ultimate completion date of early-spring 2026. The western portion is paired with a timely resurfacing project and is slated for construction by the end of this year's paving season. The central portion, which spans from 2nd Street to 10th Street, is scheduled for project development on a future timeline. This section serves the highest volume of traffic but that volume is the most prone to dramatic change due to the density of high-capacity commercial real estate. This section was analyzed with latest-at-the-time traffic data to best perform while remaining in a one-way configuration though the rapid and dramatic changes the downtown core has experienced in recent years has provided the project team reason to re-evaluate.

As a whole, Main Remade is purposed to convert portions (and potentially all) for two-way travel while incorporating Complete Streets and TSMO concepts. These features in the design include protected and/or dedicated VRU facilities, enhanced crosswalks, upgraded transit stops, bike-specific signal infrastructure, and lane planning based on traffic demand modeling. Both the eastern and western portions included a public meeting and stakeholder engagement in the project development process. The central portion is expected to involve the same.



Demonstrates how adaptable design strategies, coordinated materials, and focused engagement can transform corridors quickly and sustainably Street Plans led the first two phases of the BTactical Program for the Broward MPO's Complete Streets Division, designing and delivering two quick-build safety demonstration projects in Deerfield Beach and Fort Lauderdale. Both projects addressed corridors listed on the Broward High Injury Network and prioritized community-led engagement, low-cost implementation, and measurable safety outcomes. The Deerfield Beach project focused on NE 3rd Avenue near a hospital and two schools — a 0.6-mile segment with three traffic fatalities in the past five years. Street Plans led a Walk & Talk workshop, refined the design with neighborhood feedback, and implemented a lane reduction, buffered bike lanes, three new crosswalks, eight


art crosswalks, and vertical bike lane protection with over 70 volunteers. Within four months, bicycle and pedestrian activity significantly increased.

In Ft. Lauderdale's Lake Ridge neighborhood, Street Plans led in-person and virtual workshops, stakeholder focus groups, and block-level outreach to co-develop a lane repurposing project on NE 15th Avenue. The final design included a 5-foot bike lane with a 5-foot buffer, nine new crosswalks, two pedestrian refuge islands, and over 60,000 square feet of asphalt art. The project resulted in a 50% reduction in speeding vehicles and a 5 mph drop in average speeds within the first month of installation.

Represents creative placemaking to encourage inclusive and equitable public spaces in Downtown The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government sought to transform this urban, 1-acre park in the center of downtown Lexington. This space was highly underutilized, largely avoided by visitors, residents and the downtown workforce.

Gresham Smith was hired specifically to lead the vision for how to transform this important public space in a way that is sustainable, equitable and innovative. Gresham Smith led the concept development and supported final design and fundraising efforts for this public space project. The final project includes a variety of amenities and programmable spaces specifically focused on creating a vibrant and inclusive public realm in the heart of downtown Lexington.

Phoenix Park directly connects to Town Branch Commons and is part of the larger urban network of public spaces and that connects to residences, offices, the Downtown Library and Courthouse. The project included conceptual & schematic design, detailed cost estimation and community engagement with city staff, stakeholders and potential partners. The park officially opened in September 2025.

Successfully involved local stakeholders in the design process, ensuring community values and needs were reflected Louisville Metro Government not only wanted to help people move more safely and efficiently through the city, but also wanted to elevate quality of life for residents, so they called on Gresham Smith to reimagine Broadway. Breaking the project down into three phases, our project team identified opportunities to create a forward-looking multimodal corridor that meets the needs of all citizens and serves as a catalyst for economic development. The first phase of the project focused on collecting and analyzing data and engaging with the public to understand the current state of the Broadway corridor. Gresham Smith also led a series of public engagement events including Breakfast on Broadway where the design team met transit users with donuts at their

stop to interview them on potential improvements. During the second phase of the project Gresham Smith developed multiple design alternatives to address the corridor's needs. During the third and final phase of the master planning process, the Gresham Smith team delivered a final vision for the Broadway corridor. The design is grounded in the community priorities and includes both quick-build and long-term implementation action items. After the project was complete, Gresham Smith was retained by Louisville Metro to develop and ultimately win a \$5M Federal RAISE Grant to advance final design of this premium transit, complete streets project.

EHI was retained to, plan, research and coordinate the design and development of a downtown Lexington walking tour to highlight the rich history of African-Americans in Lexington, KY. This self -guided walking tour featured 12 interpretive signs of people and places and the significant roles and contributions that they played in the advancement of equality.

Stretching from times of slavery, through Jim Crow discrimination, and up to the Black Freedom Struggle, the stories featured along this tour were collectively identified and researched by a steering committee of Lexington

community members. The concept for this downtown experience was sparked by resident discussions facilitated through Together Lexington's Courageous Conversations. Together Lexington is a local coalition of community stakeholders that seeks to enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors alike. Funding for the signage was provided by Together Lexington and additional information for each experience can be found on the VisitLex website.

Project Understanding


This project presents a vital opportunity to refresh Main and Vine Streets, creating cohesive, safe and vibrant corridors for today's Lexington residents, businesses and visitors. Since the original Streetscape Master Plan of 2008, downtown Lexington has significantly evolved, driven by investments like the revitalized Rupp Arena and Convention Center, Town Branch Commons, Gatton Park and the newly opened Phoenix Park. Our team's involvement in these projects provides valuable insights essential for developing a plan that "completes" the downtown streetscape network.


We understand that successful streetscape design extends beyond technical expertise; it necessitates collaboration, community input, and creative problem-solving. As the lead consultant for the Corridor Commission Guidebook and KYTC's Complete Streets Manual, we have the tools to establish clear, implementable recommendations while allowing for flexibility and context-sensitive solutions for Main and Vine Streets.

Our approach, detailed on the following pages, is organized into three distinct phases: **Learn, Collaborate, and Develop**. Each phase will feature specific deliverables and experiential engagement informed by our previous successful streetscape projects, ranging from tactical to catalytic investments. Our collaboration with you will yield a comprehensive understanding of the current state of the corridors, highlighting key challenges and opportunities.

We will develop a prioritized list of strategic investments in line with community input and aligned with the ongoing Downtown Master Plan and the guidelines of the Corridors Commission and KYTC.

Our final deliverables will include recommendations that will encompass a spectrum of options, from short-term light-touch updates in areas needing a refresh, to more substantial investments at locations like the intersection of Jefferson Street and Main Street, which now serves as a gateway to a world-class park and trail system. Emphasizing long-term stewardship, our final recommendations will support the development of a "stewardship framework" that will lay the foundation for management and maintenance of these improvements for lasting success.







Methodology & Approach

Phase 1: Learn

Task 1: Corridor Inventory, Analysis, and Initial Prioritization

The project will start with a comprehensive evaluation of the Main and Vine Street corridors to define existing conditions and prioritize near-term and long-term improvements. This foundational task ensures recommendations are data-driven, community-aligned, and feasible within available resources.

The Gresham Smith team will utilize the evaluation framework established in the Corridor Commission's Guidebook to conduct a detailed inventory of each corridor, documenting key features such as plantings, street furnishings, lighting, and other public realm amenities. Safety and accessibility will be central to the assessment, including analysis of crash history, lighting adequacy, and pedestrian and cyclist comfort. Additionally, the team will assess hardscape conditions to identify failing infrastructure or barriers to safety and maintenance.

The inventory will be complemented by broader contextual analysis. Field visits, mapping, demographic data, land use, roadway classification, and adjacent neighborhood characteristics will enhance our understanding of how the corridors integrate into Lexington's urban fabric.

Our analysis will coordinate with LFUCG initiatives, particularly the Downtown Master Plan and LexTran Downtown Transit Center. This collaborative approach will generate insights that inform both visionary and practical recommendations focused on existing curb-to-curb conditions, including streetscape planting, pedestrian-scale lighting, and furnishings. Targeted hardscape modifications will be proposed when they enhance safety or long-term maintenance. Intersection safety improvements beyond current curb lines may also be considered through quick-build or interim treatments.

Following this assessment, we will draft initial prioritizations for streetscape improvements for early stakeholder feedback. These recommendations will evaluate the corridors through multiple lenses, including:

- Public health and safety, emphasizing pedestrian comfort and accessibility.
- Placemaking potential, fostering welcoming and vibrant spaces.
- Economic value, enhancing business vitality and long-term investment.
- Storytelling and identity, acknowledging the historical significance of Main and Vine Streets.
- Feasibility and cost, aligning interventions and phased improvements with LFUCG's available resources.

The outcome of Task 1 will be a comprehensive record of existing conditions, a clear analysis framework, and prioritized recommendations for Main and Vine Streets.

Task 2: Stakeholder Workshop – Validation and Refinement

Task 2 will consist of a two-day workshop to validate findings from Task 1, refine project prioritization, and ensure consensus on the Main and Vine Street corridors' future. We will work collaboratively with you to identify key stakeholders, civic leaders, business representatives, property owners, and the Corridor Commission will collaborate to review and enhance the initial prioritization framework.

The workshop will feature structured discussions alongside on-site validation. Gresham Smith, Street Plans, and EHI Consultants will facilitate walking tours of the corridors, allowing participants to experience current conditions firsthand while reflecting on inventory and analysis results. These visits will emphasize safety, accessibility, comfort, and placemaking challenges, fostering dialogue on prioritizing improvements.

To enrich shared experiences, the workshop will include small-group discussions, one-on-one meetings, and facilitated exercises that help participants assess trade-offs among priorities such as public safety, economic vitality, cultural storytelling, and cost feasibility. Activities will culminate in refining and validating a prioritization matrix, ensuring recommendations are transparent, defensible, and grounded in data and community values.

The outcome of Task 2 will be a refined prioritization framework that merges technical analysis with stakeholder insights, providing a roadmap for advancing corridor improvement recommendations for further community feedback.



Phase 2: Collaborate

Task 3: Validation of Prioritization and Development of Recommendations

Phase 2 focuses on developing design precedents, material palette alternatives, and draft priority locations for improvements based on the analysis and stakeholder feedback from Phase 1. This phase will introduce strategies for Main and Vine Streets that are both aspirational and practical, aligning with LFUCG's long-term operations, maintenance capacities, and available resources, while advancing broader goals of safety, placemaking, and economic vitality.

The Gresham Smith and Street Plans team will utilize the prioritization framework developed during the stakeholder workshop to guide recommendations in each of the four focus areas. This will involve creating themes and palettes for materials and identifying strategic investment locations for stakeholder and community feedback. This process will confirm which areas and strategies are most suitable for immediate focus and identify potential priority locations for pilot projects that could yield near-term results. Initial recommendations will vary in cost, scale, and purpose, providing LFUCG and its partners with flexible solutions ranging from accessible, low-cost, quick-build options to more robust, strategic investments. Each recommendation will be illustrated through vision boards and draft conceptual illustrations/diagrams to help stakeholders and the community visualize potential improvements and understand cost trade-offs.



The Meatpacking District tactical materials guide included a varying, but consistent material palletes for demonstration, pilot, interim, and capital projects.

Design Focus Areas

Recommendations will focus on four primary areas, emphasizing precedent, material alternatives, and priority locations for improvement:

Planting

Emphasizing native and maintainable species, including trees, planters, rain gardens, and hanging baskets.

Street Furniture & Amenities

Durable and easily replaceable furnishings such as benches, bike racks, bus stop amenities, trash receptacles, and decorative elements.

Lighting

Pedestrian-scale and accent lighting to enhance safety and nighttime vibrancy, alongside long-term alternatives to seasonal lighting, ensuring compatibility with existing Granville fixtures.


Pedestrian Safety Enhancements

Quick-build and low-cost measures like curb extensions, refuge islands, high-visibility crosswalks, vertical safety elements, and traffic calming interventions.

Coordination

Close coordination will guide this phase. The consultant team will collaborate with LFUCG staff to align recommendations with maintenance capabilities and staffing resources. Concurrent coordination with KYTC District 7 will ensure compliance with permitting, regulatory requirements, and right-of-way conditions. Given Vine Street's role as a critical transit corridor, concepts will also be developed in consultation with Lextran to maintain efficient and accessible transit operations.

The outcome of Task 3 will be a refined prioritization framework and actionable, scalable recommendations that provide LFUCG with clear and realistic strategies for elevating the Main and Vine Street corridors and advancing toward a pilot demonstration.





Street Plans installed a demonstration project as a part of a festival in Stamford to show a "rendering in real time" of what some of the Action Plan recommendations could look like.

Task 4: Public Engagement and Demonstration Project

A key component of this planning process is direct engagement with the public to validate recommendations and assess the feasibility of proposed improvements along Main and Vine Streets. Task 4 will focus on creating accessible opportunities for residents, visitors, and downtown stakeholders to review and experience interventions while providing meaningful feedback.

If the budget allows, the consultant team will design and implement a tactical pop-up demonstration project to showcase a potential pilot intervention—such as a temporary safety improvement, planting installation, or pedestrian-focused feature. Led by Street Plans, who authored the book on Tactical Urbanism, this demonstration will be ephemeral and cost-effective while delivering high engagement impact. By aligning the demonstration with major seasonal attractions like Keeneland and other significant Downtown events, this event can maximize visibility and community

engagement. This temporary installation will bring design concepts to life in a tangible way, helping the community visualize how the proposed recommendations might function in practice.

This marquee event will be complemented by ongoing outreach activities, ensuring diverse audiences can contribute both in person and online. Our engagement lead, EHI Consultants, will also support involvement in relevant community events and business canvassing to expand feedback touchpoints on draft concepts and recommendations. Together, these strategies will ensure final recommendations are grounded in community values and garner broad public support.

Phase 3: Develop

Task 5: Final Recommendations and Documentation

The culmination of this planning process will be the preparation of a Final Recommendations Report, accompanied by formal presentations to stakeholders, LFUCG leadership, and the public. This document will synthesize findings from the inventory and analysis (Task 1), stakeholder validation workshops (Task 2), draft recommendations (Task 3), and public engagement activities (Task 4), resulting in a cohesive, implementable roadmap for improving Main and Vine Streets.

Final deliverables will include streetscape layout plans for both corridors, illustrating the recommended locations for plantings, lighting, furnishings, amenities, and safety elements. The final report will also include proposed phasing and priority implementation recommendations.

Detailed recommendations will encompass:

Planting Plans

Species selection, layout strategies, and maintenance schedules.

Street Furniture and Amenities Plans

Durable, easily maintainable products with procurementready counts.

Lighting Concepts and Placement Strategies

Aligned with pedestrian safety and streetscape vibrancy.

Pedestrian Safety Improvements

Quick-build measures and low-cost interventions to protect vulnerable users.

Product Specifications and Durability Guidance: Ensuring recommendations are practical, compatible with existing LFUCG inventories, and supported by long-term warranty and maintenance considerations.


As requested, the report will not include stamped engineering or construction drawings but will provide

implementable, dimensioned layouts and specifications for LFUCG-led implementation. While KYTC CADD Standards are not required, Gresham Smith is a KYTC prequalified firm and has a successful track record of completing projects for KYTC using their required design standards should any future optional services be necessary.

Although not part of the base scope, our team will also prepare a Stewardship Framework—a brief document informed by our team and LFUCG maintenance experts that emphasizes resiliency, durability, and alignment with ongoing staffing capacity. As demonstrated through our work on the Town Branch Commons and the TBC Maintenance Manual, Gresham Smith understands the importance of designing infrastructure as an asset and clarifying long-term maintenance and management—an approach particularly relevant in downtown Lexington. Our recommendations for Main and Vine aim to transform everyday infrastructure into visible contributors to safety, vibrancy, and community pride. The result will be implementable strategies that balance feasibility with vision, strengthening two of Lexington's most significant downtown corridors and reflecting the remarkable evolution of downtown Lexington over the past decade.





EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGREEMENT

Standard Title VI Assurance

The Lexington Fayette-Urban County Government, (hereinafter referred to as the "Recipient") hereby agrees that as a condition to receiving any Federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation, it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78Stat.252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d-4 (hereinafter referred to as the "Act"), and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, (49 CFR, Part 21) Nondiscrimination in Federally Assisted Program of the Department of Transportation – Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations") and other pertinent directives, no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age (over 40), religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, veteran status, or disability be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation, including the Federal Highway Administration, and hereby gives assurance that will promptly take any necessary measures to effectuate this agreement. This assurance is required by subsection 21.7(a) (1) of the Regulations.

The Law

- Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (amended 1972) states that it is unlawful for an employer to discriminate in employment because of race, color, religion, sex, age (40-70 years) or national origin.
- Executive Order No. 11246 on Nondiscrimination under Federal contract prohibits employment discrimination by contractor and sub-contractor doing business with the Federal Government or recipients of Federal funds. This order was later amended by Executive Order No. 11375 to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex.
- Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 states:

The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of physical or mental handicap.

- Section 2012 of the Vietnam Era Veterans Readjustment Act of 1973 requires Affirmative Action on behalf of disabled veterans and veterans of the Vietnam Era by contractors having Federal contracts.
- Section 206(A) of Executive Order 12086, Consolidation of Contract Compliance Functions for Equal Employment Opportunity, states:

The Secretary of Labor may investigate the employment practices of any Government contractor or sub-contractor to determine whether or not the contractual provisions specified in Section 202 of this order have been violated.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government practices Equal Opportunity in recruiting, hiring and promoting. It is the Government's intent to affirmatively provide employment opportunities for those individuals who have previously not been allowed to enter into the mainstream of society. Because of its importance to the local Government, this policy carries the full endorsement of the Mayor, Commissioners, Directors and all supervisory personnel. In following this commitment to Equal Employment Opportunity and because the Government is the benefactor of the Federal funds, it is both against the Urban County Government policy and illegal for the Government to let contracts to companies which knowingly or unknowingly practice discrimination

in their employment practices. Violation of the above mentioned ordinances may cause a contract to be canceled and the contractors may be declared ineligible for future consideration.



 Each Respondent shall comply with all Federal, State & Local regulations concerning this type of service or good.

- 3. Addenda: All addenda and IonWave Q&A, if any, shall be considered in making the proposal, and such addenda shall be made a part of this RFP. - 10. Ambiguity, Conflict or other Errors in RFP: If a Respondent discovers any ambiguity, conflict, discrepancy, omission or other error in the RFP, it shall immediately notify LFUCG of such error in writing and request modification or clarification of the document if allowable by the LFUCG.
- 11. Agreement to Bid Terms: In submitting this proposal, the Respondent agrees that it has carefully examined the specifications and all provisions relating to the work to be done attached hereto and made part of this proposal. By acceptance of a Contract under this RFP, proposer states that it understands the meaning, intent and requirements of the RFP and agrees to the same. The successful Respondent shall warrant that it is familiar with and understands all provisions herein and shall warrant that it can comply with them. No additional compensation to Respondent shall be authorized for services or expenses reasonably covered under these provisions that the proposer omits from its Proposal.
- 12. Cancellation: If the services to be performed hereunder by the Respondent are not performed in an acceptable manner to the LFUCG, the LFUCG may cancel this contract for cause by providing written notice to the proposer, giving at least thirty (30) days notice of the proposed cancellation and the reasons for same. During that time period, the proposer may seek to bring the performance of services hereunder to a level that is acceptable to the LFUCG, and the LFUCG may rescind the cancellation if such action is in its best interest.

A. Termination for Cause

- (1) LFUCG may terminate a contract because of the contractor's failure to perform its contractual duties
- (2) If a contractor is determined to be in default, LFUCG shall notify the contractor of the determination in writing, and may include a specified date by which the contractor shall cure the identified deficiencies. LFUCG may proceed with termination if the contractor fails to cure the deficiencies within the specified time.
- (3) A default in performance by a contractor for which a contract may be terminated shall include, but shall not necessarily be limited to:
 - (a) Failure to perform the contract according to its terms, conditions and specifications;
 - p) Failure to make delivery within the time specified or according

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- to a delivery schedule fixed by the contract;
- (c) Late payment or nonpayment of bills for labor, materials, supplies, or equipment furnished in connection with a contract for construction services as evidenced by mechanics' liens filed pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 376, or letters of indebtedness received from creditors by the purchasing agency;
- (d) Failure to diligently advance the work under a contract for construction services;
- The filing of a bankruptcy petition by or against the contractor; or
- (f) Actions that endanger the health, safely or welfare of the LFUCG or its citizens.

B. At Will Termination

Notwithstanding the above provisions, the LFUCG may terminate this contract at will in accordance with the law upon providing thirty (30) days written notice of that intent, Payment for services or goods received prior to termination shall be made by the LFUCG provided these goods or services were provided in a manner acceptable to the LFUCG. Payment for those goods and services shall not be unreasonably withheld.

- 13. Assignment of Contract: The contractor shall not assign or subcontract any portion of the Contract without the express written consent of LFUCG. Any purported assignment or subcontract in violation hereof shall be void. It is expressly acknowledged that LFUCG shall never be required or obligated to consent to any request for assignment or subcontract; and further that such refusal to consent can be for any or no reason, fully within the sole discretion of LFUCG.
- 14. No Waiver: No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege hereunder, nor any single or partial exercise thereof, nor the exercise of any other right, remedy, power or privilege shall operate as a waiver hereof or thereof. No failure or delay by LFUCG in exercising any right, remedy, power or privilege under or in respect of this Contract shall affect the rights, remedies, powers or privileges of LFUCG hereunder or shall operate as a waiver thereof.
- 15. Authority to do Business: The Respondent must be a duly organized and authorized to do business under the laws of Kentucky. Respondent must be in good standing and have full legal capacity to provide the services specified under this Contract. The Respondent must have all necessary right and lawful authority to enter into this Contract for the full term hereof and that proper corporate or other action has been duly taken authorizing the Respondent to enter into this Contract. The Respondent will provide LFUCG with a copy of a corporate resolution authorizing this action and a letter from an attorney confirming that the proposer is authorized to do business in the State of Kentucky if requested. All proposals must

be signed by a duly authorized officer, agent or employee of the Respondent.

- 16. Governing Law: This Contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In the event of any proceedings regarding this Contract, the Parties agree that the venue shall be the Fayette County Circuit Court or the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky, Lexington Division. All parties expressly consent to personal jurisdiction and venue in such Court for the limited and sole purpose of proceedings relating to this Contract or any rights or obligations arising thereunder. Service of process may be accomplished by following the procedures prescribed by law.
- 17. Ability to Meet Obligations: Respondent affirmatively states that there are no actions, suits or proceedings of any kind pending against Respondent or, to the knowledge of the Respondent, threatened against the Respondent before or by any court, governmental body or agency or other tribunal or authority which would, if adversely determined, have a materially adverse effect on the authority or ability of Respondent to perform its obligations under this Contract, or which question the legality, validity or enforceability hereof or thereof.
- 18. Contractor understands and agrees that its employees, agents, or subcontractors are not employees of LFUCG for any purpose whatsoever. Contractor is an independent contractor at all times during the performance of the services specified.
- 19. If any term or provision of this Contract shall be found to be illegal or unenforceable, the remainder of the contract shall remain in full force and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.
- 20. Contractor [or Vendor or Vendor's Employees] will not appropriate or make use of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government (LFUCG) name or any of its trade or service marks or property (including but not limited to any logo or seal), in any promotion, endorsement, advertisement, testimonial or similar use without the prior written consent of the government. If such consent is granted LFUCG reserves the unilateral right, in its sole discretion, to immediately terminate and revoke such use for any reason whatsoever. Contractor agrees that it shall cease and desist from any unauthorized use immediately upon being notified by LFUCG.

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RISK MANAGEMENT PROVISIONS INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS PROVISION

- (1) It is understood and agreed by the parties that Contractor hereby assumes the entire responsibility and liability for any and all damages to persons or property caused by or resulting from or arising out of any act or omission on the part of Contractor or its employees, agents, servants, owners, principals, licensees, assigns or subcontractors of any tier (hereinafter "CONTRACTOR") under or in connection with this agreement and/or the provision of goods or services and the performance or failure to perform any work required thereby.
- (2) CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, save, hold harmless and defend the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and its elected and appointed officials, employees, agents, volunteers, and successors in interest (hereinafter "LFUCG") from and against all liability, damages, and losses, including but not limited to, demands, claims, obligations, causes of action, judgments, penalties, fines, liens, costs, expenses, interest, defense costs and reasonable attorney's fees that are in any way incidental to or connected with, or that arise or are alleged to have arisen, directly or indirectly, from or by CONTRACTOR's performance or breach of the agreement and/or the provision of goods or services provided that: (a) it is attributable to personal injury, bodily injury, sickness, or death, or to injury to or destruction of property (including the loss of use resulting therefrom), or to or from the negligent acts, errors or omissions or willful misconduct of the CONTRACTOR; and (b) not caused solely by the active negligence or willful misconduct of LFUCG.
- (3) In the event LFUCG is alleged to be liable based upon the above, CONTRACTOR shall defend such allegations and shall bear all costs, fees and expenses of such defense, including but not limited to, all reasonable attorneys' fees and expenses, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses, using attorneys approved in writing by LFUCG, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- (4) These provisions shall in no way be limited by any financial responsibility or insurance requirements, and shall survive the termination of this agreement.
- (5) LFUCG is a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that LFUCG is unable to provide indemnity or otherwise save, hold harmless, or defend the CONTRACTOR in any manner.
- (6) Notwithstanding, the foregoing with respect to any professional services performed by CONTRACTOR hereunder (and to the fullest extent permitted by law), CONTRACTOR shall indemnify, save, hold harmless and defend LFUCG from and against any and all liability, damages and losses, including but not limited to, demands, claims, obligations, causes of action, judgments, penalties, fines, liens, costs, expenses, interest, defense costs and reasonable attorney's fees, for any damage due to death or injury to any person or injury to any property (including the loss of use resulting therefrom) to the extent arising out of, pertaining to or relating to the negligence, recklessness or willful misconduct of CONTRACTOR in the performance of this agreement.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

BIDDER/CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that it shall demonstrate the ability to assure compliance with the above Indemnity provisions and these other risk management provisions prior to final acceptance of its bid and the commencement of any work or provision of goods.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

YOUR ATTENTION IS DIRECTED TO THE INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS BELOW, AND YOU MAY NEED TO CONFER WITH YOUR INSURANCE AGENTS, BROKERS, OR CARRIERS TO DETERMINE IN ADVANCE OF SUBMISSION OF A RESPONSE THE AVAILABILITY OF THE INSURANCE COVERAGES AND ENDORSEMENTS REQUIRED HEREIN. IF YOU FAIL TO COMPLY WITH THE INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS BELOW, YOU MAY BE DISQUALIFIED FROM AWARD OF THE CONTRACT.

Required Insurance Coverage

BIDDER/CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain for the duration of this contract the following or equivalent insurance policies at no less than the limits shown below and cause its subcontractors to maintain similar insurance with limits acceptable to LFUCG in order to protect LFUCG against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by CONTRACTOR. The cost of such insurance shall be included in any bid:

The policies above shall contain the following conditions:

- a. All Certificates of Insurance forms used by the insurance carrier shall be properly filed and approved by the Department of Insurance for the Commonwealth of Kentucky (DOI). LFUCG shall be named as an additional insured in the General Liability Policy and Commercial Automobile Liability Policy using the Kentucky DOI approved forms.
- b. The General Liability Policy shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance retained by LFUCG.
- c. LFUCG shall be provided at least 30 days advance written notice via certified mail, return receipt requested, in the event any of the required policies are canceled or non-renewed.
- d. Said coverage shall be written by insurers acceptable to LFUCG and shall be in a form acceptable to LFUCG. Insurance placed with insurers with a rating classification of no less than Excellent (A or A-) and a financial size category of no less than VIII, as defined by the most current Best's Key Rating Guide shall be deemed automatically acceptable.

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Renewals

After insurance has been approved by LFUCG, evidence of renewal of an expiring policy must be submitted to LFUCG, and may be submitted on a manually signed renewal endorsement form. If the policy or carrier has changed, however, new evidence of coverage must be submitted in accordance with these Insurance Requirements.

Deductibles and Self-Insured Programs

IF YOU INTEND TO SUBMIT A SELF-INSURANCE PLAN IT MUST BE FORWARDED TO LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT, DIVISION OF RISK MANAGEMENT, 200 EAST MAIN STREET, LEXINGTON, KENTUCKY 40507 NO LATER THAN A MINIMUM OF FIVE (5) WORKING DAYS PRIOR TO THE RESPONSE DATE. Self-insurance programs, deductibles, and self-insured retentions in insurance policies are subject to separate approval by Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government's Division of Risk Management, upon review of evidence of BIDDER/CONTRACTOR's financial capacity to respond to claims. Any such programs or retentions must provide LFUCG with at least the same protection from liability and defense of suits as would be afforded by first-dollar insurance coverage

Safety and Loss Control

CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local safety standards related to the performance of its works or services under this Agreement and take necessary action to protect the life, health and safety and property of all of its personnel on the job site, the public, and LFUCG.

Verification of Coverage

BIDDER/CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish LFUCG with all applicable Certificates of Insurance signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf prior to final award, and if requested, shall provide LFUCG copies of all insurance policies, including all endorsements.

Right to Review, Audit and Inspect

CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that LFUCG may review, audit and inspect any and all of its records and operations to insure compliance with these Insurance Requirements.

DEFAULT

BIDDER/CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that the failure to comply with any of these insurance, safety, or loss control provisions shall constitute default and that LFUCG may elect at its option any single remedy or penalty or any combination of remedies and penalties, as available, including but not limited to purchasing insurance and charging BIDDER/CONTRACTOR for any such insurance premiums purchased, or suspending or terminating the work.

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Risk Management Provisions


Insurance & Indemnification

We will supply blanket endorsements consistent with the parties' written contract along with our certificates of insurance after the execution of such contract. However, the insurance and indemnification provisions contain language that will impact our ability to maintain our professional liability insurance coverage for the project as we perform professional services and that insurance covers our negligent acts, errors, and omissions to the extent that we cause an issue.

We would appreciate the opportunity to negotiate this language in sections 1, 2, 3 and 6 so that coverage could be maintained to the benefit of both LFUCG and Gresham Smith.
